

Admit Robbing McIntire Store

Donald Jack Easterwood, 26, alias Jack Lemley, Lorain, formerly of Norwalk and Frank Luman, 20, Lorain truck driver, have confessed that they committed a burglary at Newman's store in Norwalk last Sept. 23 and took \$100.00. They are being held by police in Lorain on \$100.00 bond.

They also admitted committing three burglaries in Green- wick and that they entered a restaurant at Wadsworth and the McIntire Dry Goods Store in Plymouth. The men said they got \$100 at Wadsworth and \$75 at Plymouth.

Deputy Sheriff Harry Broome, who worked on the case from the angle of the Greenwicks, Wadsworth burglaries, reports the young men are far different from the average burglar. Easterwood, who is deaf and dumb, informed the deputy that he had been a strong man in county midway shows and that he could put up a 50 lb. weight.

Although, born deaf and dumb, Easterwood when a child was taught in a Columbus institution to read words by the motions of speakers' lips. He also was taught to talk.

The prisoners asserted that they had committed about fifty burglaries in a territory extending across much of northern Ohio to the Indiana line. Both admitted they entered twelve places in Lorain and three or four in Fremont.

When questioned as to whether they had robbed a filling station at Bellevue they denied being involved. Broome was informed that out of policy, they did not carry guns nor did they enter houses in the night season, especially inhabited dwellings. These offenses, it is explained, are decidedly of the type that lands offenders in the penitentiary.

It is stated that Easterwood told officers that he had served in the Mansfield reformatory as well as the Ohio pen. The boys remarked they usually hitch-hiked, out of Lorain, to be bent on burglary, but Norwalk officers thought they used a car for some of the Huron county jobs at least.

The men it is given out, are also being questioned regarding burglaries at Venice and Castalia in Erie County.

SUIT FILED

Mrs. Pauline Moore, Plymouth, who seeks to participate in the State insurance fund for the death of her husband, Otis Moore died May 24, 1943, has filed a common pleas court against the State Industrial Commission.

Moore, an employee of the village was killed when a village truck backed into him and crushed him against a building. Attorney for the plaintiff is R. L. Latimer.

Ohio Farms Co. Sells Last Tract

The Ohio Farms Company who owned a 2000 acre tract of land northeast of Plymouth is now out of existence, having sold the last 415 acres of land to Fred Heister of Willard, Ohio.

The Ohio Farms Company has had a long and varied history and many thousands of dollars has been spent in its cultivation and many projects. For the last 10 years number of Japanese were brought here to help but they didn't remain very long. Similar projects also failed.

Chester L. Zechel of Indianapolis and two partners purchased the tract about eight or nine years ago. At that time they intended to subdivide the land and sell it off but for six or seven years nothing was done and it grew up to weeds and fires raised during dry weather.

Mr. Frank Lillo was then placed in charge in April 1944, after Mr. Zechel bought out the two partners. Mr. Lillo was then given the right to sell this land off in any number of acres. He sold the first piece of land to Philip Dolar of Tiro, Ohio; then the rest followed. Paul Burger, Tiro, C. Heyman of Attica, J. F. Stambaugh, Dr. Steiner, Willard, Edd Wiers, Willard, Burma Bros. Willard, H. Stapp, Willard and Fred Heister, Willard, all owners of different tracts of land, which once comprised the huge farm.

Mr. Lillo closed the deal with Mr. Heister this month, less than two years after being placed in charge. Mr. Zechel is very much pleased with the outcome. He said he wished Mr. Lillo and family moved there, that he would buy the home place which was remodeled and many improvements made, but Mr. Lillo preferred to buy a small farm in connection with his trucking.

Mr. and Mrs. Lillo have now purchased a farm on route 224 from the Biddle which is undergoing considerable improvements and which will be run in addition to his trucking.

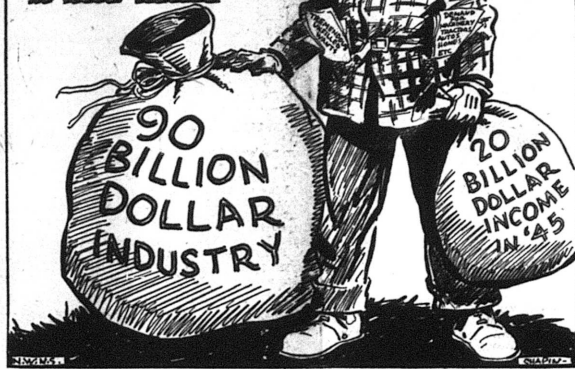

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:00 o'clock (today) Thursday, for Sam Bachrach, 40, who died suddenly at his home Tuesday morning. Arrangements are in charge of McQuate's and interment will be made in the Greenlawn cemetery.

Born on Sept. 27, 1878, the son of Israel and Rosa Bachrach, Sam Bachrach grew up in Plymouth and spent his entire life here. He attended the local schools after which followed a successful career as a livestock and seed dealer. Two sons, Alex and Moses, both deceased, were associated with him for many years under the name of Bachrach Bros. After their passing Sam carried on his business alone, until his son David and nephew, Robert finished school, and they became associated with him.

The suddenness of Mr. Bachrach's death brought a shock not only to his immediate family, but to the younger generation. FAIR PROFITS

THE American public is under the impression that automobile manufacturers enjoy profits amounting to more than three times their actual profits.

That amazing discovery, which undoubtedly has much to do with labor's rebellion against management, was made as a result of a nation-wide survey sponsored by the Automobile Manufacturers association.

Furthermore, it was found that the public thinks a 12 per cent profit would be a fair one—although no automobile manufacturer in the country has made a profit as high as that either during the war or before the war.

Over the years, a profit of six to eight per cent seems to have been about normal for the automobile industry. Yet, according to the survey, the average citizen thinks these big manufacturers make a profit of over 20 per cent.

REACHING FOR THE MOON

For in January the people of this earth made their first actual contacts with the moon and with the sun. The moon was contacted by radar from Belmar, N. J. The sun was contacted from Australia.

JUST AN AVERAGE AMERICAN

YEARS ago a man living quietly in the little cornfield town of Ford Madison, Iowa, suddenly flashed into prominence. One day unknown—a week later practically everybody in America knew of him. He was rushed to the radio stations and people paused breathlessly to hear his voice. Taken to Chicago, people waited for hours in his hotel lobby to get his autograph.

His name was Roy L. Gray. It all came about because an investigator knocked at his door and told him a national survey had pronounced him to be the average American. Mr. Gray blinked.

The survey showed that he lived in an average American town, thought average American thoughts, made an average American salary, lived an average American life. That was all!

He was 43 years old, married, had two children. He tended his own furnace, drove a three-year-old car and walked each morning to the clothing store which he operated.

Let's examine the thoughts that were in the mind of the man Roy L. Gray represented, the average American, who said: "I believe the state should build and maintain the roads. Good roads help the farmer. He can travel farther to do his trading when he has good roads than when he has bad roads."

Something else troubled him: Suffrage. "I think women should vote. It hasn't made the average woman any less a woman, a wife, or a mother."

As to the state of the world he couldn't get interested in foreign affairs. Seemed too far away.

How does he compare with the average American today? Well, for one thing, the average American is thinking much more important and sober thoughts than he was in those days. He is concerned about unemployment, his job, his future, a staggering national debt that is skyrocketing toward inflation.

USO ANNOUNCES 1946 CAMPAIGN

Army, Navy Heads
Praise USO Work,
Urge Continuance

REPORT REVIEWS
5 YEARS OF SERVICE

Official announcement that USO will conduct its own fund raising campaign next September and October with a goal to cover minimum service requirements through 1947 was made by President Lindley F. Kimball at a USO Fifth Anniversary luncheon held in New York, February 4th. Similar announcements were made at anniversary luncheons in other cities.

USO came into being on February 4, 1941, when six member agencies joined hands to create one organization to care for the needs of the men and women of the armed forces. So far the American public has contributed 200 million dollars.

At New York luncheon the speakers were Lieutenant General J. Lawton Collins, Director of Information of the War Department, and Vice-Admiral Louis R. Denfeld, Chief of Navy Personnel, who described what USO had done in its five years of operation and what it still must do for the service men here and abroad.

Gen. Eisenhower's Message
Gen. Dwight W. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff, sent this message:

"I am greatly gratified by your organization and your host of volunteers to play with us through the dangerous and difficult period of transition to final peace."

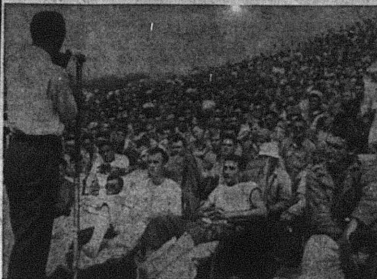
"We still have a pressing need for the services of USO and will be deeply grateful for your continued help in the future as in the past."

Chief of Naval Operations, also sent a message of congratulation.

Need for Fund Outlined
The need for raising a terminal fund in the fall of 1946 is due to the fact that the National War Fund will finance USO only through 1946. Tentative, purely tentative, plans for 1947 call for the operation of some 350-400 USO clubs in the continental United States, largely in connection with hospitalized but convalescent veterans. Operation of situation lounges for troops-in-transit, men on leave, and families of service people must continue. Overseas clubs will carry on in Alaska, Canal Zone, Hawaii, Philippines, etc. Camp Shows will still be seen and heard in 1947 by men in hospitals and men overseas.

Coincident with the announcement of the USO fall campaign, President Kimball made public his annual report, in which he said:

"USO finds that at its peak of activity, it was serving 1,000,000 people a day in one capacity or another, run-

ing up to more than 1,100,000,000 the total served since the organization was created.

2,835 Units at Peak
The number of operations, such as clubs, lounges and similar activities, reached a high point back in March of 1944, a total of 2,835. At training camps closed and the men went overseas this number declined, but the overall volume of work increased.

The five-year peak of activity and cost came after peace in Europe and

before the surrender of Japan. Re-deployment of troops required many camps, doubled or vastly increased various support cities—expenditures climbed to \$3,000,000 a month.

Even today five months after V-J Day—USO must still operate on a basis of \$400,000 a month. Over-all operations, aside from USO-Camp Shows, are carried on through nearly 3,000 units.

New Post-War Problems
Referring to the future of USO, Mr. Kimball says in his report: "The successful conclusion of the war does not cancel, and will not return the United States to its pre-war status. . . . It is clear even now that our armed forces in the postwar period must be numbered in the millions and thus present a totally different problem."

"The USO was formed to serve a temporary need, it neither seeks nor shirks any specific responsibility, but the permanent responsibility it did assume in 1941 will have to be discharged by the end of 1947."

The report concludes with the resolution of the Board of Directors: "USO will complete its wartime, demobilization and reconstruction services December 31, 1947."

The report also states the member agencies of USO which will have peace-time responsibilities in serving the armed forces will appreciate those responsibilities in the light of the future plans of our country for the armed forces and, giving consideration to the future of the USO, will determine in what fashion those responsibilities can best be discharged."

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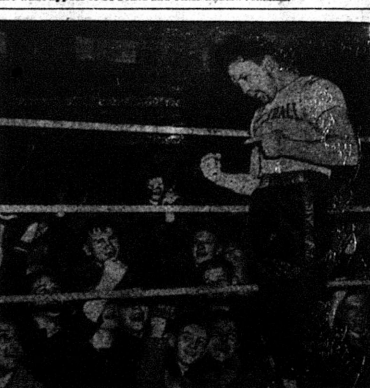

Japs Dig to Unearth Their Crimes



GRIM EVIDENCE of the treatment of Allied prisoners-of-war is being unearthed by a British Committee of the War Crimes Commission in an isolated Singapore area, indicating that every attempt had been made to hide it.
