Says Bonus Is Black Market

The farm marketing story that had been considered for Wednesday has been indefinitely postponed, but state officials of Ohio Marketing Quota Protest association have the approval of county boards to meet other demands to be formulated and announced soon by the group.

Clinton Anderson, secretary of agriculture, was accused of dealing in the black market following a meeting at Mansfield Monday by H. H. Fackler of Plymouth, state chairman of the Protest Association and chairman from 29 counties at which time the authority was extended to call the move to withhold farm produce from the market.

Fackler also charged the 30c a bushel bonus is being used for corn and wheat to send to foreign lands is unfair to farmers who already sold their grain and to livestock and poultry raisers who were acting on the promise that prices were stabilized.

"Thirty cents bonus is the only method to get around the OPA and want to know why Anderson has any more right than anyone else to deal in the black market," Fackler said.

Hospitalization Plan Is Open To Local Residents

Residents of the Willard and Plymouth areas previously ineligible to join Blue Cross, the non-profit plan for prepayment of hospital care, are to be permitted to join on a community basis according to announcement by Robert C. Jenkins, executive director of Akron Hospital Service, administrators of Blue Cross in five Ohio counties.

Jenkins, in Willard last week to complete details of the Community Enrollment Plan for Blue Cross, pointed out that heretofore members were permitted to enroll only in employee groups. Upward of 1800 Willard area residents now are enrolled in Blue Cross and since 1942 more than \$40,000 in hospital bills has been paid in behalf of these subscribers. Jenkins points out, "Willard has been selected as the first test area for the Community Enrollment Plan because of the unusual interest shown by the Ladies Auxiliary to Willard Hospital, and by other civic-minded Willard residents. In this plan which will bring prepaid hospitalization within the reach of practically everybody."

Mrs. R. D. Beck is chairman of the Willard Community Enrollment Committee. Also serving are Mrs. J. T. Wayland, Mrs. B. C. Lewis, Miss Gertrude Baker and Mr. Harry Jump.

Within a few days a letter and folder with a complete explanation of the Willard Community Enrollment Plan for Blue Cross, along with an applicable blank, will be delivered to every home in the Willard area by the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Additional information will be dispensed by the Township Schools.

Applications for enrollment will be taken by Mr. Harry Jump, 94 W. Maple Street, Willard, who operates the L. N. Benedict Insurance Company. Mr. Jump will not only supply additional details on the plan but handle regular collection payments as well. He is contributing this help as a public service and will receive no compensation for this service other than the actual cost of handling.

Any person may join under the Willard Community Enrollment Plan if in one of the following classifications: (1) Self-employed persons such as farmers, plumbers, painters, doctors, lawyers or dentists; (2) Employees of a firm where there are less than 10 persons employed. Those employed where there are 10 or more persons employed must enroll through the firm; (3) Unemployed or retired.

Residents of the following townships only are eligible to join the Willard Community Enrollment Plan for Blue Cross: New Haven, Sherman, Greenfield, Ripley, Richmond, Norwich and Plymouth townships.

THAT ATOM TEST

WE HAVE heard predictions that the atom bomb test, planned for July, will do everything, from causing a huge tidal wave which will destroy the Pacific coast to bringing an end to the world.

But the experts testifying before the senate naval affairs committee have made it clear that the only things which will be hurt will be the ships on which the bombs are dropped.

After reading the testimony of men who ought to know what will happen, we feel that it will be perfectly safe, on the night of the big event, for the American people to go calmly to bed without even pulling the covers over their heads.

CONTROL BY THE PEOPLE

IN THE final analysis, whether we have all-out inflation or not will probably depend upon the people. More important than what laws we have or don't have will be the question of whether we will be willing to sacrifice buying things we want if prices get too far out of line.

If the public refuses to pay \$2,000 for an ordinarily low-priced automobile, there is no doubt that the price will come down to one the public is willing to pay.

If the majority of us would make up our minds not to be "suckers" and would go on strike when prices got too fantastic, inflation could undoubtedly be kept under control.

DISSATISFACTION LED TO SUCCESS

A FEW years ago a young man working behind a wire cage in a cashier's office became dissatisfied with his job. His name was Harry T. Wright.

He had taken a business course in a night school and had got a job behind the wire cage of an insurance office. And there he was. "And there he was," he thought. He thought he was capable of handling a bigger job. But when he told his department head that, his department head smiled and said, "I've heard that story a thousand times. You go right ahead with your work. You're doing all right."

Young Harry T. Wright decided he was going to get out of that wire cage. But he could not give up his job. Vacation time arrived and he had two weeks to try his wings. He was 22. He got permission from the office manager to solicit life insurance.

He never went into that wire cage again. He had done so well in his first effort that he was made "outside man." In exactly one year from the day he left the wire cage, he had earned \$10,000.

His company gave him a gold medal in 1939 for being the man who had done the most for the institution of life insurance.

He has never made a "cold call." He always telephones in advance for an appointment. More than half of the interviews take place in his office, not in the prospect's office.

Doings in Congress

In order to perpetuate themselves in office, the bureaucracy of the OPA is sending out a continuous false alarm of the "danger of inflation." This is largely done with your—the taxpayers'—money. In the spreading of this propaganda, the OPA is ably assisted by the PAC and the Daily Worker. The time has arrived to silence this falsehood.

We have inflation. We got it when we printed, and put in circulation, \$28,050,000,000 paper money, where we never had over \$5,700,000,000 before. We know that inflation comes, when we

print more yardsticks—more dollars—than are needed to transact the nation's business. We know that high wages, high prices and the high cost of living are the result, not the cause of inflation.

We know that the dollar has only 50¢ purchasing power as compared with the dollar of 1937. We know that this is because we have five times as much money as we had in 1937. The truth is that the price of goods has not increased, but that the value of the dollar has decreased. We have five times as many dollars as we had in 1937, but our wealth

has not increased, but in fact decreased. We even depleted some of our four natural resources—our wealth—during the war.

Scarcity of goods does not cause inflation. If it did, we would have had inflation every time we had one of our natural resources—our farmer's dollar, the wage earner's dollar, and the small businessman's dollar is worth only 50¢ as compared with the 1937 dollar. We know that ultimately the result of inflation must be borne equally by all, and cannot be absorbed by one class or industry alone.

If we want to stop inflation, we will have to stop printing Federal Reserve notes. It is foolish to think that we can continue production of civilian goods at the same rate that we produced war goods and implements. If such a thing were possible, it would be highly undesirable. We

have already depleted many of our natural resources. If we should continue to use our raw materials at the same rate as we did during the war, it would only be a few years before all our natural resources would be depleted. We would then become an exhausted third rate nation.

To continue to exhaust our natural resources—our raw materials in manufacturing goods for other nations, and pay for them with our own taxpayers' money, is not only poor economy, but verges on treason. We are asked to do this so that a few international gangsters, who are more interested in the almighty dollar than in their own country, can become multi-millionaires and multi-billionaires. In addition, we are asked to draft our sons and wreck our nation in order to protect these internationalists' ill gotten goods in foreign countries.

VETERANS' QUESTION BOX

Ed. Note: This newspaper has arranged with the Washington Bureau of National Newspaper Service, 1616 Eye St. N.W., Washington, D.C., to answer questions pertaining to service and veterans. Their replies will be answered in this column if addressed as above. No replies can be made by mail, but this paper will print answers to all questions received.

Q. On January 28, 1946, our son enlisted in the AAF. He would have been 18 March 23, 1946. He was all the help we had and we are past 58. We haven't got an allotment from him as yet. How will we go about getting one? W. and N. E. C. Success, Ark.

A. Allotment for parents is voluntary. If your son has provided for an allotment, it probably has not had time to get to you if he only enlisted in January. Suggest you write your son and be sure he has provided for this allotment.

Q. When will our boy get home? He has been in service 18 months and overseas 15 months. He has three battle stars. He is now in Austria with the occupation forces and is greatly needed on our dairy and grain farms.—Mrs. A. L. W., Saxapahaw, N. C.

A. Unless there are circumstances which would prevent it, your son should be home not later than June 30, according to his point accumulation.

Q. Where can I obtain information in regard to a non-support charge for a 13-year-old boy? This boy's father enlisted in the army. He is married and has another child, age 3. I would like information as to whether he is signed for support of this boy?—Mrs. M. C., Buffalo, N. Y.

A. As to the non-support charge, that is a legal question, so consult your attorney. If you mean, did the father provide an allotment for the boy or his mother, that is a question of fact. Write to the Adjutant General, care Allotment Section, War Department, Washington 25, D. C.

Q. My son re-enlisted in the army air forces in November, 1945. I am a helpless invalid. My husband's health is not good and my daughter has no health at all. As we are not getting assistance from him, would there be any chance for him to get a discharge so he can support us?—Mrs. C. B., Galax, Va.

A. If your son wishes to help in your support he has the privilege of providing for this.

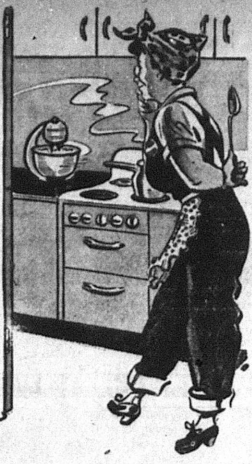

ORDINANCE NO. 132

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT IT IS NECESSARY TO PURCHASE THE MATERIALS FOR AND TO INSTALL A WATER LINE FROM THE SOUTH END OF PLYMOUTH STREET TO THE CORPORATION LINE ON THE SHELBY ROAD. AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO EXPEND MONEY, ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, AND TO ENTER INTO CONTRACTS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE

COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO.

Section 1. That it is hereby deemed and declared necessary to improve and extend the water plant utility by installing a four inch cast iron water line from the South end of Plymouth Street to the corporation line on the Shelby Road, said project including about 2650 feet of excavating about 3 feet, 8 inches deep and 18 inches wide, 2700 feet of 4 inch cast iron water pipe, together with valves, hydrants and connections.

Section 2. That the plans, specifications and estimates for

the proposed improvement are on file in the office of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs.

Section 3. That the entire cost and expense of said improvement is to be paid solely from the Water Fund. Said entire cost of the construction authorized in this ordinance shall not exceed the sum of \$5,000.00.

Section 4. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the Village Clerk, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the purchase, installation and improvement as hereinbefore set forth, and that the Village Clerk and the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs be and they are

hereby directed to open any and all bids submitted pursuant to said advertisement and to enter into contracts with the lowest and best bidder or bidders, as provided by law.

Section 5. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall go into immediate effect. The reason for such necessity is that said line is necessary for fire protection and the health of the citizens of the village.

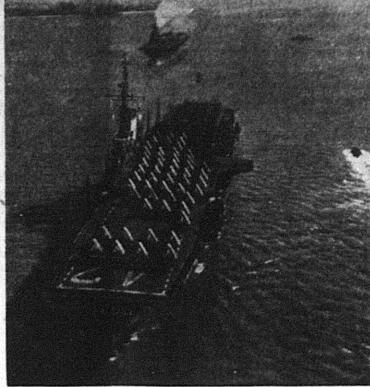
