Three Robbers Try 'Break-In' At Shiloh

An attempted robbery was foiled Saturday night when three colored men, who attempted to gain entrance into the Garrett Coal Co. building, Shiloh, were frightened by the appearance of Harry Garrett and his son Alvin. The trio tried to gain entrance into the building, around 8:30 on Saturday night. When they were interrupted in their motive, they fled on foot, leaving behind a 1941 Pontiac car, which authorities took over.

Identity of one of the men was secured through a check of a dry cleaning firm in Cleveland. The police have reported they are holding a man by the name of James Howard alias James Howell, who has a police record.

Investigation revealed a kit of burglar tools which was discovered by Mayor Glen Swanger near the office of the coal company.

It is believed by Richland Co. officers that the same trio that attempted the Shiloh robbery was also responsible for the blowing of the safe in the Baltimore & Ohio station at Shelby Tuesday night. Here the burglars took \$500 in travelers checks and some \$500 in cash. This robbery is reported to have occurred ninety minutes following the Shiloh incident.

Robbers literally blew the door from the heavy safe in the B. & O. Station, and was discovered minutes later by Wilbur Bettac, station agent, who happened to make a chance visit to his office around 10 p. m.

Checks Found

An envelope containing \$500 in travel checks taken from the B. & O. safe was found by Marlin Myers Monday morning in one of the fields on Shiloh, about three miles east of Shiloh on the main street road. Also included were two hundred 3-cent stamps. The envelope probably had been thrown from a passing car as it was found near the road.

Good Turn-Out For Cong. McGregor

J. Harry McGregor was given a hearty welcome by friends in Shiloh on Friday evening when he spoke at the Shiloh High School. Also speaking on the program were Atty. John L. Before the program "Harry" McGregor took the time to sit down with your correspondent and give some facts and figures. He believes that government expenses are being reduced by the reduction in federal employment and by putting into effect sound business judgment instead of the ories. Speaking of the growth of business he said:

"When the boys came home from the war they found 1,141 bureaus and agencies which in 1932 had only 68. There were 3 million on the government payroll. They found a president spending four times as much as any previous president had spent not including military. Congressmen McGregor does not believe in the present administrations policy of tax and tax and spend. He said that he opposed OPA during peace time as he firmly believes that the people should be given opportunity to work and produce and we will soon have sufficient surplus which along with competition and service will take care of price control. "It is about time the American people be given some consideration relative to the tax program as well as the necessities we so badly need" stated McGregor.

McGregor also strenuously objects to exporting of lumber and building material, meat, sugar and other food stuffs. From January to May of this year he estimated that 9,108,506,000 pounds of meat had been exported. In the same period 261,000,000 tons of sugar had been exported. This figure is 343% more than has ever been exported in any given length of time. The figure does not include shipments for UNRRA which received 153,828,350 lbs. He said that the government had allowed enough sugar to be exported to give each of the thirty-five million families in this country twenty-seven additional lbs. during the first six months of this year. During a recent tour of Latin America McGregor said that the people of that country say the Americans are suckers for tolerating such an administration.

Mayor Glenn Swanger introduced the evening speakers. Both McGregor and Catlett spoke with highest respect for their opponents in this campaign. McGregor or also honored Henry Packler for his fight against OPA.

Doings In Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

Let us take a look at the world we live in. The war with Germany has been over for a year and a half - with Japan for over a year. Yet we are still in the same old, same old. All the war powers still remain in the President. Under the Constitution he can proclaim the end of the war, and so can Congress.

Both have been dervet in their duty to the people of our nation and of the world. Under the disguise of the war, the world is still on the fifty-two "peace loving" nations still indulge in human slavery - in the murder of other nations' people.

History will record that this war was not only the most brutal and inhuman, but that the brutality was continued long after it ended. Great Britain, France, Russia and her puppets are still using war prisoners as slaves. We abolished slavery in 1864. Yet we silently condone this human slavery.

Many returning veterans wonder what this war was for. Was it to promote communism? That was not what the American GI fought for. Was it the Atlantic Charter with its four freedoms? Yes, but the Atlantic Charter was thrown overboard by its author, and Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Poland, part of Finland, and other small nations, handed over to Russia for liquidation and communism.

These are the bitter facts that future historians will record. We sympathize with Secretary Byrnes. The situation he finds himself in is a difficult one. He has to deal with a dictator, whose word, in the past, never was any good. All he can do is to hope that someday when Stalin shall have joined his former pal, Hitler, Russia's word will be good.

We have no direct quarrel with the Russian people - the Russian slaves. We know that eighty percent live in a worse condition than the inhabitants of our dirtiest slum. We know that eighty percent wrap burkas around their feet for shoes. Such are the reports brought back to this country by Congressmen who have been over there. Some of the Members were "One Worlders" when they left, but returned as Americans. They too wondered what World War II was all about. They too wondered about the company we kept.

Yet we are with Byrnes, and in spite of doubts and fears, we hope that he may succeed in abolishing human slavery—succeed in bringing about a peace that the world may be proud of. We hope that he may succeed in opening every nation to the eyes of the world.

We hope and pray that Byrnes will be able to convince the Russian people of a greater and better future if they will aid him in resurrecting the Atlantic Charter - if they will resurrect the nations whose people they have liquidated and enslaved - if they will abolish human slavery. That, Mr. Byrnes, is your job. You must represent the highest ideals of America - the Four Freedoms. We're with you one hundred percent.

WHERE ARE
THE DEAD?

There is one question that comes to every home; where does a person go when he dies? This is an age old question of which many theories have been advanced, can only be answered by the Bible that will be satisfactory for God made man, and should know what is state is in death. God's word say, "All go into one place; all are of the dust, and all turn to dust again." Eccl. 3:20. This one place where all go at death is the grave — where they turn to dust again.

Ps. 49:14, in the marginal reading, declares that the grave is the habitation of everyone who has died. Job. 30:23 tells us that the grave is "the house appointed for all living." Jesus declares in John 5:28, 29 that all who have died are in their graves, and that

they will be there until resurrection.

If people actually went to heaven hell at death, Christ in John 5:28, 29 speaking of the resurrection of the dead, would have said: "All who are in heaven will hear His voice and come down, and all who are in hell will hear His voice and come up." But this is not what He said. He said that all dead should hear His voice from the grave, both the good and the bad.

There is no place in the Bible that speaks of the soul going to hell or heaven when a person dies. There are ten places in the Bible that do speak of the soul going to the grave at death. (Job 33:18, 22, 28, 30; Ps. 16:10; 30:9; 49:15; 88:48; Isa. 38:17; Acts 2:31.)

Now! All the dead are in the grave. When will all the righteous go to heaven? Again God's word answers the question, it says in John 14:2, 3, "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go, I will come again, and receive you, I will come again, that where I am, there ye may be also."

Christ has not yet returned, and so has not yet received His disciples to Himself. They will not be with Him in heaven until He comes again.

The righteous will not go to heaven until the coming of Jesus Christ at the last day. In Thess. 4:16, 17 Paul tells us that the righteous will be in the presence of Jesus at His coming. In Thess. 4:16, 17 Paul declares that the

righteous who have died before the last day, and the righteous who are living at that time will be taken to be forever with the Lord at the second coming of Christ, when the Lord descends from heaven. We have positive proof that David did not go to heaven when he died. "For David is not ascended into the heavens." Acts 2:34. In his Pentecostal sermon 1 thousand years after David's death, Peter declared that

David was not in heaven, but was in the grave. (Acts 2:29) David himself tells us in Ps. 137:15 that he expected to see God and be with him forever, at the resurrection day, when he would awake from the sleep of death and come forth from the grave with a perfect, glorious, immortal body like Christ's. Part IV will tell how the righteous dead will be affected if there were no resurrection.
