Last rites for Mrs. Edna Huffman, 48, wife of Hugh Huffman, prominent Huron county farmer, were held Wednesday afternoon at the Delphi church of which she was a member for many years. The large number of friends and neighbors attending the services, and the many floral offerings exemplified the high esteem in which she was held by the entire community. Rev. Stewart, pastor, officiated. Arrangements were in charge of Fink's funeral home, Williams and burial was made in Greenlawn cemetery, Plymouth.

Mrs. Huffman passed away early Monday morning while regaining consciousness at the Willard Municipal Hospital where she was taken Saturday evening following a tragic auto accident.

Returning to their home in Boughtonville from Willard about five o'clock Saturday afternoon, the car in which Mr. and Mrs. Huffman were riding, was struck at Guinea Corners on Route 61, by a truck driven by John Suhr of Norwalk. The Huffman car received the entire impact of the crash at the front door of the sedan, fatally injuring Mrs. Huffman, who died at the hospital. Mr. Suhr, a well-known Norwalk dealer in home insurance material, resides in Norwalk, and was on his return home, when the mishap occurred.

Mrs. Huffman is survived by her husband, Hugh, and one son, Keith, at home; one brother, Foster Hasinger of Cleveland; and one sister, Mrs. Ruth Snyder of Shiloh.

She was the daughter of Margaret and George Hasinger, of near Shiloh, and at the age of 16, her family moved to near Delphi. After her marriage to Mr. Huffman she continued to make her home in that community, where they have resided for the past thirty years. She was a member of the Farm Women's Club, and was active in its organization and work. The tragic death which removed Mrs. Huffman from her home and community, was felt by all who knew her, and the sympathy of her friends and neighbors extended to the bereaved ones in their loss of wife and mother.

Roy B. Hatch Dies Suddenly

The entire community was shocked Thursday afternoon when word was received that Roy Hatch had died suddenly. It was hard to believe for he had had his lunch with several companions at the restaurant and was not complained of feeling ill. Working at his new house on Woodlawn Ave. later in the afternoon he suddenly became ill and crossed the street to his home where he died following a heart attack.

Mr. Hatch was one of Plymouth's best known citizens having lived here practically all his life. He was well liked and will be greatly missed.

HIS LIFE. Roy BeVier Hatch, youngest child of Frances Conklin Hatch, and Lunan O. Hatch, was born in Steuben, Huron County, Ohio, on July 18, 1885 and passed away suddenly from his earthly life on Thursday afternoon, April 4, 1946, at the age of sixty years, eight months and seventeen days.

In early infancy the family moved to Plymouth, Ohio, where his entire life was spent. He was married to Estella Turk on Dec. 25, 1914. One daughter, Doris June was born to this union.

Mrs. Hatch was a partner in the business firm of Hatch and West. He was by profession an interior decorator and with a skill unsurpassed in his field.

He was unassuming in nature, deeply religious, kind and generous to everyone with whom he came in contact. His family, friends, his work and his God were all in life that he desired.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, a church, his maternal ancestors had assisted in founding. He served as elder of this church for many years and held her interest as such.

His death came as a shock to his entire family leaving those who knew and loved him, a void in their lives which they will miss.

TEAMWORK NEEDED

Recently we watched a number of small boys organizing a baseball game. When they were determining what position each one would play, two of the boys yelled, "Pitcher!" at about the same moment. When the other players decided which of the two had shouted first, the loser walked off the field and said that he wouldn't play.

Somewhat the scene reminded us of Russia walking out of the United Nations council meeting. For Russia has shown, ever since the war ended, that although she would like to participate in the UNO activities, she won't play except under her own terms. Russia's greatest weakness, so far as international relations are concerned, is her apparent ignorance of teamwork. She insists on playing a lone game, whether the other members of the team like it or not.

ON-THE-JOB TRAINING

The Veterans' administration program for on-the-job training is gradually reaching the small towns.

Under this plan, merchants or business men can obtain the help of veterans with the government paying part of the wages. But the plan isn't based on providing employment for veterans, but on training them for good jobs.

To obtain veterans under this plan, the business man must outline a definite training program which he intends to follow. That plan must be approved by the Veterans' administration as one which will equip the veteran for a better job than he would be able to fill without such training. Any considering the plan should keep this in mind—the primary purpose is to help the veteran, not to provide bargain employees.

WHAT MADE DA VINCI GREAT

WHO, in your estimation, is "the most resplendent figure in the history of the human race?" Thomas Craven in his book "Men of Art," awards that exalted title to the illegitimate son of a poor peasant girl and a lawyer of Florence, who gave him parental aid. This son was born exactly 40 years before Columbus discovered America. His name is Leonardo da Vinci.

Leonardo is famous for more diversified gifts than any other man in history. Here is just a partial list of the things he mastered. He founded the science of engineering and geology and the study of anatomy. He mastered geometry, made maps, invented a diving bell and swimming belt. He also invented the military tank, roller bearings, the lowly D. Carnegie wheel barrow, made drawings of airplanes driven by a propeller over four hundred years ago. He invented many kinds of military machines and a cure for seasickness.

But wait, I have not even mentioned the thing for which he is really famous. He painted two immortal pictures that shine across the turbulent centuries like brilliant stars and glorify the treasure house of mankind. Da Vinci's masterpiece, "The Last Supper," is the most famous picture in the world; and his other masterpiece, the "Mona Lisa," hangs upon the walls of the Louvre in Paris where lovers of beauty from every land stand before it each day, enthralled as though it were some holy shrine.

Leonardo da Vinci had several qualities that you and I ought to cultivate:

1. He had infinite patience. For example, he struggled for 16 years to perfect an equestrian statue, and never did finish it because his work was finally destroyed by an invading army.

2. He had great tolerance. "We have no right," he said, "to love or hate anything unless we have a full knowledge of it."

3. He had the ability to hold his temper.

In a real Christian revival the church first goes through the diagnostic stage and receives the healing touch of the Master. The life giving breath of the Holy Spirit, and hears the call of the heavenly Father, to bear fruit on the twigs of the vine, day by day of life. You can feel, see, hear and partake of this fruitage as the revival moves along. We will just look at a few samples. First, all other church meetings and gatherings are voluntarily set aside for the time, and church

folks attend every service of the revival fully believing this to be of supreme importance to every one for the present time. People come early and the front seats are always filled first; this of course is a very great help to the pastor and late comers do not need to disturb the worship.

Second, when such a revival is in progress, people find a new interest in a prayerful study of their Bible, learning about themselves and the divine plan of salvation. The whole church really takes on new life and the spirit of great joy seems to be in the very atmosphere. Many people of our day have never been so happy as during such a meeting. They enjoy such a Christian experience and of course this is a strange language to them.

Third, all the church music shows more real harmony in every way and consecrated talent is freely and gladly offered in 2-

mus. The note of genuine happiness is most clearly felt in this humble and yet victorious song. The many varieties of temperament and disposition will sing, play, pray and testify for their Lord and His saving power with great unity. After the dismissal you will frequently see a crowd of happy young folks gather around the organist and spend some time singing some favorite pieces.

In a cold formal church most of folks find their greatest satisfaction when a short sermonette is finished and they at once rush out of the house, but in the meeting heresopoken of they tarry to meet strangers, exchange their Christian experiences and see if they can find some one they can help.

Fourth, Things that have been borrowed and kept for a long time are hunted up, cleaned up and returned to the owner, together with a heartfelt apology. Old debts, many of which, are legally outlawed because of time, are brought to light and paid in full. Money and many other things that have been covetously stolen when the owner was not looking are returned and real repentance shown. Hard feelings over foolish acts and words are humbly confessed and real friendship established. Selfishness and greed are replaced by self sacrifice and many hard sinners may have been miraculously converted, backsliders reclaimed and believers sanctified wholly.

The young folks are having the time of their life. Most of them had never been converted or known the joy of sins all forgiven. Now they are unashamedly laying the foundation for their whole life. They are learning lessons and finding a line of encouragement only found in such a meeting. Of course there may be some extravagance; and the reason is because the whole matter is alive and what ever you find life there may be some things abnormal, but we do not reject all life for this reason, and beside all this where one may go too far, likely one hundred are on the other extreme and never makes an effort. Jesus is the way, the truth and the life and it is our desire to help folks get on this holy way and stay in its very center until they reach their heavenly home. At the close of such revival many new converts, regardless of age

or profession, are just babes in Christ and it becomes the duty of the pastor and the church alike to see that they get spiritual food and Christian training from the beginning to meet their growing needs.

No wonder this is a time of almost universal joy, when you see young and old, rich and poor in sin, but now coming with entirely changed lives to the house of God with glad hearts and countenance beaming with a heavenly smile and deeds of kindness to every one. Certainly it did cost a lot but we now see and feel that it is worth all it cost and more.

This is what Jesus meant when he said, "Lay up for yourselves treasures in Heaven."

Would you like to see such a revival in your town or community?

Do you believe our people really need such help and encouragement?

Is any one life in any sense depending on your course of action?

"Come now, let us reason together saith the Lord; though your sins be as scarlet they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." Is 1:18.

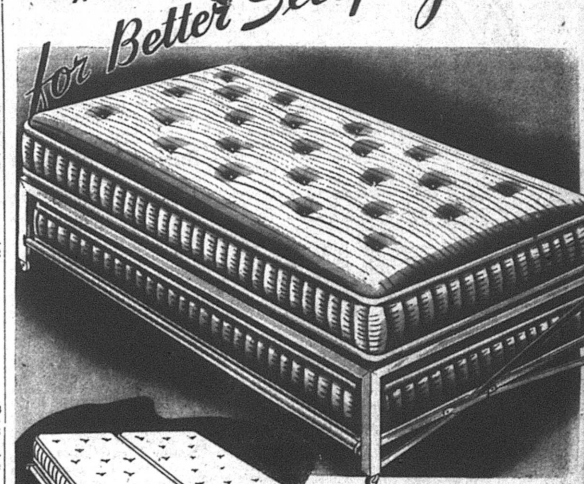

Why We Need A New School

In last weeks paper we told you about the motions that were made at the P. T. A. meeting and a few of the things that were said. This week we'd like to elaborate a little.

To review: these motions were made and passed last week (1) that the school board be requested to investigate thoroughly the school building and either remodel the present one or build a new building; (2) that a special bond issue be made to cover the expense of an adequate building and playgrounds; (3) that there be an increase in the school budget to cover an increase in operating expense.

Townships Buy New Fire Truck

The Officials of Shiloh, Cass and Bloominggrove Townships met in joint session in the Council Chamber, April 9th with Harry Sutphen, representing fire fighting equipment, Columbus, Ohio, and Chas. Scott, Asst. State Fire Marshal for Rural Fire Protection, Columbus, Ohio.

It was agreed by the joint body that a new Fire Pump be purchased with all new equipment, containing an International Truck Chassis, with 500 gallon a minute pump capacity, will carry 500 gallons of water at all times. It will carry an auxiliary pump, that can be carried to a water supply, where the pump can not travel, and pump water into the main pump; it will carry fog nozzles, which is very useful in fighting fires; this pump can fight fires while traveling which is beneficial on grass fires; this truck when delivered will serve all fires in Shiloh, Cass and Bloominggrove Townships.

The name will be Shiloh-Cass-Bloominggrove Fire Association; the directors will be the Mayor, and the president of each township, trustees and the fire chief at Shiloh.

The pump will be housed and manned by the Shiloh volunteer Fire Department, and the old pump will be kept for emergency use.

Clean-up Time Is Set For Shiloh

April 17, 18 and 19 are the dates set for the village to remove rubbish and ashes. If you want your rubbish and ashes hauled put it in a convenient place. Place your cans and rubbish in containers and place along the roadside. Be sure to remove the cans and other rubbish from your ash pile if you wish it hauled by the village. If you wish to haul your own rubbish and cans or ashes you may do so by getting permission from the Farm Bureau office.
