BOXES PLACED IN BUSINESS HOUSES: ASK FOR OPERATION.

Containers to receive money for the fund made their appearance in Plymouth Monday of this week when the illustrated boxes were placed in business places about the city. Plans are going forward to make the campaign which runs officially from the 22nd to the 30th a major one.

Based on ambition plans launched a year ago the local group which takes in the Shelby-Plymouth-Shiloh chapter of the American Cancer Society is seeking \$1000 for its educational program alone. A 16 mm sound projector has been purchased and a film on ways to fight the dread disease were shown there members of the Community Club on Tuesday evening.

The quota assigned Shelby in the Shelby-Plymouth-Shiloh area campaign by the National anti-cancer societies is \$800.00. Of that amount 40 per cent goes into the National Research Foundation, ten per cent goes to the State and fifty per cent stays at home.

M. E. Berkeley, area chairman, and C. L. Beal, treasurer, are hopeful that special donations might be made directly to building up the area fund for equipment and educational program at home. Such contributions can be made directly to either official.

Mrs. E. R. Haines is chairman for the local drive, who states that membership in the cancer fighting organization are \$100. All memberships will be turned in to assist the county to meet its quota. The County's quota is \$15,500, with Mansfield's share \$5000 with the remainder to come from the smaller villages and towns.

## Pilgrims Beat Shiloh, 18 to 1

Last Thursday night, April 11, the Plymouth Pilgrim baseball nine played host to Shiloh. The game was called in the fifth inning due to the cold weather and Plymouth took an 18-1 victory. Nine of the fifteen Shiloh men at bat fell victim to pitcher Fenner and struck out. Shiloh's only run came about in the first inning as Reynolds, the first man up singled to short and took second on an overthrow to first. Reynolds stole third on the first pitch and took home on a passed ball. The next three men struck out. Plymouth's biggest inning was the third inning when each of the nine Pilgrims crossed home plate once before retiring to the field for the ensuing inning. Many of the Plymouth boys fattened their batting averages in those five innings as Surverine got one hit out of two trips. Fenner got two hits out of four trips. Ross got two hits out of three trips and Hampton got three hits out of four trips. The scoring for Plymouth was very unusual as each of the nine men on the lineup crossed home plate twice.

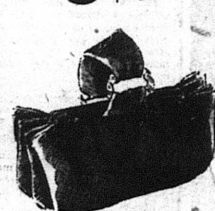

## DOINGS IN CONGRESS

This is OPA week. The resolution for the extension of the OPA will be passed and discussed. We know that the committees are busy with false prop-
