

OFFERS LOANS ON NEW WHEAT

GOVERNMENT SETS UP \$1.80 TOP ON WHEAT, 50 CENTS ON OATS CROP.

Loans are now available on the 1946 crops of wheat, oats, and barley. It is announced by Guy L. Taylor, chairman of the Richland county Triple-A committee. Loan rates for Richland county are: wheat, \$1.60 per bushel, oats, 56 cents per bushel, and barley, 98 cents per bushel. These figures are for No. 1 grade grain. The loans are being offered under programs similar to those in effect during the past year, and are available through the county AAA office on grain stored either in approved warehouses or on the farms, Taylor said.

In view of the current strong market prices for grains, Taylor said he doubted if many farmers would desire to execute loans on this year's crops.

Meanwhile, Elmer F. Kruse, state chairman of the Ohio Production and Marketing association, announced that a national wheat goal of 71,700,000 seeded acres for the production of next year's crop has been set by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This would be the largest wheat acreage since 1933 and, if the 1947 yield equals that of the last few years, it will be the fourth successive crop of more than a billion bushels.

Officials said that the proposed acreage is larger than that desirable for proper long-time land utilization and conservation, but that a large supply of wheat, is needed in view of the current food situation and the low level of wheat stocks.

Former Pastor Passes Away

Rev. Michael J. Coan, 71, pastor of St. Basil's Church in Cuyahoga, passed away Thursday at a heart ailment, following an illness of several years.

Father Coan was ordained June 11, 1904, and was appointed administrator of Annunciation Church in Cleveland. Less than a year later, he became assistant pastor of St. Philomena's Church in East Cleveland.

Later he was pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church at Willard and served missions in that district including Plymouth from July, 1905 to 1941. Then he served two years as pastor of Immaculate Conception Church at Willville before being transferred to Girard.

After going to Girard, he founded a mission at Vienna and the St. Vincent de Paul Church there. He also established the parish at McDonald, now known as the Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church.

Four sisters in religious orders, including Sister Mary Enda at the Ursuline convent in Cleveland, and two other sisters, Catherine and Delian Coan, who were housekeepers at the rectory in Girard, survive.

Funeral services were held on Monday.

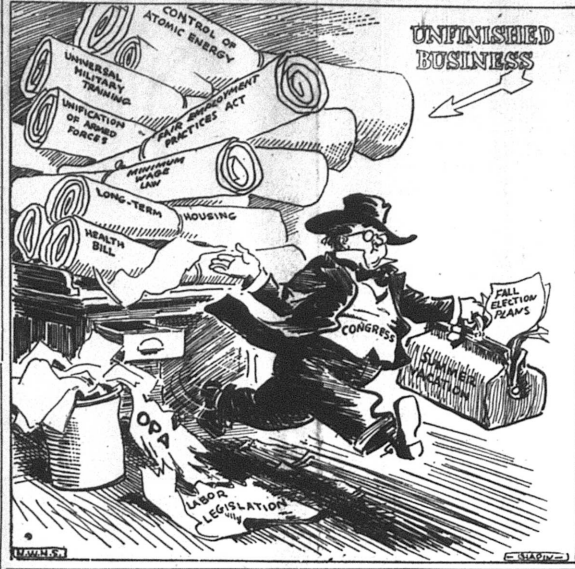

LOCAL BOY PARTICIPATES IN ATOMIC BOMBING AT BIKINI

Newspapers all over the country have been giving detailed descriptions of the recent atomic bombing but Plymouth had an eye witness and writer home this week to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Marvin, their son, Albert Marvin, Jr. SC 2/c aboard the U. S. S. Rockingham has this to say:

July 1946
Bikini Atoll
"What's left of it."
Dear Folks:
Sound as a dollar and still working my ears off. Was sort of hoping it might set the galley on fire but no dice. All joking aside, it was sure some experience to witness and the suspense was about killing me.

Monday morning reveille was at five but just about everyone was willing to rise and shine that morning. All hands were called to quarters at approximately 0700 but false alarm; the bomb was not supposed to be until 0900, but was about 1700. Had to sleep in Plymouth. Then at about 0830 back to G. Q. again, but this was no false alarm.

First they had a little run over the target, even though we were eighteen miles away, the radio hookup was perfect and we knew just where he was. Then at 0858 he started the real run. Had to face starboard, and close our eyes to protect against the glare. Then at 0900 on the nose we heard "bombs away"; that was when the suspense was most of all, wasn't afraid at all but that sixty seconds seemed an everlasting time. Then the word was announced, "easy target." Everyone wondered, as we had not heard a single thing. I was starting to go to the port side when "boom" it went.

The sixty seconds had elapsed but they forgot to allow for the sound to travel eighteen miles. No one was hurt except for a few sore muscles but anyways everyone was concerned about the huge white cloud that was forming overhead. It looked just like a ball of pure white yarn miles high then at once a beautiful pink color came over it, like someone was pouring cherry pop over some vanilla ice cream. Then on the horizon a lot of smoke could be seen so we knew some ships were on fire. That evening we went back in and fires were still burning on many ships. In fact the carrier Independence was still burning twenty-four hours after it was hit. There was no way they could get to play on Thursday, the 18th they play New Haven on the local field. MORE AND MORE each summer the popularity of Mary Faye Park increases. As we look back over the few short years when the grounds were presented to the village, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Root, one can hardly realize the vast improvements that have been made. From a "scrub forest and uneven terrain" the park site has grown into a "place of beauty, where nature unfolds everything from sunrise to sunset... where birds play a symphony throughout the day, and children's laughter is the applause."

THE UPKEEP of the park takes quite a sum of money each season, and the limited appropriation keeps the park board busy trying to stretch a dollar. Playground equipment needs replacing, and a wading pool with sprinklers would be an attraction for the youngsters. These things may come about in due time, now that such equipment is becoming more plentiful.

THE BOARD starts construction this season of a new shelter house, the floor of which will be laid after the rush is over. The roof will be added next Spring. The cost of the shelter house will be approximately \$1,500. The roadway into the park needs a bit of improvement, and every effort is being made to get this project under way at an early date.

THROUGH THE cooperation of the park board and board of public works, the limited appropriation tends into the center of the park's flower bed will be completed soon. This will be a great help in getting flowers and shrubbery off to a good start, and will save a lot of manual labor for the caretaker. An appropriate fountain in the center might become a reality next season.

MUCH CREDIT should be given to Caretaker Bert Walters and to Smith's Greenhouse of Willard for the loveliness of the park this for the maintenance of the park. This job of keeping the grounds clear of rubbish, and mowing the grass regularly, also for his painstaking care of all flowers and shrubs. DURING HOT days and nights local citizens who seldom visit the park, will find the air cool and invigorating at Mary Faye Park. Suppose you sit under a tree some evening and try a lunch and then relax in this peaceful spot where you will always enjoy a cooling breeze.

AND ALWAYS remember this: Mary Faye Park is made possible by enterprising citizens who donated time, money and sweat, and who enjoy a certain degree of civic pride. Let's keep up the well-earned reputation we have established for our park, and our town and we are bound to see our park and community grow in great favor.

Doings In Congress

More about the OPA. There will undoubtedly be a new OPA law before this is printed. The President called upon the hundred thousand OPA payrollers—who ride on the public's back—stand by their battle stations. A queer expression used by the President to conceal his mistake in vetoing the OPA bill. The President knows that some people believe everything they hear over the radio, or see in the press or in the movies. We know that is how the German people lost their liberty. They too followed blind partisanship until confusion and dictatorship overtook them.

We have inflation. If the President wants to stop it, then let him order the Federal Reserve Bank to stop printing more paper money. We now have twenty-eight billion paper money in circulation where we never had over six billion before. This new money was printed for the cost plusers and the lend leasers. It was not printed for the farmer, laborer or small business or professional man. They got a fifty cent dollar.

We know that high wages, high prices, and high cost of living are the result and not the cause of inflation. They are the result of cheap-depreciated money. During the few days that price controls were off, Chester Bowles and his followers spread the falsehood, with the taxpayers' money, that prices went sky rocketing.

Here are oranges and tangerines and grapefruit, oh so sweet. They make your mouth water and tempt you at any time. And anywhere to eat. Here comes the crippled and the sick. To enjoy God's sunshine and water. Which turns the cries and moans. To tones of mirth and laughter.

Many states are represented and their opportunities. Compared with the state of Florida.

Whose blessings it will share. With law abiding people, who come here to dwell. From states where living, is almost like Hell. Where you are taxed while you walk, even when you lie. Not only for what you eat to live, but a coffin when you die.

Oh Bradenton, the beautiful. Forever you will be, of all places in these states. The pleasant spot to me. Where a poor man can make a living. While in Ohio sure at fate. If politicians find him saving. They double up his rate.

ing. With few exceptions, prices did not go up. They increased only to the extent that subsidies were removed.

Prime steers sold on the Chicago market at \$18 to \$22.50 per hundred. The cost of production is \$22.62. Low grade cattle sold for \$7 per hundred. The only kind of meat that we could get under the OPA was the low grade but we paid the high grade price. For the prime beef, you had to go to the black market.

The truth is the price of meat, milk and butter increased only to the extent that subsidies were taken off. Like all sick governments, ours to cover up its printing press money—its inflation—resorted to paying subsidies. We know that for every dollar of subsidies we receive we have to pay two in taxes. The other dollar goes to the subsidies' collectors and distributors.

In spite of Chester Bowles' ballooning with the taxpayers' money, and the President's battle stations speech, I received only forty telegrams and letters. Sixty percent were against the OPA. I am satisfied that if the OPA had not been resurrected, we would have found ourselves and we would have had full production and full shelves instead of empty ones. This is we quit exporting goods that we need and that belong to us. Recently I was told that about half of America's needed goods were on the ocean. Let us stop being an international WPA except for the hungry.

WHEN WE HEAR about the fortunes which are being spent in our country for every conceivable kind of luxury—diamonds, fur coats, expensive vacations and black market merchandise—it appears as though every American has an unlimited supply of funds.

Actually, although the people as a whole are better off than they ever were from the standpoint of dollars, the bulk of increased wealth is largely in the hands of a small group of people.

For although wages in general are higher than they used to be, both in factories and on farms, they are more than offset by the increased cost of living and high income taxes. Surveys show that the man with \$1,000 in the bank today has far more than the average.

Security, for most of us, still depends as much as it ever did on regular, uninterrupted work at steady wages.

THERE IS NO DOUBT that Russia is the greatest menace to permanent peace. Because of that it seems important for all of us to try to get better acquainted with the Russian philosophy and Russia's goals.

To do that, we highly recommend a new book by William C. Bullitt, former U. S. Ambassador to Russia, entitled: "The Great Globe Itself."

This book is frightening reading. It makes it appear as though Russia's interest in the United Nations is merely a means of stalling for time while she prepares for war against us. But Mr. Bullitt should know what he is talking about. And, even though some of his reasoning may prove to be wrong—we sincerely hope it is—every American should be put on guard against the possibility that he is right.
