

NATION BACKS GOP; WINS OHIO

All State Offices Routed By G. O. P.; Gain House Controls For First Time Since 1931; Heavy Local Vote

For the first time since 1931 the Republican Party made a strong come back in Tuesday's election, taking control of both branches of the House, and claiming a big portion of all offices in the various state elections.

Tuesday's victory is clearly seen by many writers that the people want a reformed government and a change in general.

As for Ohio, the state went solidly Republican, and Lausche, who was a favorite with the independent voter, as well as Democrats, was noosed out in the Republican landslide.

In Huron county, Frank Pierce, Republican candidate for State Representative, snatched over his democratic opponent, Geiger, by a vote of 8,298 to 3,742. Luther Van Horn, candidate for Judge of Common Pleas Court, won easily over his opponent, Rex Bracy. Van Horn, 8,441; Bracy, 2,961. Roy Gathgood was returned as county commissioner in Huron, and the bond issue for Memorial Lake Park was defeated by a big majority.

Alvin Weichel, Representative from the 13th district, was easily returned to that post.

In Richland county, Cyrus L. Shoup, Plymouth township resident, who was out for second term as county commissioner, proved a favorite with the voters and he polled more than 15,000 votes, while Rinehart, his Democratic opponent, tallied 9,000.

Harry McGreggor, Republican candidate for Congress from the 17th district, won over his opponent, Wesley Purdy, by a vote of almost 20,000. Late reports on Wednesday gave McGreggor 57,087 votes, while Purdy polled 30,277. Election officials in Plymouth turned out exceedingly good, and here is how the village voted:

OCTOBER WEATHER

October, 1946 was one of the warmest and finest months of October on record. The thermometer hit 70 and above on 18 days and 80 and above on 4 days. The highest was 89 on the 5th. The average temperature was 67.7 degrees or 4.4 degrees above normal.

The only fly in the ointment was one cold night—the 13th when the mercury dropped to 30 degrees with a killing frost. This just about fixed all tender vegetation that had not already been killed by earlier, lighter frosts.

While measured rain fell on only eight days it totaled 3.52 inches, or 1.23 inches above normal. The greatest in 24 hours was 1.91 inches on the 17th and 18th. There were 6 cloudy, 8 partly cloudy and 17 clear days.

October was an exceptionally good month for harvesting corn and soy beans, both of which yielded well. Many farmers anticipated earlier in the season.

The success of the movement is largely due to the work of the trustees and elders. Special mention should be made of two veterans, Harry Vandervort and Jim Cunningham, who spoke from first hand knowledge of conditions in Europe. Many members did not have to be solicited but voluntarily sent in their checks or pledges.

This takes on new meaning when we recall that it is only a little over two years since the church was receiving \$300 per annum of missionary help, and perhaps three years since \$250.00 came from another outside source. The raising of \$27,000.00 by the denomination is only the first step in a great forward movement. At the meeting of the General Assembly last May it was voted to seek for a million new members of the church in the next three years. This with a deepening of the spiritual tone of the church is the plan of the denomination.

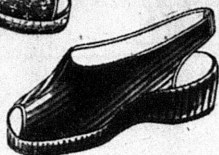
