

Association Opens Office Here; Sends Protest to Congress

Ohio Marketing Quota Protest Group Establishes State Headquarters Here; Seeks to Protect Interest of Farmers in Production and Prices.

The Ohio Marketing Quota Protest Association has opened headquarters here in Plymouth in the office space over the Kroger store. The Association a few weeks ago acquired the office, and has painted and redecorated its new headquarters, and also installed new office equipment including a mimeographing and addressograph machines and typewriter.

The new office will house the headquarters of the executive board of the association which includes H. H. Fackler, state chairman; Gilbert Myers, vice chairman of Castalia; Bolla Myers, secretary-treasurer, Attica; Walter Cummings, Willard RFD; and C. H. Frey, Franklin county. The organization has membership in forty-two Ohio counties and Fackler states that more members are being added every week.

The organization was formed several years ago to combat the unpopular AAA and to seek curbs on government regulations pertaining to the farming industry. The Association is seeking the abolishment of OPA, and the following bulletin has been sent to the four hundred and eighty representatives in Washington.

The text of the letter to the Honorable Congressmen:

The fate of OPA is in the balance and they are awaiting a verdict as to what their future holds; you are one of the men who will help render that verdict and it is vital that you and your colleagues hand down a decision which will benefit the masses directly or indirectly, and it is necessary that you should know the facts of this case. It is hoped that this letter, placed in the hands of every member of Congress will inform them why OPA is detrimental to the American farmer.

Club Sponsors Park Flag Pole

To Be Dedicated To War Heroes on July Fourth With Ceremonies.

A worthwhile project was sponsored by the Community Club at its last meeting is receiving much favor among the entire community. The erecting of a flag pole at the Mary Fack Park. The flag pole is to be dedicated to the boys of our town who gave their lives in World War II, and will bear the names of those who made the supreme sacrifices.

A committee from the Community Club met with the park board Monday night, and a suitable site will be chosen this week so that work can be started at once, as it is the desire of the Club to hold exercises for the flag raising on the Fourth of July. The financing of the pole and its construction, as well as a fitting plaque is being sponsored by the Community Club, and those organizations who wish to contribute money toward this purpose may contact J. E. Nimmons, president.

Otis Downdown and Luther Peters, members of the Club committee met with the park board, and they revealed that a pole 55 feet high is being planned, and that it is to be placed in a concrete base, bearing a plaque which will contain the names of our fallen heroes.

The board voted to accept the offer of the Community Club and Messrs. Kinsell, Ford and Peters were appointed to select a proper site.

The Board also announces that a new pavilion will be built just west of the present one, and that construction will be started within a few days. Sufficient funds are not available to complete the structure this summer, but the Board feels that by getting in the floor and posts this summer, the roof of the shelter house can be finished next year. The present shelter house is booked for every Sunday through the summer, and there is a big demand for additional tables and benches. The park board is trying to overcome the shortage of facilities as rapidly as possible, and more tables, chairs and benches are being added.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce has requested a site in the park for a tennis court, and a committee has been chosen to select a suitable spot for this part of the park's amusement.

A new wire fence is being built around the park property, and a new gate is to be installed at the park entrance. The gates of the park will probably be set at 10:30 p. m. when the gate is installed. The park, so far this season, has enjoyed a wide patronage.

FATHER AND THREE SONS FIGURE IN AUTO WRECK

Ashland Firm Gets Contract

Water Extension Project Sells for \$4,600; Board To Buy New Truck.

Bids opened Saturday at noon by Clerk L. E. Brown of the Board of Public Affairs for the water line extension revealed that L. Walker Fauber, Ashland, was the lowest bidder for the contract. His bid totaling \$4,660.61.

The improvement calls for the laying of 2450 feet of four inch pipe, with necessary fittings, fire hydrants, etc., and the work to be completed some time this summer. Due to a severe shortage of pipe, the completion of the improvement will be somewhat delayed, but the successful bidder stated that there is every reason to believe that the work will be completed by midsummer.

The improvement will be drawn up this week by Boyd Wiernan, Mansfield engineer, who estimated the job would run \$4,600. The Ashland contractor's figure ran \$60.61 over the estimate. Chairman Cashman, and members Scott and Thomas were present when Clerk Brown opened the bids, and after some discussion a vote was taken to award Fauber the contract.

The improvement will begin at the Hanick home on Plymouth Street and go south on Route 61 to the corporation line. The new line will afford water service to several residents, and those homes just outside the limits have signified intentions of hooking up with the city line. Not only will this improvement give water service to several homes, but it will also increase fire protection in that section of the village.

Accepting the contract, Mr. Fauber stated that he will not lose any time in getting started on the project, and that he will begin work as soon as possible. While he said there might be a shortage of pipe, it is believed that the type of pipe required for the job, can be secured within thirty or sixty days, and with no other delays, the work will be finished in good time.

The Board has taken into consideration the low pressure condition which exists on West Broadway, and Supr. Root is making a test on all fire hydrants on this street to determine the water pressure at all hydrants.

His report will be handed in at the next meeting. If plans work out, this condition may be remedied by running a four inch line from Walnut Street over to West Broadway, which will give this section of town a circulatory main, thereby increasing the pressure and also eliminating the possibility of having to dig up

OPA has maintained ceiling prices on farm produce but allowed ceiling prices to rise out of proportion after they were processed and went back to the farm for feed as concentrates and made it unprofitable to produce beef, lambs, hogs, poultry, eggs and dairy products.

The OPA and Agricultural department lost the respect of the farmer when they paid 30c bonus on wheat which put the government agency in the black market.

Ask yourself: If an increase per bushel will bring grain out of storage would it not bring more from the ground in time and allow all farmers to be benefited by it, if offered at planting time.

OPA contends that farm ceiling prices are adequate and all farmers are making money as never before. They say subsidies necessary? By subsidy payment then, the government is admitting that farm prices are inadequate. Subsidies were meant to lower cost of living but it increases our tax burden which will be paid at a time when the individual's earning power is lower than today.

This is controlled economy, which is not a child of the Democratic form of government but a direct enemy of the producer and consumer and has the earmarks of a communistic parent, who plays both ends against the middle by enslaving the producer and robbing the consumer.

The American farmer is discouraged, disgusted and embittered. Congress must act or the entire Agricultural Structure of the United States will be ruined.

and the consuming public will suffer.

In order to save the day, Congress must abolish OPA in its entirety, subsidies must be discontinued, farm prices must be based on cost of production, marketing quotas and penalty tax stricken from Agriculture Adjustment Act, the farmer must be put on the same economic plane as labor and industry and be represented at the conference table by Dirt Farmers.

The basic facts herein stated, should convince you that we feel it our duty as American Farmers and American Citizens to protest in behalf of our country as a whole, by withholding produce from channels of distribution, if not assured of correction by June 25th, 1946, 12 o'clock noon.

We feel that this is our only recourse to save democracy and to relieve the farmer from the threat of fear of OPA so he can produce adequately and bountifully.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT IT IS NECESSARY TO PURCHASE A TWO TON DUMP TRUCK WITH HOIST FOR THE ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT: AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO EXPEND MONEY, ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, AND ENTER INTO A CONTRACT THEREFOR, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That it is hereby deemed and declared necessary to improve the light plant utility by purchasing a two ton dump truck with hydraulic hoist.

Section 2. That the entire cost and expense of said truck is to be paid solely from the Electric Fund. Said entire cost authorized by this ordinance shall not exceed \$2500.00.

Section 3. Winner, (man or woman pilot), \$10,000; second, \$5,000; third, \$3,000; fourth, \$2,500; fifth, \$1,500; sixth, \$1,000; seventh, \$500; and \$1,000 for the fastest elapsed time set by a woman pilot.

Thompson Trophy Race, Monday, September 3, 300 mile closed course speed championship, \$30,500. Winner: \$15,500; Lulum award for new Thompson record, \$2,000; lap prizes, \$2,000; second, \$5,000; third, \$4,500; fourth, \$3,000; fifth, \$2,000; sixth, \$1,500; and seventh, \$1,000.

Sequesterennial closed course speed event, Saturday, August 31, 225 miles for men pilots only, \$15,000. Winner: \$8,000; second, \$3,500; third, \$2,000; fourth, \$1,000; and fifth, \$500.

Women's Race, 75 mile closed course speed event Friday, August 30, \$5,000. Winner: \$2,500; second, \$1,000; third, \$750; fourth, \$500; and fifth, \$250.

Weatherhead Service Jet Speed Dashes, Sunday, September 1, open to service jet planes only. Awards of \$25,000 to be directed to Army and Navy Relief Societies. Appropriate trophies to winners in various categories.

Add it up for yourself. A single pilot can gain in \$29,500 by winning the Bendix on Friday and the Thompson Trophy Race on Labor Day. This winner will surely break the old Thompson record of 283 miles per hour, thus picking up the \$10,000 Lulum award with a possible \$2,000 in lap prizes to swell the total.

'The Millennium'

by Dalton F. McDougall

Part I

We suggest that this great subject be opened by reading Rev. 20:1-9. The word millennium refers to the one thousand years of Revelation the 20th chapter. The word "millennium" comes from two Latin words, mille, which means "one thousand" and annus, "year." It means one thousand years. The word "millennium" itself is not found in the Bible. But the expression "a thousand years," which is equivalent to the word "millennium," is used six times in Rev. 20:2-9. In order to understand the millennium, we must first learn when this one thousand years will begin.

From the reading of Rev. 20:4-7 we find that this one thousand years comes right in between two general resurrections. In the book of John 5:28, 29 speaks also of two general resurrections, it says "marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, in which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that

have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation."

What class of people will be raised in the first resurrection? "Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection. Rev. 20:6. The very use of the expression—"The first resurrection" shows that there will be two general resurrections. When a man points to a certain house and says, "There is the first house I built," I understand that somewhere else there must be a second house that he built. If he had built only one house, he would have said, "There is the house I built," I understand that "the first resurrection" implies that there will be a second resurrection.

Since it is the "holy" or the righteous, who have part in the first resurrection, it is the wicked who will be raised in the second resurrection. By contrast it is implied that unholy and cursed is he that hath part in the second resurrection.

Part II will tell how the righteous will stand related to this period of time.

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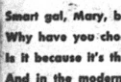
