Of American Business NEW YORK, May 27—Manufacturers are wondering just how soon it will be before they will have to turn a good part of their efforts to selling rather than producing. During the war years, when the government took a great percentage of manufactured goods, business found little use for its regular sales force. Even now, while demand far outweighs the supply of available goods, now, while demand far outweighs the supply of available goods, stress is on the ability to procure raw materials rather than on dis-posal of manufactured products. Dun's Review points out that more than 260,000 retail outlets were closed between December 31, 1940, and the end of 1943. 
