April showers were few and between in the month just sed. Rainfall of .01 inch or closed. more fell on only six days to-taling 0.82 inch for the month. taling 0.82 inch for the month. This is a deficiency of exactly 2

This is a deficiency of exactly 2 in inches and the driest April in Northern Ohio in 63 years, when State records were first begun. Despite as filling frosts the month was slightly above normal 492 degrees, an excess of 1.6 degrees. The highest was 85 on the 22nd; the lowest 26 on the Bilth and 28th. The last killing frost, however, probably put the innishing touches on fruit buds into already frozen.

The most serious damage, however, may be caused by the extreme drought. Wheat, which made such good progress in March, deteriorated; pastures are drying up and oats are at a standatill.




