

Board Sends Out Free Bills

Plymouth residents received their annual "Xmas gift" this week, when November light and power statements were mailed. The decision of the Board of Public Affairs to follow this custom, which became popular during the hard years of 1930-34, was reached at the October meeting, and passed a resolution accordingly. The November bills totaled approximately \$2,200, and includes business houses as well as residential users of electric energy.

Inasmuch as the prepaid bill goes to all customers, the light of fee will be upon the evenings, the 6th and 10th of December, at which time the Board asks that delinquent patrons stop in and settle up. There are only a small number of delinquents, those customers who either forgot, or overlooked the last date of payment, and who owe for October electric. The office will not be open during the day on the 6th and 10th, but in the evenings only.

Sup. Rooks was instructed to proceed with the stringing of Christmas lights around the Square, with the anticipation that the real strike will be settled within another week or ten days, and that the Square can be lighted at least for a few days for the Christmas season.

At the Board meeting Monday night a resolution was passed authorizing an increase in salaries for both Sup. Rooks and his assistant, Wm. Wolfe. The increase is to take effect January first, and brings the present salary of the superintendent from \$3,700 to \$5,200, while the assistant's salary is stepped up from \$1,900 to \$2,400. This is the first increase and the work performed by the department the past year fully warrants the consideration of more pay. The new pay is in line with similar positions in the territory.

A number of electric rates is being published in this issue and local patrons who anticipate installing electric hot water heaters may get the schedule from the city office. Store rates are very attractive, and customers who are interested in the use of electricity for cooking will be surprised to know how economical this is done under the present rate set-up.

A shortage of material and supplies still exists, but as soon as needed are being ordered. The improvement program will shape up early in the Spring for both water and electric consumers. One of the major projects for 1947 will be the construction of another salt pit, which will eliminate much waste of time in the handling of salt, and at the same time, the construction of an interrupted service at the water softening plant.

RESOLUTION NO. 131
A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A NEW ELECTRIC RATE AND FIXING RULES AND REGULATIONS REGARDING SAME.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 1. That from and after December 1, 1946 the following rates and rules shall govern the sale of Electric Current in the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 2. RATE - Energy Charge for Light:

For the first 30 kw hrs used in any month \$4.75 per kw hr

For the next 60 kw hrs used in the same month \$3.87 per kw hr

For the next 210 kw hrs used in the same month \$2.58 per kw hr

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For the next 210 kw hrs used in the same month \$2.58 per kw hr

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For the next 60 kw hrs used in the same month \$3.87 per kw hr

For the next 210 kw hrs used in the same month \$2.58 per kw hr

For all over 300 kw hrs used in the same . . . month . . . \$2 per kw hr

Section 3. Minimum Charge: The minimum charge for any one month shall be \$1.00.

Section 4. Delayed Payment Charge: All accounts will be issued net, same shall be paid on or before the 20th of month. On all accounts not so paid, an additional charge of 5% of the total amount billed, but not less than 10 cents, will be made.

Section 5. Water Heater Service: The following provisions shall in no event apply to the first 200 kw hrs used in any month which will be billed in accordance with the Rate as set forth in Section 2 above.

A-Where a customer has installed and in regular use a standard approved type of electric hot water heater of from 30 to 49 gallons capacity, the last 240 kw hrs used in any month shall be billed at the rate of 12 cents per kw hr.

B-Where a customer has installed and in regular use a standard approved type of electric hot water heater of from 50 to 74 gallons capacity, the last 360 kw hrs used in any month shall be billed at the rate of 12 cents per kw hr.

C-Where a customer has installed and in regular use a standard approved type of electric hot water heater or heaters of 75 gallons total capacity or over, the last 520 kw hrs used in any month shall be billed at the rate of 12 cents per kw hr.

D-The standard approved type of electric hot water heater contemplated shall consist of a permanently installed tank of not less than 1,000 watts nor more than 3,000 watts connected capacity, equipped with 2 (two) thermostatically controlled elements to be operated in the manner specified by the Board of Public Affairs. The Board of Public Affairs will at all times have on file in its office a list of such approved water heaters.

Section 6. Measurement of Energy: Energy supplied hereunder will be delivered through more than 1 (one) single Phase meter, 220 volts.

Section 7. Special Terms and Conditions: Electric welders, X-ray machines or other electrical equipment having similar electrical operating characteristics shall not be connected with the meter in the possession of the Board of Public Affairs. In the event the Board of Public Affairs in its order to represent village electric service, the disturbance on its system installs separate transformer or transformers to serve such load, the minimum charge for such service will be \$5.00 per kilowatt ampere of installed transformer capacity in excess of the minimum charge set forth in Section 3 above.

Section 8. RATE - Energy Charge for Power:

For the first 50 kw hrs used in any month \$5 per kw hr

For the next 100 kw hrs used in the same month \$4 per kw hr

For the next 750 kw hrs used in the same month \$3 per kw hr

For all over 1000 kw hrs used in the same month \$2 per kw hr

The minimum charge for any month shall be \$1.75 for all Accounts demanding 5 H. P. or less. The minimum charge for any one month shall be \$5.00 for all accounts demanding over 5 H. P.

Section 10. Delayed Payment Charge: All accounts will be issued net, same shall be paid on or before the 20th of month. On all accounts not so paid, an additional charge of 5% of the total amount billed, but not less than 10 cents, will be made.

Section 11. That this resolution shall not be subject to effect and any resolution or part of resolution inconsistent herewith, be and the same is hereby repealed.

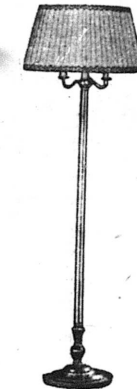

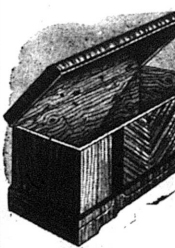

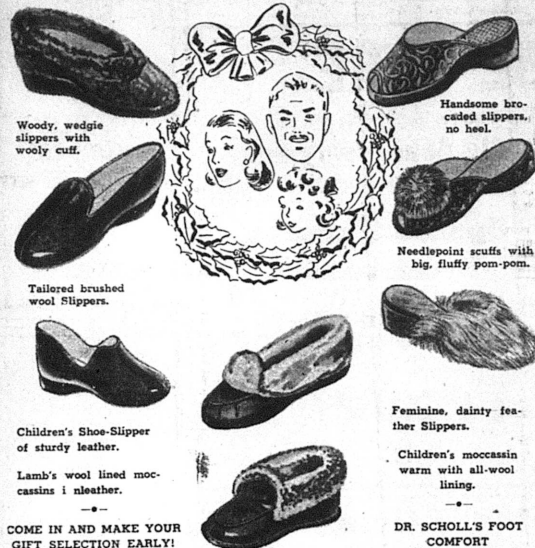
