New Auto Tags To Go On Sale Friday

New 1946 automobile license plates will go on sale tomorrow, Friday, March 1st and must be used after midnight, March 1st, and may be placed on automobiles after March 10th. There will be no extension of time for 1946 tags.

Motorists this year will be issued one tag, white with bright red numerals. The steel shortage prevented return to the two-tag system this year.

Frank M. Quinn, state registrar of motor vehicles, warns that motor bicycists and "scouts" were classified as motor vehicles and require license plates and certificates of title.

Car owners having out-of-state licenses must surrender their foreign title to obtain an Ohio certificate of title before plates can be bought.

In Plymouth they will be sold by Mrs. C. J. Beardsley, who has been selling them for two weeks they will be sold at her home. The last two weeks she will be located at Thompson's Motor Garage at Elm Point. Geo. Berberick states she has two series—WP 751 to WP 999 inclusive, and WQ 51 to WQ 550 inclusive.

Doings In Congress

THIS WEEK CONGRESS wrestles with the extension of the OPA. Chester Bowles, former head of the OPA, made his fortune as the head of an advertising concern. As the head of the OPA, he used the taxpayers' money to advertise his claimed accomplishments. He used the advertiser's license of stretching his imagination. With your money he scattered half truths and erroneous conclusions throughout the nation.

THE NEW OPA HEAD, MR. PORTER, WAS THE PUBLICATION MAN for the Democratic National Committee in 1944. He is well qualified. He will propagandize you with your money, and make you believe that the OPA, with its subsidies and ceilings, kept the cost of living and rentals down. That it saved you from inflation. He will tell you that the OPA is the friend of the farmer, the laborer, and the consumer. These assertions are not correct.

LAST WEEK THERE WERE 176 DELEGATES OF THE NATIONAL DAIRYMEN'S COOPERATIVES IN WASHINGTON. They represented every state in the Union—three million producers of dairy products. Chairman Brandt did not mince words. He and the other speakers demanded that Congress abolish the OPA. They branded the OPA as inefficient and ignorant. They charged that it permitted—it did not participate in—black markets.

WE ALL KNOW THAT THE OPA BUNGLED THE PRODUCTION OF lumber and building material so that there are no homes to be had, and no material with which to build. It bungled the production of lumber so that it fell from thirty-six billion board feet a year to less than twenty-six billion. That is why rents are so high.

WE KNOW THAT THE OPA AND WFA BUNGLED YOU OUT OF SUGAR. It muddled the production of dairy products so that dairy herds are being sold by the thousands. It put a ceiling on butter but not on cream. Now creameries find it more profitable to sell the cream than to churn it into butter.

WE KNOW THAT THE OPA'S INTERFERENCE WITH THE PRODUCTION OF TEXTILES has made it impossible for the farmer or laborer to buy a pair of overalls. It has driven everyday working garments for miles overseas. The trouble with the OPA bureaucrats is that they do not know that they do not know everything. Whenever you get an individual that is dumb and dictatorial he becomes dangerous to your welfare.

I SUGGEST THAT THE OPA BE ABOLISHED AND ITS USEFUL FUNCTIONS transferred to the Department of Agriculture and the Federal Trade Commission—that price controls be placed upon competition substituted wherever possible. Let us get back to common sense. Let us refuse to believe any bureaucrat that tells us that we do not know enough to take care of ourselves. I am satisfied that just as long as we have an OPA, there will be inflation and a shortage of goods.

Drive For Red Cross Begins

Mrs. Mabel McFadden, local chairman of the Red Cross campaign due to get under way Friday simultaneously with the nationwide drive, announces her corps of volunteer workers.

These workers have previously given their time and efforts to former drives and it is hoped that everyone in Plymouth will consider it their own duty and responsibility to see that their donations are turned into the proper channels, in case you are missed, or are not at home when the worker calls.

Richland county's goal is \$64,200 with Mansfield endeavoring to raise \$46,185; \$11,015 in Shelby and \$5,000 in the townships and villages. The national drive is scheduled to close March 31 but with good cooperation the drive can be accomplished sooner.

In smaller quantities the ceilings are: \$1.85 half gallon; 9c cents a quart, and 4c cents a pint. The ceiling price in stores will be slightly higher than the direct sales figure.

PENNY WISE AND POUND FOOLISH

As far as we can see, the General Motors workers lost the strike some time ago.

The terms of settlement may be important to the union—but as for the workers, they have already lost an average of almost \$700 by not working for three months. Although their hourly pay rate will be higher in the future, it will take them at least two years to get back the money they sacrificed while striking.

As for that penny-an-hour difference between General Motors' offer and the union's demand, which kept the strike going for several weeks, any G. M. worker must have realized that he was taking it on the chin during that period. For simple arithmetic shows that for each day the strike was delayed over the penny difference, it would take a worker six months to make it up.

FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS

No better example of the dependence of people upon one another and upon small groups has been evidenced recently than the shut-down of New York, the world's greatest city, due to a strike by several thousand tug boat workers. A poet many years ago wrote: "Never send to know for whom the bells toll; it tolls for you." That phrase now has a deeper meaning for New Yorkers.

And people everywhere would do well to ponder its meaning. In a world as interdependent, as complex as that of 1946, a little tremor of the earth's surface in the farthest reaches of the globe can have imminent, personal bearing on the lives of all of us.

Never has there been a time when individuals should more bestir themselves to keep informed, to participate in solving the problem of the world's woes.

This Week in Washington

Washington, D. C. (NWNS).—The squabbles within our nation's executive family have resulted in a lot of front page news in recent weeks, the lead story so far being the resignation of Harry Ickes. But in the opinion of some observers here, "You ain't seen nothin' yet." Mr. Ickes' accusations of President Truman's appointments are being made for purely political reasons, or else to give jobs to his cronies, has turned the limelight on the executive department and there are many who feel that a number of recent appointments are not big enough men.

It is hoped, however, that one of the major difficulties facing the President—that of deciding who will be the final authority on price control—has been settled for the time being by the appointment of Chester Bowles, former OPA head, to the post of director of the Office of Economic Stabilization. Mr. Bowles, the government's leading proponent of holding prices in line, will now have the last word on prices. But he must act within the limitations of the President's new wage-price policy which permits price increases not favored by Mr. Bowles.

The "wage-price" policy, which obviously was written to avoid stepping on any more toes than possible, in worded permit limitations which reverses his former stand that wage increases could be given only when they would not result in price increases.

The new policy permits price increases necessary for a business to continue to operate at a

reasonable profit after giving wage increases in keeping with "general pattern" set since 7-3 index. That pattern would indicate that wage increases of 15 to 20 per cent will be permitted under the plan to be paid by the public through price increases.

There has been considerable speculation here, following Mr. Ickes' resignation, as to the political philosophy of the President. Although Ickes started out by following pretty much President Roosevelt's footsteps, and was thus considered a New Dealer, he is pointed out that there is now only one strong advocate of New Dealism left in the cabinet—Secretary of Commerce, Wallinga.

There is no evidence that the President wants to break with the New Deal group, but his appointments indicate that he is trying to lay both ends against the middle in an attempt to keep the peace between the New Deal and anti-New Deal Democrats.

In general, however, his legislative program is designed to follow the New Deal course of making the security of the people a government responsibility. Although there are many "security" bills now in the hands of congress, the one in the forefront at the moment is the Wage-Hour measure approved by the senate committee on education and labor. This bill would increase the present legal minimum wage by 45 per cent, from 40 cents to 58 cents per hour. It also provides for additional increases later on terminating with a minimum wage of 75 cents an hour.

A captain of the English army, serving in our country in the interest of a Liberty loan during the World War, I expressed the truth often met with in his terse comment upon the death of King—"No man is indispensable." So great a man as Moses was not. As soon as he died, Joshua was called to lead—God's providence coincided with the practical in bringing a mighty younger man to the front when the aged Moses had reached the end of his pilgrimage.

Many years afterward, when Joshua himself was well stricken in years, the promise was made as a younger man were repeated, and with reason, for the Israelites had not entirely possessed the land of Canaan.

It was not an arbitrary thing that the remnants of the nation in the midst of Israel should be driven out. At intervals throughout the history of the Israelites the paganism of surrounding nations proved a snare to them. In the beginning of the conquest it had seemed the wise if stern course that all the natives should be driven out that the last vestige of paganism be removed.

So in the close of the lesson text we find a warning against any compromise whatsoever with heathendom and the solemn injunction to cleave unto Jehovah, who had driven out "great and strong" before them, and would still empower a man of them to "chase a thousand."

Veteran's Question Box

Ed. Note: This newspaper has arranged with the Washington Bureau of the United States War Relocation Authority to answer questions pertaining to war veterans and widows. These questions will be answered in this column if addressed as above. No replies can be made by mail, but this paper will print answers to all questions received.

Q. I am a discharged soldier and trying to get the GI loan. I first tried to get it by loan, but was advised to buy a farm. They said they weren't loaning money for farms as land had gone too high. I tried again for the sheep loan and they said I had to own a farm first. I know lots of boys getting this loan to buy farms. How can I get this loan and do I have to get it at this bank?—E. A. G., Alamosa, Colo.

A. There are many GIs in your shoes. Under the present regulations, you may go to any bank, building and loan or other lending institution which is making the GI loans. It is up to the lending institution to approve the loan. If it does, then the Veterans Administration will guarantee the loan on homes or farms up to 50 per cent of the loan or up to \$4,000. On business loans, the guarantee only goes up to \$2,000. You must first obtain a certificate of eligibility which is a summary of your service record. This is countersigned and submitted to the U. S. A. by the lender. The same provisions apply in the purchase of either a farm or livestock and then the law provides the lender consider these two things: (1) that the ability and experience of the veteran and nature of the proposed operation.

Q. In February, 1945, I enlisted in the WAACs, served six months, given an honorable discharge. Was told when enlisting we would have all benefits of G.I.'s. I understand the government says we have no benefits, hospital, sickness, bonus, etc. Which is correct?—B. M. Plattville, Colo.

A. The Veterans' administration says those who served in the WAACs are entitled only to hospitalization and burial allowance.

With 400 brick and tile plants closed, it took 6 months for OPA to adjust prices. Now an additional 125 plants have opened and production is up 35%.

Clay sewer pipe, cast iron soil pipe and gypsum board manufacturers have experienced a similar OPA delay in the granting of price adjustments to make increased production possible.

No amount of juggling with an insufficient supply will produce a single home more than can be built with material available.

The OPA can hardly hold present price ceilings when it has no control over volume of employment, labor wage rates, cashing of government bonds, and installment or credit expansion—BUT THE OPA CAN ACT AS A BLOCK TO REALISTIC WARTIME PRICE CEILINGS.

Unblock the production of materials caused by unrealistic wartime price controls and the building industry will build enough homes for veterans and all Americans!

Any government program that does not FIRST remove the obstacles blocking production of materials will simply add additional difficulties to the problem facing the building industry.

Local Seaman May Witness Atomic Bombing Experiment
Quentin Ream, 5 1/2 years, a crew member of the El Dorado, may get a chance to witness the experimental Atomic Bombing scheduled to take place in May, if he doesn't receive his discharge prior to that time.

The following article taken from the San Diego Daily Journal mentions both the Shangri-La and the El Dorado in the coming experiment.

SHANGRI-LA TO LAUNCH ATOM BOMBING
The 28,000-ton carrier Shangri-La will transport and launch the fighter planes that will drop the atom bombs in the Navy's May experiment, it was learned today.

The 830-foot carrier will carry the Navy's fighting F6F planes to the Marshall Islands, site of the experiment, following a trip to Norfolk. Now tied up at North Island, the Shangri-La will leave for the East Coast in several days.

The Navy F6F was used first against the Japanese in the summer of 1943, and in the Pacific war was the backbone of the Navy's fighter group. Details of the planes' bomb-carrying equipment were not disclosed.

The Shangri-La has been experimenting for more than a month on trial trips up and down the coast and while the Pacific war was the backbone of the Navy's fighter group.

It also is believed the command ship El Dorado (AGC-11), now anchored near the Coronado ferry, will be used as a control ship in the atomic test.

The El Dorado participated in the two Jima operation with the Marine's Fifth Amphibious Corps and was in occupation of Northern Kyushu.

The Shangri-La returned to San Diego last fall after occupation duty in Tokyo Bay. She previously had launched attacks against the Japanese as part of Task Force 58.

Commissioned in September, 1942, the Shangri-La made her first strike against the Japanese in April, 1945, on Okinawa Daito Jima. She next participated in the Okinawa operation, then hurried fighters and launched attacks against Northern Honshu before the Jap surrender.

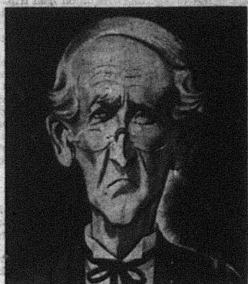

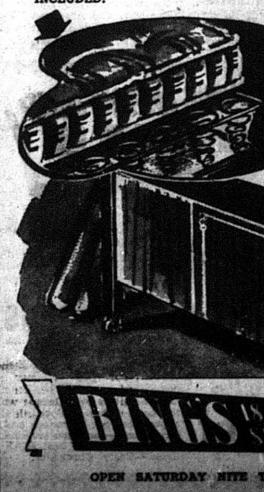
