Plan Honors For War Dead

MANY WILL RETURN TO PLYMOUTH FOR DECORATION DAY FOR FIRST TIME SINCE OUTBREAK OF WAR.

With an indication of fair weather Thursday, the outlook for the greatest crowd in Plymouth for Memorial Day is very good. Plans have been completed by the American Legion and Auxiliary members for the formation of the parade on the Park Square at 9:30. At 10:00 o'clock, the various organizations will begin the march to the cemetery where honors will be paid to our fallen heroes. Members of Elmer-Parsel Post, American Legion, the Legion Auxiliary, Girl and Boy Scouts, school children and others, will take their places in the line of march, which will be headed by the Ganges Band.

At the cemetery, Rev. J. C. Campbell, former pastor of the Methodist Church, will take his place on the speaker's platform and deliver the Memorial Day address. Rev. Campbell, during his pastorate here, enjoyed the admiration of those outside of his church as well as his members, as a public speaker. There is no doubt but what Rev. Campbell's appearance here Thursday will be added impetus for the occasion.

With war restrictions lifted on travel, and other obstacles which have kept the annual Decoration Day crowds down to a minimum during the war, it is expected scores of former residents will return to Plymouth for the day. On this occasion, Plymouth has always stood out as being well represented at the exercises which commemorate the heroes of all wars, and this coming Thursday will be no exception.

It is urged that members of all organizations meet at 8:30 a. m. at the program of the day may not be on schedule.

WARNING GIVEN ABOUT SHOOTING GUNS IN VILLAGE

Reports have been coming in the past week that several Plymouth youngsters have been discharging firearms within the village limits in a promiscuous manner. At least in a couple of instances the shots "came pretty close." So much so that they were being held in the custody of Mayor Laseh. While at her home one day last week-end, Mrs. Bales Kennedy states that the glass in the storm door was being shattered by a stray bullet. Gray who resides on Main Street, in the case you don't recall Main Street, reported that a couple of boys came into his yard and maliciously shot two of his pet birds who have been using his bird house for a home. Bert Walters, caretaker at the Mary Fate Park, reveals that youths have been coming into the park with loaded firearms and discharging the guns on the premises. All of these infractions plus many others have lead up to one point . . . action is being taken to put a stop on firearms within the city limits.

Mayor Laseh announced Monday that he has instructed the village marshal to arrest any youth who is seen with a firearm in his possession. To aid further in the apprehension of those youngsters who disregard the law at the Mary Fate Park, Mayor Laseh has sworn in the village marshal, who will have the power and authority to make arrests.

Frank Clinker Sells His Farm

One of the biggest farm deals in recent months was the one announced Monday by Frank Clinker, who revealed he had sold his 243 acre farm to Clarence E. Riggle. Purchase price of the farm was not revealed.

Mr. Clinker bought the farm from S. S. Staton in 1919, and moved from Lucas to his newly purchased farm in 1920. Under the Staton ownership, a portion of the farm was used as a recreation park, with boating and fishing being the outstanding attractions. The park was a well-known pleasure resort back in those days, and many of the older residents will recall many happy days spent there.

Moving to the farm in 1920, Mr. Clinker has continued through the past quarter century carrying on the farm work in a successful manner. The Clinkers have many friends and acquaintances in the community, who will regret to know they are leaving the farm here, and will make their home in Belleville, where they also own real estate.

Just for the sake of old times, let's refer to the Clinker home as the "Old Seaton Place." The farm, located on 17th and one-half miles east of Plymouth on the Shiloh road, has for its entrance, a huge, well designed home on one side of the drive way, and a large attractive barn on the other. The house sits on a knoll, and around it is a well placed hedge row, just the right number of trees and shrubs and the flowers around the porch, it gives the atmosphere of being the perfect farm home. This home attracts the eye of everyone who passes, and it is a traditional landmark.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Riggle, the new owners, expect to do some remodeling to the home before moving in. The Clinkers are trying to get moved by the middle of June. Mr. and Mrs. Riggle's family have been residing on the Brumback farm, just south of the cemetery, for the past three years.

The Clinkers are holding a public sale on Saturday, June 1, at which time they will sell their livestock, farm machinery and some household goods.

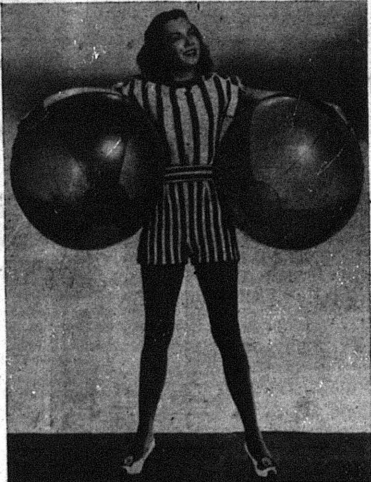

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE INSTALLATION OF ALL ELECTRIC WORK AND WIRING IN BUILDINGS WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO; PROVIDING FOR THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE LIGHT PLANT INSPECTING SUCH INSTALLATIONS; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, COUNTY OF HURON:

Section 1. That the installation of all electric work and wiring in all buildings within the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be installed in accordance with the laws and regulations of the State of Ohio, shall comply with the National Underwriters fire regulations and shall also comply with the requirements of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio. No installation aforesaid, whether new or repair, after this ordinance becomes effective, shall be connected or used without first securing the written approval of the Superintendent of the said Light Plant, who is hereby authorized and empowered to inspect any and all such installations.

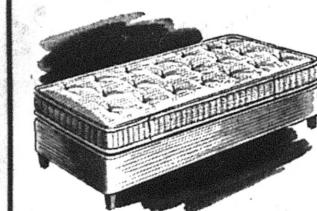

Behind The Scenes

Of American Business

NEW YORK, May 27—Manufacturers are wondering just how soon it will be before they will have to turn a good part of their efforts to sell more than producing. During the war years, when the government took a great percentage of manufactured goods, business found little for its regular sales force. Even now, while demand far outweighs the supply of available goods, stress is on the ability to procure raw materials rather than on disposal of manufactured products. When demand catches up with supply, manufacturers are likely to find some weaknesses in the retail merchandising field. Dun's Review points out that more than 260,000 retail outlets were closed between December 31, 1940, and the end of 1945. The store closings followed fairly closely the scarcity of goods during war years. In the radio and appliance field, where supplies were practically shut off, some 33 per cent of the retail outlets closed. The meat shortage was a factor in the closing of 26 per cent of these stores, while gasoline rationing closed 25.8 per cent of the filling stations. Since 1943, more stores have probably been opened than closed, however, and the gap between 1940 and 1946 may be less. According to Dun's Review, the

deficiency has probably not yet been completely made up.

JOBS FOR VETERANS—Although the first anniversary of Japan's surrender is still many weeks away, a large part of America's wartime Army and Navy has been demobilized and thousands of fighting men have quietly resumed their peacetime jobs. Helping to speed and facilitate this vitally important phase of the transition from war to peace, business executives burned the midnight oil reading plans to assure that these veterans could return to their prewar employment, if they wish, with the least possible delay and inconvenience. With 1,515 employees in the armed forces on V-J Day, Shenley Distillers Corporation's first postwar move was to set the servicemen's mind "at ease" with a concise booklet summarizing all essential steps necessary for a veteran to obtain his full privileges under the "G-I Bill of Rights," as well as added benefits, including higher pay and advancement merited by special training in the armed forces and full credit for military service with respect to the company's liberal retirement and insurance benefits, awaiting him on his return. Other opportunities and assistance were mapped for handicapped veterans. As the result of careful planning for re-employment plus continual contact with employees while they are in uniform, Shenley veterans are returning to the company almost as fast as they are being discharged from the Army and Navy. . . . 90 cent of those who have returned to civilian life are already back on the payroll.

BITS O' BUSINESS—The flow of wheat to Europe has been slowed by box car shortages. They may also hamper movement of southwest wheat which is nearly ready for harvest. . . . Americans will buy an average of four pairs of shoes apiece this year, the Department of Commerce estimates. Last year they averaged 3.3 pairs. . . . Heavy demand for candy bars has enabled manufacturers to cut selling expenses and thus continue the five-cent price. . . . Capacity crowds indicate the popularity of Coast-to-Coast Pullman travel without stopovers. . . . If all demands by John L. Lewis are met, coal prices should rise 50 cents to 60 cents a ton. . . . No real relief is expected for the butter shortage which appears to be getting more acute. Stocks now aggregate 10 million pounds compared with 45 million pounds a year ago. . . . Army-Navy purchasing agents would like to buy 120 million board feet of lumber by the end of July. They have just begun to comb 700 pine and fir mills in 10 western states for it. . . . Lard supplies are critically low. On May 27, the United States had 70.5 million pounds against a five year average for May 1 of 281 million pounds. (Note to retailers: Many women are complaining about the difficulty of getting shoes which cover the toes and heels.)

ENGLISH TRAIN SHIPPED HOME

CORONATION SCOT, ON DISPLAY IN NEW YORK IN 1939, RETURNS TO SERVICE IN ENGLAND.

The Coronation Scot, famed British streamlined train that was sent to this country for exhibition in the New York World's Fair in 1939, and became marooned here following the outbreak of war, was to be loaded aboard the Liberty ship "Paul Bunyan" at the Locust Point Terminals on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad in Baltimore this week for her return journey to England.

After the close of the New York World's Fair in 1940, the Coronation Scot was stored in the B. & O. shops in Baltimore, but in 1942 the beautifully painted locomotive and tender was given a coat of green, detached from the train and loaded on a ship for England. The submarine blockade was safely run and she was soon doing a wartime job on the tracks of her own road the London, Midland and Scottish, where she is still hauling mainline passenger trains. In 1943 the London, Midland & Scottish offered the train to the U. S. Army for use as an officers' headquarters at the Quartermaster Depot, Jeffersonville, Ind., and it has been in that service ever since. The Norwalk High School's large music library will be made available to the group, and the school will provide the facilities for rehearsal. There will be no charge whatsoever to the musi-

cian for participation in this band. Musicians interested in the band are asked to start practicing now, as first chair spots will be assigned to personnel in best practice and most capable in the various sections. 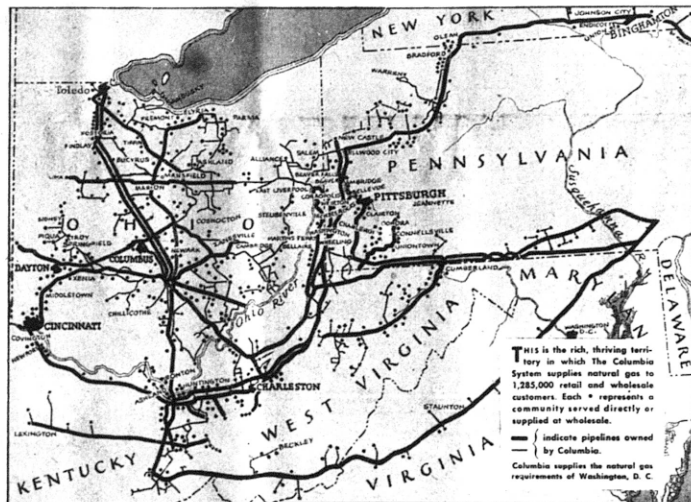
