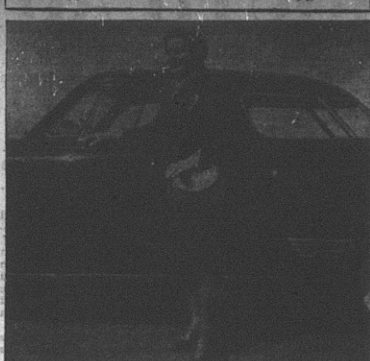

FCA Governor Warns of Farm Debt Increase

Fear that the farm debt pendulum has begun its swing in the direction was expressed today by Ivy W. Duggan, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C., while he was in Louisville Monday. While here he attended a regular monthly meeting of the district board of directors. With him was James R. Isleib, recently appointed Land Bank Commissioner.

Warning of higher land prices and increasing debt burdens, Governor Duggan said the pendulum apparently started early this year its swing in the same direction that caused so many farm families to much debt trouble following World War I. From a peak of \$10,786,000,000 in 1923, the total farm mortgage debt in the United States went down year after year until it was only \$5,081,000,000 on January 1, 1946. This was the lowest level of indebtedness since 1915, he pointed out.

"But since the first of this year farm mortgage recordings have shown a considerable increase," Duggan said. "In the first quarter there were an estimated \$417,394,000 in farm mortgages recorded. This was a 36 percent increase over the first quarter of 1945."

"Farmers will need to pay on their mortgage debts as fast as they make them if they are to avoid piling up debt."

Governor Duggan said there had been more indications of speculation brought to his attention in recent months than at any time during and after World War I. All too often, he indicated, some veteran is the victim of these speculative deals when he might have been first consulted by his county agricultural agent.

Farm real estate prices have continued to increase during 1946 at the rate of about one percent a month. They are already more than double their 1935-1939 levels in Kentucky, Tennessee, Indiana and four other states, he warned.

"The biggest spot in the picture up until this year has been that the majority of buyers all paid cash or a high percentage of the purchase price in cash," Duggan said. "The sharp increase in farm mortgage recordings since the first of the year indicates that the buyers are paying a smaller percentage in cash and carrying more in the form of debt. Farm mortgages have increased in size, the largest increasing in those made by individual lenders. Whether individuals can lend 18 percent more per acre in 1946 than they did in 1945 and still not hurt their borrowers is a question which time alone will have to answer. There also has been a

tremendous increase in recordings of short-term farm mortgages maturing in five years or less."

The Farm Credit Governor complimented Federal Land Bank officials for holding to normal agriculture prices in making loans. "Long - term loans made on the basis of normal agricultural values instead of today's inflated values will help many farm families avoid loss of their homes when years of low income arrive," he said.

Doings in Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

Are we being taken for a ride? In 1938, just before the outbreak of World War II, a Member of Congress left for Europe. I tried his car to get the low-down on existing conditions. Upon his return, he said "I am ready to report on conditions."

He had visited an old uncle in Germany. He asked the uncle what he thought of Hitler. The uncle put his forefinger upon his lips meaning silence. After dinner, the uncle took him out for a walk. He took him to a bench in the park. He looked under the bench to make sure there was no microphone.

They sat down, and the uncle said "Congressman, there is going to be a war. Do not permit your country to get into it. If you do, they will take out of you what they have taken out of us. We do not move Hitler, but we respect him for having led the inner man. Most much—our butter is still eighty percent whole oil—but your country, and other countries starved 800,000 of us as the war went on."

The uncle continued "Congressman, you see the younger people here are all happy, but we older people are all sad. The youngsters never had what they took out of us; therefore, they do not miss it. The price we had to pay to keep the inner man alive came too high. They made it possible for us to live, but they took something out of us that cannot be replaced." The Congressman asked "Uncle, what did they take out of you?" He replied "The right to

do, think, say or read what we want to. The younger people never had this right; therefore they are satisfied without it. They are slaves to the dictator-ship." The uncle repeated "Congressman, do not permit your country to get into the coming war. They will take out of you what they have taken out of us."

Well, whatever they may or may not have taken out of us, they have given us government by bureaucracy in place of government by law. We have gone a long ways in sping Hitler and Stalin. They may not as yet have taken out of us the right to think, say and read what we want to, but they have taken out of America many things that we need, and given them to Russia and her satellites, as well as to other nations.

Every housewife wants and needs more sugar for canning, yet she cannot get it because the bureaucrats have shipped 272,000 tons to foreign nations. In addition we are shipping to other nations thousands of tons of sugar we bought from Cuba, the Philippines, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The time has come for us to wake up. It is time that we repudiate the lawless stooges that infect our country and preach the Hitler-Stalin doctrine. These unwitting stooges are spreading the false propaganda of "democracy," "freedom" and "naziism," which are three different phases of the same thing—dictatorship.

The Right Approach

In a recent radio debate, Senator Taft listed some cogent objections to the pending Wagner-Murray-Dingell public health bill.

Under the terms of this measure, the Senator pointed out, every man, woman in the country would have to pay for sickness insurance whether it was desired or not. The cost would amount to three or four percent of every worker's wages, and might reach six per cent. The Federal government would have to establish a vast administrative organization to supervise and pay every doctor in the nation in effect, to quote Senator Taft, "Every doctor becomes a Federal employee. Health service will be nationalized, and a Federal bureau will tell everyone whose kind of service his insurance covers, when he can have a doctor and when he cannot, how many patients a doctor can have, when and how often the doctor can call at his home, and all the details of medical service. This vast system of Federal - employed physicians will practically supersede our entire medical system."

Another bill introduced in Congress, and supported by Senator Taft, takes a different approach to the problem. It would place the administration where it belongs—in the states and in local communities which are conversant with their own needs. It would provide medical service only for those who cannot pay for it—not for those who are perfectly able to pay under the present system. And it would encourage the establishment of voluntary health insurance plans for those who wish them.

This is the intelligent, reasonable approach to the problem. The Wagner-Murray-Dingell Bill for all the good motives behind it, would tend to destroy medical initiative and research, and bureaucratize the profession. It would to a large extent remove the individuals freedom or choice in selecting a doctor. And in the long run, many authorities believe its effect on the national health would be actually deleterious.

The Transportation Shortage
The transportation shortage which Railway Age describes as the most serious in American history is the result of a number of factors.

First, war controls over the handling of transportation are not in effect. Consequently, box cars no longer need be completely filled by shippers, and more cars are required for a given amount of freight. The railroads have never days a week, but many factories work only five days—and cars must stand idle over the long weekend.

Second, the railroads, like all other industries, are finding it difficult to fill orders for new equipment. Cars and locomotives like new automobiles and two-wheeled cars, aren't being produced in adequate quantities.

Third, and most important by far in the long run, is the rail-

road's financial problem. The industry's cost of operation has risen to such an extent that it is necessary to dip into reserves to pay running expenses—and those are the reserves which were created to pay new equipment. The lines have asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for rate increases, and have substantiated that request with a vast amount of factual testimony as to the need. Yet, as Railway Age says, "The ICC is delaying month after month the advances in freight rates without which the railroads cannot make the net earnings essential to enabling them to make the required investment."

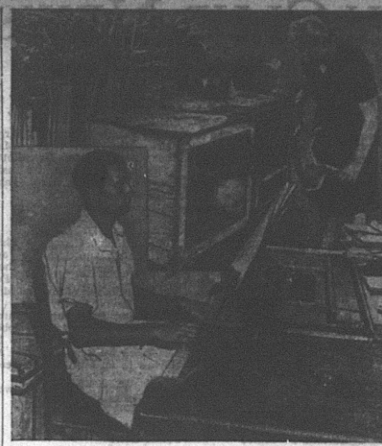
The only solution to the transportation shortage is a huge railroad expansion program. The railroads are solidly behind that program. But they can't undertake it if the means are provided for getting the money. They're up to the neck in revenue is rates. It's up to the ICC.

Three-Point-Oil Policy
In a recent address, Secretary of the Interior Krug outlined a three-point oil policy for the United States, involving national oil security, continued availability of an adequate, reasonably priced supply of petroleum products, and the maintenance of a healthy, vigorous American petroleum industry.

That is practically what we have now. The American oil industry, through exploration and research, is constantly expanding known oil reserves to serve the country in generations to come. The cost of oil products to consumers has risen very little since before the war—despite substantial increases in the cost of operating the industry. And no industry has shown a more vigorous spirit. It meant the unprecedented unpredictable demands of the war with 100 per cent success.

There need be no fear of an "oil problem" in this country so long as we permit the industry, under suitable and reasonable regulations, to continue to produce, to develop and to conserve our oil resources. It has the "know how" which has given it world leadership. And it has the drive and incentive.

QUESTION OF INTELLIGENCE

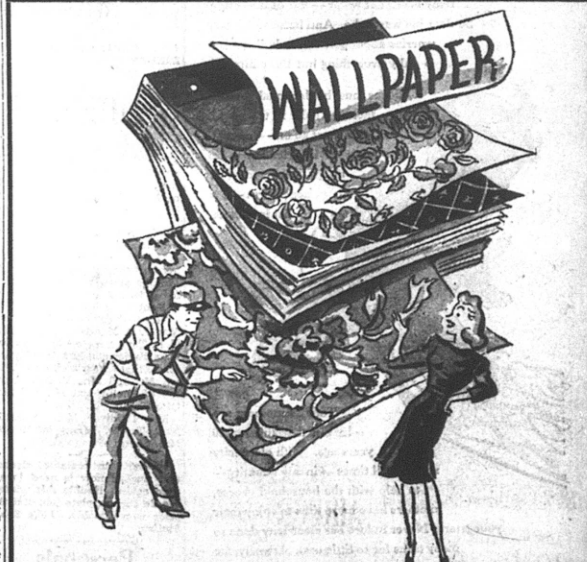
L. E. S. CRANDALL, who is general curator of the Zoo, in the borough of the Bronx, New York City, has made a study for years not only of four-footed animals, but of all living creatures. What he says of intelligence in the animal world bears weight. He says that the six most intelligent animals, in the order in which they are listed, are:

- Chimpanzee
- Orangutan
- Indian elephant
- Gorilla
- Domesticated dog
- American beaver

Although the dog ranks first in intelligence, he ranks first in the hearts of men and usefulness. The chimpanzee and the orangutan are closely related man, with the gorilla following, although so little is known of the gorilla that it is not possible to arrive at a close estimate of his mental powers. Dr. Crandall regrets that the gorilla does not live long in captivity, and that being always at war with his keeper, it is not possible to give him a fair test.

The elephant who does much work in the jungles of India, the third on the list, is most clever in eluding capture, yet when caught adapts himself quickly and admirably to his new surroundings. Certainly he exhibits a philosophical nature, for after putting up a stiff fight to avoid capture, he gives in graciously and finally caught and begins to make the most of his surroundings. It takes only a few weeks, says Dr. Crandall, to train an elephant to be useful, and no other animal on record has shown such adaptability. Not only is he willing to work, once he sees that he must, but he can be directed by word of mouth to perform seventeen different kinds of tasks.

Dr. Crandall's beaver just below the dog for intelligence because of the amazing things he can do in the wild, and by reason of the feats he has performed in captivity. Once, he says, two beavers at his zoo tunneled under a cement wall seven feet deep. The runways were captured, again placed in captivity, and the tunnel sealed with cement. Evidently the two beavers told the others in the colony of their ambition, for soon all of them set to work to build a structure of logs six feet high so that two determined beavers might climb over the wall.

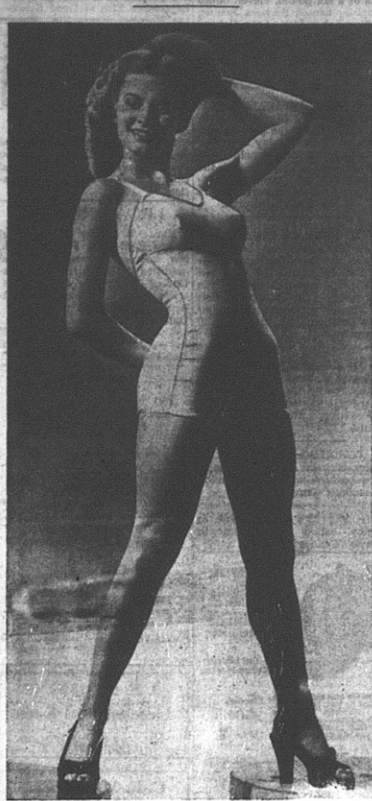
