DISTRIBUTE FEES FROM AUTO LICENSE

The third distribution of 1945 vehicle registration fees to registration districts in Ohio's counties was announced today by State Highway Director Perry T. Ford. The distribution will total \$2,312,100. Warrants were forwarded to county auditors Wednesday.

Director Ford also said today that the department hopes to distribute 1946 license plate fees in the latter part of April.

First distribution of motor vehicle registration fees for 1945 was made by the Highway Department April 25, 1945. It totaled \$9,185,474. The second, totaling \$5,105,892, was made last July 2. In addition, the five per cent equalization fund was distributed last Oct. 25. It totaled \$688,000, each county receiving \$11,000.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS AVAILABLE TO SERVICE MEN AT NORWALK

The Huron County Board of Elections announced today that the primary ballots for the primary election to be held May 7th will now be available at the office in the Court House, Norwalk, Ohio, for members of the armed forces. As, in the past, if the individual should be home on furlough, he may come to the office and vote. If he is away, he may secure ballots either by having some relative apply for them or by sending by letter direct to the board for them.

The board wants that it be necessary for them to know the party to which the individual belongs.

AIRPORTS GET OFFICIAL "OK"

WILLARD AND BUCYRUS GIVEN PERMISSION TO TRAIN VETS UNDER GI BILL.

Two area airports in Willard and Bucyrus, have been approved by state aviation groups and the Veterans Administration as training fields for executive men under the GI Bill of Rights.

At Willard, Kenneth Heisler, owner of the Willard Airport, has been given approval of the state board of education, the Ohio Aviation board and the Veterans administration.

Heisler announces that training will start as soon as hours suitable to the convenience of the students, can be worked out.

Maurice Griffin, manager of the Bucyrus airport, has announced that he has been approved to conduct both pilot and instructor classes. Two such classes will start April 15, Griffin announces.

Veterans entering the pilot's division will be given 50 hours of training and those entering the instructors' class will be given 100 hours. Those entering the latter class must hold a commercial license.

Eighteen have already enrolled at Bucyrus, Griffin announces.

County To Benefit By Money Spent On Rural Repairs

Expenditures totaling more than \$1,674,000 will be made in the next few years by home owners on farms and in small communities of Richland County to improve present electric service and home plumbing.

These outlays will mean additional income to practically every local business and will finance additional work, bathroom improvements and new electrical equipment for the county's 5,786 farm and rural homes already served with electricity, according to a study released by the Title Council of America.

Introduction of running water, installation of tiled bathrooms and replacement of out-dated plumbing fixtures head the list of most wanted farm home features, D. P. Forest, chairman of the Council's Residential Construction Committee, revealed.

In five farm families throughout the nation plan bathroom improvements, he said.

Additional wiring is needed in practically every farm home with electricity, according to the study. A huge market likewise exists for milking machines, pumps, baby chicks, brooders and other equipment.

Expenditures in the county are part of a \$136,750,000 program to be undertaken by Ohio farm and rural home owners in the next five years, the study revealed. An estimated \$2,294,900,000 of similar improvements to present electric service will be spent in the nation during that time.

H. H. Fackler, state chairman, Ohio Marketing Quota Producers Association, and other members, will be present. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the withholding of farm products from regular channels of distribution.

Fackler, Rolla Myers, of Attica, Gilbert April of Castalia, and H. Jewett of Portsmouth, were in Washington last week where they appeared before the Senate Agriculture Committee. Commissioners of Agriculture of several States, also appeared before the committee, and many of the witnesses asked the elimination of OPA from all phases of agriculture as well as doing away with farm subsidies of every kind.

The meeting is one that should be interesting to every farmer, the farmers and businessmen in this section are invited to listen in and partake of the discussions.

NAMED COUNTY CROP ADJUSTER

WILSON TAYLOR TO HANDLE LOSS REPORTS FOR FARMERS UNDER INSURANCE PLAN.

Wilson Taylor, Shiloh, R. D. 1, has been named crop insurance adjuster for the federal crop loan insurance corporation in Richland county, it is announced.

Taylor, a farmer most of his life, will work with the other farmers in the county in helping them adjust their wheat losses when their crop is insured.

If the wheat crop is insured under federal all-risk insurance, and it becomes apparent that it may not pay to leave it stand, the grower must notify the county AAA office so that the condition of the crop can be appraised by Taylor before it is disked or plowed up.

Guy L. Taylor, county AAA chairman, said if the crop is appraised as a total loss, the insured will be paid at the rate of 50 per cent of the insured production, as the operator saves the cost of harvesting and has the land available for another crop.

Applications for crop insurance on the 1947, 1948 and 1949 wheat crops can now be made at the county AAA office, Taylor said.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C. (WNWS).—Our problems with Russia have been shadowed all other issues in the capital ever since Winston Churchill cited what he believes are the dangers of Russian aggression and called for a military alliance between the United States and Great Britain.

Until then the word "war" was not mentioned except in hush-hush conversations, but now you hear it on all sides. That must mean responsible government officials predict war or expect war, but they have decided that the causes of friction between Russia and our country must be openly discussed. General opinion seems to be that Russia will work with the other nations and hold her non-aggression agreements when we call her bluff, but not before.

It seems to be the opinion of state department officials that Russia is bluffing—that she is going to carry on an expansion program if she can get away with it, but will back down quickly if it comes to a showdown. Those who know conditions in Russia say that Russia is in no position to fight a major war, and that Russia would not consider war as a means of carrying out her aims.

But the subject is expected to be an extremely touchy one for months to come and will definitely influence legislation now before Congress. For one thing, congress is now almost unanimously against sharing the secrets of the atomic bomb where-as a few months ago there were many congressmen who favored

this plan. It is also expected, because of the war talk, that selective training will be continued and major efforts will be made to strengthen our armed forces. Legislation for compulsory military training will also be encouraged by present conditions.

Settlement of several of the nation's biggest strikes, including that of General Motors, has led Secretary of Labor Schwelb back to predict that we will soon have a long period of labor peace. Indications are that there will be less strikes and shorter ones from now on, but there are still many major ones being threatened. However, with a new settlement formula, based on increases of 14% per year, it appears likely that most strikes can now be settled quickly by both sides agreeing to that figure. But there is a real danger that they will not stay settled—that there may be a new epidemic of strikes if next winter when production is on a full scale basis and industry's profits begin to rise.

Labor leaders have given in on the 1945 cent figure, which they consider a good insurance. It is realized that peacetime production has hardly started, but they haven't dropped their goal of 30 per cent increase.

Even if we do have a period of labor peace, it will probably be more than a year before ample supplies of many needed products are available to the public. Astonishing production is expected to get going rapidly.

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Doings in Congress

WHO WON THE STRIKE?

WHO won the General Motors strike? Labor leaders claim a victory, having won an 18½c per hour raise for their members. But statisticians figure that it will take the average GM worker over five years, with his extra pay, to replace the money lost during four months of striking.

General Motors stockholders probably feel that they won a victory to the extent that the settlement was made at a cost of approximately one-half of the union's original demand. But unless prices of cars are increased to take care of increased labor costs, the stockholders are due for a major reduction in profits.

Prices will be increased—but the bulge in the inflation line will not be nearly as great as it would have been if General Motors had settled the strike months ago by giving in to labor's demands.

VICTORY GARDENS

DURING the war a lot of us who never went in for gardening before discovered that was an interesting and profitable pastime.

But as far as the food supply is concerned, the war has ended yet. In fact, because of the necessity of feeding hungry victims throughout the world, our domestic food supply is apt to be less this year.

Thus the need for Victory Gardens is perhaps greater than ever before. We can assume that there will be more such gardens than before the war because of the large number of families who have learned to like gardening and are looking forward to having another garden this year.

When making that decision of whether or not to have a garden each American family should consider that it may mean the difference between life and death to a family in war-torn Europe.

INCREASE BUSINESS BY TELEPHONE

THIS is the way that Paul Giffin, manager of the Sunrise Coal company, Richmond Hill, New York, cut down the expense of operation and at the same time increased his business.

He found that sending solicitors from door to door trying to sell his coal was too expensive, so he worked out a way which is an outstanding success. He conceived the idea that if a telephone approach could be made in the right way it would bring business. Other coal men told him it couldn't be done; discouraged him. But he had ideas of his own.

A carefully prepared list is used. That is, they know the possible customer uses coal and not oil. Then the girl calls but she is not expected to make a sale. Experience has shown that it takes an average of three calls to close a sale. The first call is a "get acquainted." She gets the customer's name right, and impresses the customer with her own name.

On the second call she says, "Do you remember Miss Penny at the Sunrise?" She explains the budget plan again. On the third call she mentions the plan again. By this time she is on a friendly basis with the customer and probably makes a sale. Sometimes the customer has become so interested she comes to the office and asks to meet Miss Penny in person.

In one day a girl can make from 135 to 150 calls, working six hours, with an hour for lunch.

I asked Mr. Giffin what he thought was the secret of getting orders over the telephone and he said, "The personality of the solicitor. It's the quickest and surest personality test in the world."

Here's another important point, he said: "Percentage will win." In other words if a girl will make a certain number of calls in a day she will get a certain number of orders. He said this was mathematical, not chance.

VETERANS' QUESTION BOX

Ed. Note: This newspaper has arranged with the Washington Bureau of National Weekly Newspaper Service, 1000 K St., N.W., Washington 6, D. C., to answer questions pertaining to veterans and veterans. These questions will be answered in this column if addressed as above. No replies can be made by mail, but this paper will print answers to all questions received.

Q. Is each veteran of World War I entitled to a pension, or has any provision been made with reference to same? Does the pension apply only to disabled veterans drawing disability pensions at the time of their death, or to all the veterans of World War I?—Mrs. F. H. Omaha, Neb.

A. Only veterans of World War I who were disabled for service or non-service connected draw pensions. All World War I veterans were awarded a bonus. Widows of veterans are entitled to a pension under certain conditions.

Q. Can you tell me the whereabouts of a close friend whose last address was Medical detachment, 133rd General Hospital?—Miss B. J. C., Englewood, Calif.

A. The war department says the 133rd General Hospital is in the European theater and is scheduled to return home soon.

Q. I would like to know the whereabouts of a friend of mine in the navy. He was called back to duty from the naval hospital in Glenwood Springs, Colo., some time in October, 1945. E. F., Denver, Colo.

A. Suggest you write to the Bureau of Enlisted Personnel, Department of War, Washington 25, D. C.

Q. I would like to know how soon the 328th Reinforcement

company, 3rd Reinforcement depot, would be sent home. My husband is with that depot.—Mrs. B. L. S., Hutchinson, Kan.

A. We take it you refer to the 328th Replacement company. This unit is stationed at Marburg, Germany. If your husband has had 2½ years of service, he likely will be home by May 1.

Q. My husband is in Belgium with the 82nd Airborne Base depot, Company A. He has 54 points. Can you tell me when he will return to the U. S. A.?—Mrs. D. P. R., Thomasville, N. C.

A. If your husband had 54 points as of September 2, 1945, he should return home on his way home by April 30. The same answer holds true for the husband of Mrs. J. C., Earlsmart, Calif., and for the husband of Mrs. F. C., Cincinnati, Ohio.

Q. My son was sent to China sometime in the early fall. I have not heard from him since the first part of October. Can you give me any information as to where he is at the present time or other information pertaining to his company and their duties? He is with Company E, 5th Marine, 1st Marine Division.—Mrs. E. A., Grady, Colo.

A. If he is still with his Company E he is either at Tsin Tsin or Feiping, China, or the 1st Marine is on duty in those two towns. Marine headquarters has no information on when the division will return home.

Q. Can you tell me where my brother is? He is with 350th harbor craft, APO 828.—Mrs. E. A.

A. The 350th harbor craft arrived in New York harbor December 1, 1945.

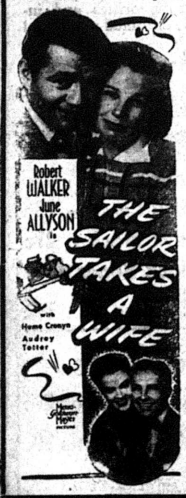

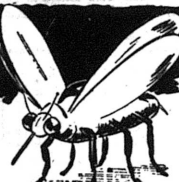

Dr. and Mrs. C. O. Butler and daughter Mary Ann, journeyed to Huron, Sunday, to see "Huron's new school house. We talked to Dr. Butler, Tuesday, and had him give us an idea of what it is like. This is what we found out:

"This new school house at Huron is built at a cost of \$15,000 for the building, and \$35,000 for the equipment. It is built entirely of Portland cement at an approximate cost of 31¢ per cubic foot. It is entirely fireproof throughout, and has an air-conditioned type of heating. It has indirect lighting, and contains a large quantity of glass brick. Dr. Butler says it really was a fine building."

Although Huron has a school attendance of about five times our school census, still these figures can give us a pretty good idea of what a new school of our own would cost. It's something the people of Shiloh should think about, consider and question. A new school would certainly be an asset to the community. Especially when you stop to consider that your children spend eight hours a day, and five days a week for nine months out of a year, in a school house. Plus all

your extra-curricular activities. Give it a little thought, won't you?
