QUESTION OF INTELLIGENCE

LEES. CRANDALL, who is general curator of the Zoo, in the borough of the Bronx, New York City, has made a study for years not only of four-footed animals, but of all living creatures. What he hays of intelligence in the animal world bears weight. He says that the six most intelligent animals, in the order in which they are listed, are: Chimpanree

Although the dog ranks fifth in intelligence, he ranks first in the hearts of men and usefulness. The Chimpanzee and the Orang-utan more closely resemble man, with the gorilla following, although so little is known of the gorilla that it is not possible to arrive at a close estimate of his mental powers. 
