

Improvements At Cemetery

The LaDow addition in Greenlawn cemetery received quite a bit of improvement in the past few weeks, when much shrubbery and trees were planted in the new addition. Jesse LaDow, one of the donors of the six-acre plot, was reported as having made over a \$300 improvement, which included the planting of trees, shrubs, and flowers, according to the plans he had made by his landscaper.

It was revealed at Tuesday night's cemetery board meeting that the Board also purchased \$200 worth of shrubbery and trees from the Crawford Nursery at Bucyrus, and that all of it has been planted in the new addition.

Lot Prices Set
The Board announces the following prices for lots in the new addition as follows:

For an 8-grave lot, \$160, plus \$5 for the perpetual care fund. This makes the total price of \$210 for one 8-grave lot. Non-residents will be charged 50 per cent additional, exclusive of the perpetual care fee.

A price of \$100 for a 4-grave lot has been set for local residents, plus a charge of \$25 for perpetual care. Out-of-town purchasers will be required to pay \$150 for this size lot, plus \$25 for perpetual care.

In Greenlawn Cemetery property lots are selling at \$125 for a 6-grave size, but few choice lots remain in this plot, and it is very likely that within the next few years the new addition will be favored with an increase in purchasers of burial sites.

The Board also discussed briefly the closing of the cemetery on Sundays, but failed to take any action, as it was felt that this measure was not necessary at this time.

Members of the Board were present at Tuesday night's session, including J. W. McIntire, president of the Board, Clarence B. Viner and M. P. Dick, Laurence Ruff, caretaker, was also at the meeting and gave a report on his work.

The cemetery attracts many hundreds of visitors on Memorial Day, and this year it should be in beautiful condition as much work has been done this Spring.

Many Visitors Attend Pre-view of Mansfield Sky Club Held Sunday

MANSFIELD, OHIO—In sharp contrast with typical airport fare, the new service offered by the Mansfield Municipal airport, which has a seating capacity of approximately 385 persons, is the first of its kind as far as airport dining service is concerned. This says Harrington, because the glass enclosed "light deck" of the two-story structure, consisting of glass and metal, has been reserved strictly for members of the flying fraternity—those engaged either directly or indirectly in the aviation industry.

The flight deck is completely encircled by huge plate glass picture windows. The decorative scheme has been carried out in a light and airy style. 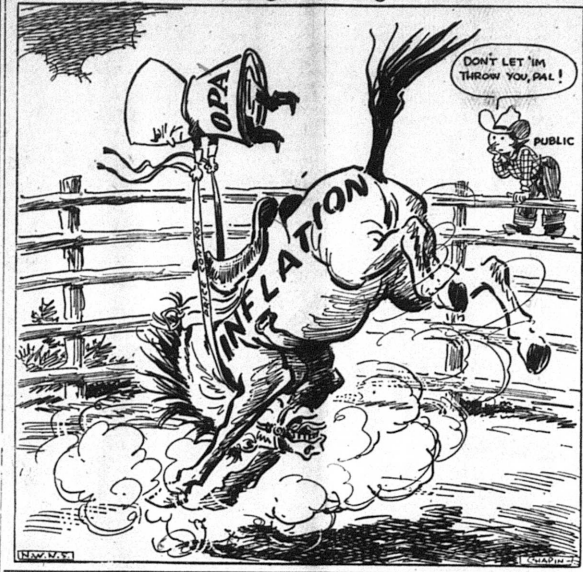
From this vantage point, a sweeping view may be obtained of flying activities at Mansfield's new \$2,000,000 airport.

The entire decorative scheme has been carried out with pleasing effect in the spacious main deck dining room which seats 120 persons. A mural showing two four-engine army bombers in flight decorates one of the ivory tinted walls, and the red-carpeted staircase leading to the second-floor club is hung with a series of glass encased photographs depicting the growth of the airport during its twenty years of operation.

Double doors at one end of the dining room open onto a fully open air terrace outfitted with circular tables and accommodations for sixty-five persons.

SHILOH MAN TO STAND A TRIAL FOR AUTO THEFT.

Alvin W. Guthrie, 29, of Shiloh, R. D. 1, who was accused of stealing a car the same day he was released from the Ohio penitentiary, has been returned to Richland county to stand trial after he was declared found sane at the Lima State hospital.

Food Shortage Bound To Come

If there is any doubt in your mind as to a shortage of food during the coming months, you had better take a different slant on the situation and tighten up your belt. There is bound to be meat and poultry shortages due to the manner in which the government is handling the feed situation. Feed prices are being forced to out-of-bound proportions, as a means of diminishing the meat and poultry supplies of the country. This is plainly revealed in the increases allowed this week on wheat and corn, and also oats, and at the same time John Ganzhorn, manager of the Plymouth Elevator, stated Monday that the price of all kinds of feed advanced \$10.00 per ton on Monday of this week.

Under the new wheat bonus plan of the government, all wheat bought for export shipment must test 58 per cent, or as commonly known as No. 2 grade wheat. It is hard to understand why the government has placed such rigid restriction on wheat for export, when one-third of the wheat last year received at the local elevator tested No. 3 grade. If starving Europe wants bread, No. 3 wheat should be sufficient to fill the bread baskets of any nation.

If the government really wants wheat, why should such stringent regulations prevail as to quality, and why should an elevator be responsible for retested wheat which tests 58 per cent here, and on the early arrival at another destination, the test makes it drop to 56 per cent less than 58 per cent. From the rules and regulations set down for export wheat, there is little likelihood of any great amount of wheat being put on the market from this section.

In fact, under the circumstances no effort is being put forth by the local elevator due to the cost of meeting requirements, and the lack of No. 2 wheat in this territory.

Inasmuch as all wheat sales for export have to pass through the Trade Administration and Commodity Credit Corporation, all wheat on which the old penalty is due, is subject to the penalty tax. As a government bonus, wheat farmers, who opposed the penalty tax, and may have wheat to sell, are withholding it from the market for this reason.

It is the opinion of some local farmers that the government is instituting a shortage program of livestock, poultry and grains so that it may be recalled some time in the fall, probably after election. It is very likely that coal will be rationed, and will also experience a price increase as a result of the present strike.

Wheat in this section, according to some farmers, does not have a bright outlook for a high yield, and the next harvest may occur within the next two or three weeks as experienced Sunday night, there is some fear that damage will be greater than anticipated.

Before the enactment of the government bonus the price of wheat was \$1.77 for No. 2. An advance of 15c was allowed on Monday of this week and the Plymouth Elevator is now paying \$1.92 for No. 2 grade. With the government bonus of 30c per bushel, the price of wheat for export is now bringing \$2.22 per bushel.

Corn, an integral part of most farm crops, has taken a sharp advance. Prior to the enactment of the government was paying a bounty of 30c per 100 pounds. However, this moved little grain, and was taken away, and the price raised 25c, which will no doubt bring in several hundred pounds to the elevator here.

The selling price on No. 3 grade corn before the bonus was offered by the government was \$1.65 per 100 lbs. This week the price advanced 25c, and now corn is bringing \$1.90 per 100 lbs.

Poultry raisers are finding it difficult to secure feed of any kind, and hatcherymen report a big increase in chicks. Despite the fact that some 800,000 men have gone back to the farms in 1945, there is every indication that shortages will continue for some time, and the general are getting tighter more so now than at any time during the war years!

FOOD FOR THE HUNGRY

WHATEVER the reason, government officials charged with the duty of getting wheat to the famine-stricken people of Europe ought to be ashamed of themselves for having failed to meet the small quota set for this relief.

According to figures released by Chester C. Davis, chairman of the President's Famine Emergency committee, exports of wheat and flour are now almost 500,000 tons below expectations.

We don't know the explanation. But we do know that the failure to do our part is not because of the people's unwillingness to sacrifice.

We would like to see less talk about how people must get along with less and more about how the government is going to carry through an adequate plan to get more food to Europe right now.

OPA ARITHMETIC

IT WOULD seem to take pretty simple arithmetic to see that production costs cannot be increased without prices being increased.

Yet the OPA has been stubbornly fighting that fact for many months. And it is because of OPA's unwillingness to see the obvious answer to this arithmetic that practically all of the big manufacturers of the country are crying for OPA's scalp.

We don't want to see retail prices rise. But if we were manufacturing a product at a small profit, if our labor costs were suddenly increased 15% to 20%, and if the cost of our raw materials were increased by more than that, we realize there would be no answer but to raise our prices or go out of business.

It may still be necessary, until supply gets more in line with demand, to have government control some prices and profits, but in no instance should it be permitted to eliminate profits.

HOW TO CONQUER FEAR

IF YOU were told there was a dreadful affliction raging over the land and that it had nine persons out of ten in worse than cancer, tuberculosis.

Well, there is such an affliction and it does have its tentacles around nine persons out of ten. And that monster has a very short name, one of four letters.

Dr. George W. Crite, the famous surgeon of Cleveland, Ohio, said in his book, "The Origin and Nature of Emotions": "Fear is overwhelming. We fear not in our hearts alone, not in our brains alone, not in our viscera alone, but in every organ and tissue."

The important thing is: How can we conquer our fears? Here are rules which will help you. The first was laid down by Ralph Waldo Emerson:

1. Do that which you fear to do. If you are afraid of somebody, walk straight up and talk to him. If you have an angry neighbor who lashes with cat-o-nine-tails' tongue, go out and see him and let him lash. You will live and you'll find your fear of him will vanish.
2. Don't dig up alibis. Don't say, "I'll do that some other time." If you wait, you develop fear.
3. If you owe a man money and he is pressing you, go to see him. The very act of going will lessen your fear phobia. Keep your face to danger; not your back. Walk in, wade in, wallow.
4. Take a chance. Most people are afraid to do anything when they're in a corner, because they're afraid to take a chance. It's better to make a dozen mistakes than to do nothing. Remember Hamlet and the mouse he got into because he sat around bewailing his fate instead of doing something about it.

These rules are far from complete, but they'll set you on the right road.

Doings In Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

The coal strike is rapidly bringing about stagnation of the nation's activities. Every man, woman and child is beginning to feel the effects of the strike. Everyone is looking for a goat to blame. The operators have advertised this as a one man strike. The truth is that this is a strike by the men who mine the coal. I am not discussing who is right or wrong. There must be a solution.

The bulk of our mail is to the effect "Why doesn't Congress stop the strike?" Members of Congress do not care to mine coal. Do you? No law that Congress can pass can make miners work if they refuse. The President has authority to act. He has the power to operate the mines. But he hesitates. He knows that it is not a one man strike. He fears that the miners will also refuse to work for him unless their demands are satisfied.

The President knows that there are not very many people who want to go into the mines and risk their lives mining coal. That is the reason the President has not acted. The President should call in the miners and the operators and give them twenty-four hours to get-together and adjust their differences. Maybe the final solution will be in the Government taking over the coal mines. This situation is serious. A solution must be found. This morning I received a letter from William Green, Presi-

dent of the A. F. of L. He enclosed a letter he had written to John L. Lewis. I quote from the letter:

"During the years thousands of miners' lives have been snuffed out without a moment's warning and in the twinkling of an eye. What other group of American workers pass through such experiences? No one can adequately describe the suffering, bitter anguish and the tragic experience inflicted upon the miners and their wives and children when an unforeseen mine explosion occurs."

"... * * * We are assured we of the American Federation of Labor stand with you, by you and beside you in the noble fight you are making. Justice for the tragic victims of mine explosions and for their dependents is long overdue. The comment has arrived when humanitarian considerations must triumph over greed. The time has come when the callous indifference of the coal operators to the welfare of the mine workers must be overcome."

"The seven million members of the American Federation of Labor will fight with you, will resist the unjust and inhuman considerations which are being made upon you and will insist and demand that the mine workers as free men in a free America shall be accorded the right to mobilize and use their economic strength in order to secure justice, security and protection."

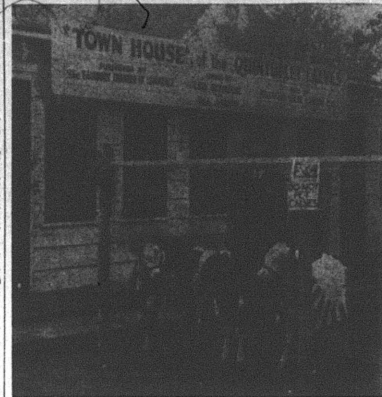

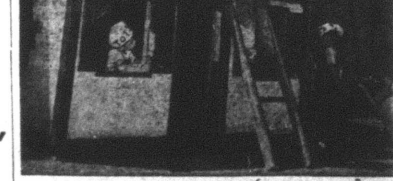

giant mirrored vanity. Separated from the dining room by a merchandise bar is a grill and Brunch-Bar with facilities for serving sandwiches, snacks, and soft drinks. The decorative scheme is mist blue and ivory with red upholstered chrome furniture. Complete soda fountain service is provided and seating at tables will accommodate forty persons. Glass shields the bar from the main kitchen.

An outstanding service feature is an all-electric kitchen from which choice steaks, chops, fowl, and seafood are speedily and successfully prepared by a corps of culinary experts. It is flanked by three service entrances, one to the outside, one to the dining room and another to the grill. A dumb waiter provides transportation to the upstairs club-room service kitchen.

Electric kitchen equipment includes a range, two broilers, a three-unit bake oven, two deep fryers, mixers, peelers, dishwasher, steam table, two 42-cubic foot refrigerators, a 1,000 cubic foot walk-in box, fluorescent lighting, and three exhaust fans, one for the kitchen, and two to provide circulation for the dining rooms.

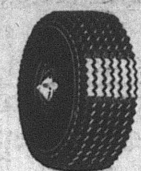
