All Farm Products Must Be Listed

C. Emory Glander, state tax commissioner, has sent the following letter to County Auditor Kent H. Woodward in the matter of the controversy over the taxing of certain farm products:

Dear Mr. Woodward: I have been informed that farmers generally in your county have in the past years been listing for personal property tax purposes only that amount of their various grains which they held for sale on tax listing day, and that they have not listed the amount of their various grains which they held on tax listing day for purposes other than sale.

I wish to advise that all agricultural products owned by farmers on tax listing day are required to be returned for taxation whether such products are held for sale or for use.

It is my duty, as Tax Commissioner of the State of Ohio, to require that the provisions of the Ohio Tax Laws be followed by all taxpayers in the filing of their returns, and I, therefore, trust that you as county auditor and as agent of the Tax Commissioner in such matters will demand that all tax returns be filed in strict compliance with the Ohio Law. This is what it said:

"Perpetual motion is considered a perpetual motion, and ought not to be attempted until the sun rises in the West."

But this does not keep people from applying, for the office mails out, on an average, six form letters a week refusing patents on perpetual motion devices. And this has been going on for more than a hundred years. The department feels pretty discouraged about it.

I've been reading an interesting book called "How to Make People Like You," by my friend, Dr. Donald A. Laird. Here are six of his good rules:

1. Keep your promises.
2. Lead a helping hand.
3. Don't boss others.
4. Be truthful.
5. Don't ridicule your acquaintances.
6. Keep your conversation clean.

While reading these rules, have you found one that you don't believe in? And what is a thousand times more important—do you practice them?

The late William H. Woodin, secretary of the treasury under Franklin D. Roosevelt, said in "The Etude" that the vibrations of fine music put a mysterious initiative and resolution into the average person. Good music makes one feel that after all things may be better than they seem. Doings In Congress

There are no homes for many of the returning GIs. There is a housing shortage. Let us get the truth—what is the cause of this shortage? The shortage is caused by a shortage of lumber and building material. There is plenty of money, and plenty of people who would like to build homes for the GIs and others, but they cannot get the material with which to construct them.

There has been an accumulation of building material shortage caused by four years of war—four years of destruction. In the beginning the Army took practically all of the lumber, and stopped the government of other building material for war implements.

But that is not the only cause of the shortage. The war is over. The continued shortage in building material, since the war ended, has been caused by the blundering of the OPA. The direct cause of the blundering is the falling off of lumber and building material production.

Congress is now considering a new housing bill. This bill in that it improves the situation, will make it worse. If we would remove all price restriction and give the unrestricted "go ahead" sign to the producers, then there would soon be enough lumber and other building material to construct homes for the GIs.

If Congress had the courage to put an end to the stupidity and ignorance of the OPA bureaucrats, then honest competition would soon bring the price down far below what it is today. Anyone familiar with the facts will have to admit that due to the OPA's interference with production, rentals and prices of homes have really skyrocketed.

The time has come for the American people to wake up to the cancerous growth of bureaucracy and regimentation that is fastening itself upon the nation. The time has come for the American people to realize that the bottleneck of all shortages is in the Executive Department at Washington. These departments are in the control of bureaucrats that either deliberately or unwittingly are destroying our Government by creating shortages—confusion.

These bureaucrats with an inferior foreign complex are now busy trying, by deception and bribery, to get school children, parent-teachers associations and the American people. They would convince us that more regimentation will produce more goods. This has come to the attention of American people to get to work and produce. That is the only remedy.

The truth is that the OPA and a number of other bureaus here should be liquidated, and their useful functions turned over to the Department of Agriculture and the Federal Trade Commission, with instructions to liquidate and wind them up gradually. The sooner this is done, the sooner will the GIs and others get homes.

The white wings of the dove of peace are taking on a darker color. Russia is performing worse than "Peck's bad boy." She is arrogant, and still grabbing other nations' property, and liquidating other nations' people. Then, Great Britain, the perpetual beggar, the eternal manipulator of war, is not far behind Russia. Her performance in Indonesia and Egypt is on a par with Joe's performance.

Now Secretary Byrnes speaks up and says that we will go to war to defend the United Nations Charter—not much to fight over. So far the UNO has not protected either against Great Britain's theft and liquidation, nor against Russia's. Stettinius has not raised his voice in behalf of justice and decency. He has become the great appeaser—he has in fact put our stamp of approval upon liquidation and theft.

Our President should make our nation's position clear. He should proclaim to the world that we will no longer give our approval to any nation bent upon loot and liquidation. He should proclaim that all the vanquished nations must be allowed to again establish their own forms of government without interference. That is the only road to peace—that is the Atlantic Charter.

Mr. Churchill, the British politician, is now fomenting World War III. He forgets that he helped build the Hitler war machine. Now that he was able to get us to annihilate Hitler for him, he wants us to take on his former pal, Joe Stalin. Does he want another \$20,000,000,000 lend-lease and again have our boys do most of the fighting? If he does, we must both capitalists, imperialists, Churchill and Stalin, wash their hands of other nations' property and people. If we do this, all the other nations will join us—and public opinion will prevent World War III. Let the world stop hating, stealing and liquidating. Let each nation respect the rights of the other nations. Let us follow the slogan "One nation's liberty ends where another nation's begins."

Mr. Churchill asked for a military alliance. The same game his nation has worked in fomenting war over a hundred years. Mr. Churchill is a past master at that game. However, let us assure him that the only alliance the American people will accept is that his government first relinquish its grip upon its crumbling empire, and then ask to be admitted as the forty-ninth state in our Union.

Then since we have been playing the Santa Claus and fighting and paying for Britain's wars, we may be willing to accept her as the forty-ninth state—but we will never consent to become the tail end of her crumbling empire. The sooner Mr. Churchill gets that message, the better for the United States of America.

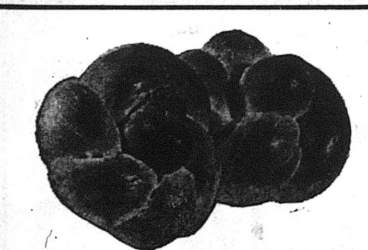

**NEW FIRE TRUCK

Lesson for March 12: Ruth 1:8-17.

The lesson tells of the everyday life of a people, but it also gives us a lesson in the love of two women for each other, of two who sustained a relation often ridiculed.

After the death of her husband and of her two sons in the land of Moab, whither her family had removed, in time of famine, Naomi determined to return to her old home in Bethlehem. Her two daughters-in-law went with her to the border of the country. There Naomi begged them to turn back to their own people; Orpah kissed Naomi and in tears turned back, but Ruth clung to her mother-in-law and would not return.

The two reached Bethlehem at the time of the barley harvest, and the industrious young woman at once put aside her pride and went to work with the poor, gleaners in the field of Boaz. There the wealthy owner saw her and ere long the bachelor, having bought a field to which Ruth would follow, made the young Moabitess his wife. Some condemn the methods of Ruth and Naomi, but their method succeeded. And evidently the marriage was a happy one.

Thus did one of foreign birth come into the ancestry of our Lord. Grandmother of a great king, Ruth was infinitely more — the ancestress of Jesus Christ. It was fitting that he who came to seek all men had gentle blood in his veins. And let us treasure the simple and wholesome things of the everyday for out of such came our Lord himself.

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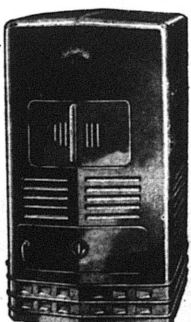

Rites Held For Beloved Citizen

Last Tuesday marked the passing of one of Shiloh's oldest and most revered residents, William H. Miller.

Mr. Miller, son of Daniel and Magdalene Miller, pioneers of Richland county and who settled here in 1842, was born on an 80-acre farm northwest of here, in the days when the county was mostly forest.

The Millers came with a colony from Pennsylvania and they all settled in the northern part of the county. Back in Pennsylvania, three Miller boys had married three Shaffer girls and a Miller girl had married a Shaffer boy. They all banded together to make the long trek to the Ohio wilderness to establish homes.

Although born on a farm outside of Shiloh, Mr. Miller left in his early years to move into Shiloh and become a stone mason and plasterer. He had been from active work about fifteen years ago.

Mr. Miller's father was 90 and his mother 84 when they died. Of the nine Miller children, two are still living. They are Mrs. Sarah Swineford, 91, of Olivesburg, and Mrs. Amanda Plotts, 89, who lives here in Shiloh. Mr. Miller's wife, Sarah Elizabeth Baldwin Miller, died in 1909.

Mr. Miller had been confined to his home for many years, because of his blindness. He made his home with his daughter, Grace, of this place. His passing brought sadness into many hearts and the whole community feels the loss of this old resident.
