Since VJ Day 144,000 Employees **Added to Bureaucracy**

The 144,000 employees which have been added to the Executive Branch of the Federal government (excluding Army and Navy Departments) from VJ Day to April 1, 1946, will cost the American people approximately 386 million dollars per year in salaries alone.
