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DEMOCRACY ON EXHIBIT

REPRESENTATIVES from nations throughout the world are gathering in New York City for the meeting of the United Nations organization's security council.

The presence of these men in our country would seem a rare opportunity to put on a thrilling exhibition of democracy at work—an exhibit which would leave them with a lasting impression that democracy is the right answer to the problem of the world.

But instead, we fear that this cosmopolitan audience, as it studies our country today, will simply see the same old show it is sick and tired of seeing in the world theaters—just another exhibit of discontent, struggle, strikes, government bumbling, class warfare, racial prejudice, widespread crime and political corruption.

EAT LESS, OR GROW MORE?

MOST Americans are in sympathy with the idea of our nation doing all it can to help feed less fortunate people throughout the world. If necessary, we would be willing to eat a lot less than we did during wartime in order to ship more food to millions of people who are on the point of starvation.

But we wonder if the "eat less" plan is going to do as much to solve this problem as would a "grow more" program.

During the war—in spite of great shortages of equipment and of farm help—our farmers managed to break all records for production.

Unfortunately, however, the shortage of farm equipment continues to be a major farm problem. If our government really wants to do all it can to supply food to the world, it should do a lot more than it has done so far to wipe out the bottlenecks, labor difficulties, and price problems which are delaying the production of farm machines.

DEFEAT THAT WORRY BUG

WILLIAM H. MEADOWCROFT, who was private secretary to Thomas A. Edison for a fifth of a century, said he never saw Edison worry. Work? Yes. Worry? No.

Here are five rules to lessen your worry, to help you conquer this mental monster.

Rule 1. Make a decision. Most worry is caused by indecision. Worry flourishes and corrodes when you don't know what you want to do in face of a given situation, and you go over and over your problem ceaselessly. Once you have determined on a course of action, your worry will lessen.

Rule 2. Do not make the mistake of never expecting to make a mistake. You won't always make the right decisions. It is much better that your decision lead you to a poor solution than that you make no decision at all.

Rule 3. Don't go around talking about your worries. If you do, you will magnify them in your own mind—and the people will cross the street to avoid meeting you and listening to your tale of woe.

Rule 4. Decide what you thought ends and why you begin. Worriers never do any real thinking—all they do is worrying. Thinking is constructive. Worrying is destructive.

Rule 5. Quit thinking about mistakes you have made in the past. Don't harass yourself with constant reproaches. Sure, you have made mistakes. Who hasn't? The only thing that matters is your batting average. Do not let fear of past mistakes make you dread decisions on present situations. Bury the past. After you have once made a decision, don't keep going back and wondering whether it is wise.

Doings In Congress

STRANGE THINGS are taking place in this nation. Mr. Churchill has come into this country to promulgate war against Russia. He has taken it upon himself to insult Soviet Russia in the presence of the President of the United States. In the presence of our President he suggested a military alliance against Russia. This was not only bad taste, but a repudiation of the UNO.

WHAT HAPPENED when our Secretary of State Byrnes went into China and in the presence of Chiang Kai Shek suggested a military alliance against Great Britain? Would not that be an act leading to war? Again, if our Secretary of State went to Russia and in the presence of Stalin suggested a military alliance against Great Britain or China, would not that be an unfriendly act—would it not be an act leading to war?

Unfortunately, the President sat on the platform at Fulton, Missouri, when Churchill launched his blast at Soviet Russia. Later he talked over the American radio systems with another blast. Is it the purpose of Mr. Churchill to declare war for us on Russia? Our Secretary of State should have given him his passport as an undesirable person.

I PRESUME if we do not join him in his hostility toward Russia, he will again arrange a secret rendezvous somewhere in the Atlantic. He will again ask our President to meet with him. Then there will again be produced another Atlantic Charter—or will it be a Pacific Charter?

The time has come that we demand decency from the former that abuse our patience—to insult our intelligence and endanger our Government? The time has come that foreign war mongers be denied entrance into this country. The time has come for our President to declare that our Government seeks just peace and peace through out the world—not military alliance.

IN PLACE of rebuking Mr. Churchill, Under Secretary of State Dean Acheson actually accepted an invitation to a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria where Churchill was wine and dined by the Anglosophes. But when the laboring people picketed the Waldorf-Astoria, Dean Acheson cancelled his engagement saying that he was otherwise occupied. It is about time it became otherwise occupied, and occupied with the welfare of America and not with the intrigue of foreign nations.

HOW MUCH longer are we going to permit this foreign rubbish to abuse our patience—to insult our intelligence and endanger our Government? The time has come that foreign war mongers be denied entrance into this country. The time has come for our President to declare that our Government seeks just peace and peace through out the world—not military alliance.

The sample of his grain, which was awarded the Annual Philip W. Pillsbury prize for best state wheat, will be entered in competition for national honors against wheat from many other wheat producing states when judging for the national Pillsbury prize is held in Chicago on March 26.

The second best sample of wheat in this state-wide competition was entered by Cyrus Tucker of Shelby, and will also be entered in the national competition.

Both Hale and Tucker have been producers of certified seed grain for many years. The national judging will be under the auspices of a committee of noted agronomists headed by K. E. Beeson of Purdue uni-

versity, representing the International Crop Improvement Association.

The winner of the national Pillsbury prize will receive a trophy, a cash award and all-expense trip to Minneapolis as guest of the donor, Philip W. Pillsbury, president of the flour milling company which bears his family name.

Special awards will be made to those who exhibit outstanding varieties of wheat, in order to encourage further improvement of this important grain throughout the principal wheat producing areas in the United States.

THIS IS RED CROSS MONTH; GIVE... WHAT DOES IT MEAN

In shop windows, on billboards, and on telephone and light poles this month you have noticed placards with only this word on them—"GIVE," and a large red cross beneath the word. Haven't you stopped to consider just what this word means? Webster's dictionary devotes almost a half a page in its dictionary to defining this word. And among his definitions are these: 1. To transfer from one's own possession to that of another, temporarily or permanently; 2. To bestow as a present; 3. To administer; 4. To furnish or supply; 5. To deliver in return for an equivalent—That's Webster's definition. Now let us define the word "give," using Webster's definitions and transferring them:

Let us repeat them for you—THE AMERICAN RED CROSS—an organization started by Clara Barton in 1861. The next year fourteen nations negotiated a treaty which led to the formation of the first societies. The American Red Cross Society was incorporated by the Congress of the United States in 1905, by which act the government practically assumed the right to control its operations; for the law which effected the incorporation designated the first director, which had been established by Clara Barton in 1881. Every dollar given to it must be accounted

for to officials of the government. Many of you have been held back from giving to the Red Cross this year because some of the boys have come home and have been bitter towards this organization. But there are thousands of sailors and marines, who will gladly stand up and defend the Red Cross, in return for the little kindnesses it has bestowed on them.

Our two chairmen of Cass Township, Mrs. Dewey Reynolds and Mrs. Rudy Rader, have told me that the returns thus far on the Red Cross drive are appalling. This is no ones fault, but who the war has touched ever so lightly in comparison with the rest of our allies, are going to sit back and let Europe rebuild Europe. There was quite a large attendance and it was a very attractive and appreciative audience.

This program was sponsored by the Christian Endeavor as a part of their interracial meetings.

Colonel Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney Receiving the Legion of Merit Award from General Carl A. Spaatz



Mr. C. V. Whitney has recently returned to his home at Old Westbury, L. I., after serving in the Army Air Corps as a Colonel since immediately after Pearl Harbor. He volunteered to be on the first mission to bomb Tokyo, which was comprised of only six flying fortresses. This was to have been before the raid by General Doolittle. Unfortunately, the Japanese gained control of the air fields in China from which they planned to take off, and the mission had to be abandoned after they reached India.

Colonel Whitney then spent four months in the China-Burma-India theater. He was later chosen as one of the five officers to start the now famous 9th Air Force under General Lewis Brereton in Egypt. They were the first Americans to go to Cairo and arrived there the day that Rommel broadcast that he was

Marching into Cairo and for the English to vacate. He represented the American Air Force and was with General Montgomery on the desert from the battle of El Alamein across North Africa.

For his work on the desert, and for the planning of many strategic bombing missions he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal in 1944.

For the last two years of the war he was stationed in Washington as Chief of Projects Branch of Plans Division in the Air Force Headquarters. The award of the Legion of Merit which took place on January 25, 1946 was for Colonel Whitney's work on plans for redeployment which he presented at the Cairo conference and which was accepted by the joint Chiefs of Staff. Also for the valuable work he did in establishing the Air Sea Rescue

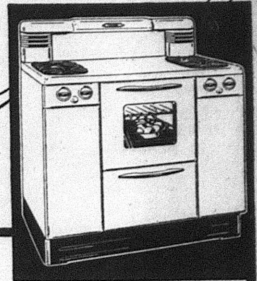
Program which resulted in saving the lives of many of our men.

Colonel Whitney was also in the Pacific theater, having been on the initial assault on Iwo Jima. He was on the island watching the marines scale Mt. Surabachi and saw them raise the flag on its summit which is depicted in the now famous photograph.

He now plans an expansion program on his farm in Old Westbury and in the spring will bring many of his prize winning Aberdeen Angus cattle there for breeding and show purposes. These cattle belong to the Whitney stable.

A People Gains National Consciousness
Lesson for March 24; 1 Samuel 7: 1-8, 13-15.

Memory Selection: Jeremiah 7: 23. When Dagon fell on his face before the ark of the covenant of the most high God and the Philistines suffered many ills, the ark was returned into Israel (1 Samuel 4, 5, 6). After a brief time at Bethshemesh, the ark was taken by the men of Kirjathjearim to the house of Abinadab, where it stayed 20 years. Meanwhile Samuel, grown to manhood, was beginning to exercise a wide influence and was being recognized as a prophet. Abinadab's house had replaced Shiloh as the sanctuary and the presence there of the ark doubtless helped to bring a religious revival. Samuel gathered the people in repentance at Mizpeh. Thus was an armed mobilization as well as a religious meeting. The Philistines at once accepted the challenge of the mobilization and gathered their armies for battle. Crying unto Samuel to cease not to pray for them, the Israelites went to battle and completely routed the Philistines. The lands which had been taken from the Israelites were restored and the "hand of the Lord was against the Philistines all the days of Samuel."

Through these stirring events the Israelites gained a national consciousness which was soon to manifest itself in the demand for a king and the desire for a strong kingdom. As they overcame by returning to God and trusting in him, let the individual look well to his own future by trusting his life to the heavenly Father.
