

## MANSFIELD TO DEDICATE PORT THIS WEEK-END

Residents of this community will be planning to drive to the Mansfield Airport Dedication and Sky Show Saturday and Sunday, July 20 and 21, were advised today by Fred Boals, Mansfield traffic commissioner, not to try to reach the airport by taking shortcuts.

Instead, Boals urged today that all motorists come into downtown Mansfield—even those coming from the north—and drive to the airport road, where elaborate traffic controls will move traffic into the huge special airport parking lot faster than the driver can get there by any other route.

City police highway patrolmen and sheriff's deputies have worked out a plan whereby North Main will be kept clear of parked cars and used as a one-way road to the port in the morning, and away from it in the afternoon.

"We can park 10,000 cars at the field in a way so that no car will be blocked in its space, and if drivers will follow our suggestions they'll have the least possible trouble," Boals said.

"It may sound contradictory, but we can handle the traffic better over the one road than we can if it comes from every direction," Boals said.

Residents of communities to the south, east and west of Mansfield can come into the city by a number of routes and can reach the North Main street road to the port.

However, Boals strongly urged that violators come to the airport and the special parking lot.

The dedication of the Sky Show will open at 11 a. m. Saturday and close at 6 p. m. The dedication ceremony, at which Gov. Frank Lausche and his family will be present, will start at 2 p. m. Lane W. Wilcox, regional superintendent of the CAA, will present the port formally to Mayor Roy W. Vaughn.

In the accompanying Sky Show more than three hours of flying airplanes have been arranged, including maneuvers by army, navy and marine groups, sailplanes, private planes and stunt fliers.

In all, more than 250 aircraft will be in the air and on the ground for the two-day event.

Three of the country's best stunt fliers, including a former army pilot, are expected to appear. Beverly Howard, who does precision flying in a Cub Special, Woody Edmondson, aerobatics in a clipped-wing Monocoupe, and Mac McElroy, in precision aerobatics in a German-made Buckle-Jungmeister.

Thirty navy planes will fly in from Charleston, S. C. off the USS Enterprise, and 12 Marine planes will come from Columbus.

One of the features of the show will be a flying demonstration by the Army's jet-engine P-80, known as the Shooting Star.

Also on hand will be the army's B-19 and a dozen other ships for ground display, together with transport ships and private planes.

## DAIRYMEN HOLD MEET AT GANGES

For the first time in several years, increased emphasis is due to be placed on improving the quality of milk and cream produced in Richland dairy farms, it was revealed this week in the announcement of plans for a series of producer meetings.

Arranged through cooperation of County Agricultural Agent George B. Ganyard, Extension officials of Ohio State University, and the Ohio Butter Manufacturers Association, these meetings will be held on the following dates: July 18, Ganges, Ohio; July 19, Belleville, Ohio; July 20, Mansfield, Ohio.

All dairymen in the county, together with their families are being invited to these meetings. The program for the meetings will include the showing of a movie on quality production, a brief talk by County Agent Ganyard on the current dairy situation, a talk by Ohio State University Extension Specialist, Richard Larson, on cream improvement, and an interesting demonstration on Sediment testing.

In addition to the enjoyment of each meeting, valuable door prizes will be given away, and an ample supply of ice cream will be served.

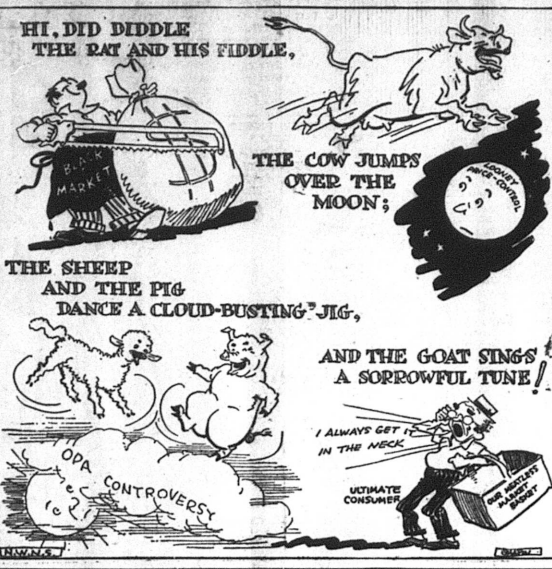

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## MAY BUILD NEW SUPER HIGHWAY

Various rumors have been going around Plymouth for the past several months in regard to a super highway passing through or near this vicinity.

In last week's issue of The Local News, the following story appeared, and is being printed in this issue, as it may give some light on the subject.

Legislation will be introduced at the next regular session of the Ohio state legislature to make possible a network of four-lane superhighways over Ohio paid for by tolls and linking the state with the Pennsylvania Turnpike and possibly Chicago, according to State Senator Ralph A. Winter of Lodi.

Senator Winter has been working with engineers on the plans for such a superhighway over a number of years. Here is the way the plan would work:

The Legislature would authorize creation of an Ohio turnpike commission of five or more members named by the governor and authorized to issue road construction bonds which Ohio firms already have agreed to underwrite.

The bonds would be sold to the public, Winter said. Private interests have indicated a desire to purchase large quantities of the bonds because of the profitable showing made by Pennsylvania turnpike toll collections even during wartime gasoline rationing.

The bonds would be paid off by tolls from trucks and private motorists using the limited access roadways for speed and safety, thereby relieving congestion on regular routes through the state.

The most pressing need for such a route currently is in northeastern Ohio where the Cleveland-Plymouth-Ashtabula triangle was described as the nation's No. 1 highway bottleneck.

The new highway would start from the Ohio-Pennsylvania line near Youngstown, bearing north-west and avoiding cities, it would pass south of Cleveland, going between Elyria and Lorain, and into the Lake Erie line, avoiding Sandusky and Toledo.

Burial was made in the Mt. Zion cemetery in Wood county Ohio. Surviving are his wife Carrie, two sons, Calvin 16 and Russell 14, both at home; three sisters, Mrs. Carl Walz of Attica, Mrs. Collette McDonald of Detroit and Mrs. Beulah Drossz of Toledo and two brothers, Herbert and Kermit, both of Detroit.

Richard Smith, 19, a passenger in the plane was taken to the Willard Hospital where he was treated for bruises and lacerations.

Bittner, who had learned to fly several years ago but obtained his private pilot license only a month ago, was trying to land on the Walz farm. The plane's landing gear struck a power line causing the small craft to nose suddenly downward.

Bittner had rented the plane from the Willard Airport. His neck was broken in the crash.

A number of local young men have been taking flying lessons at the airport, and Mr. Bittner was known to many here. He also was a member of the local Scout Air Squadron Committee.

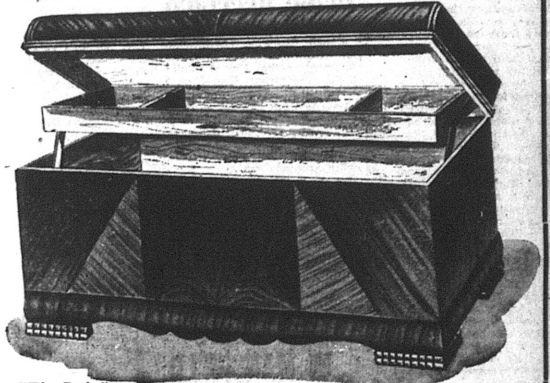

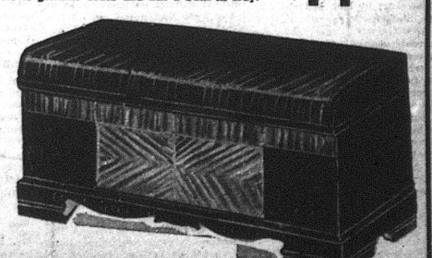

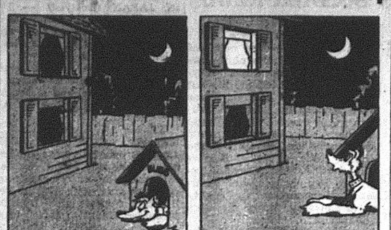

**THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON**

**WASHINGTON, D. C. (NWS)**  
—Efforts to bring at least part of the bill to reorganize Congress are being made in the house. The senate passed their streamlining legislation on June 10, but the parallel measure has lain dormant in the house. Its supporters in the house hope that some provisions may be brought to the floor for consideration this session.

If certain disagreements between the senate and house bills can be ironed out, administration leaders are willing to clear the way for action. Unfortunately, these differences are hard to compromise. Progress is slow among the committee members trying to harmonize the two forms of the bill.

Chief stumbling block is the proposal to create party "policy" committees. These would serve as super-clearing committees for the two major parties, and thereby prevent confusion and would enable quicker action on legislation. The advocates of the measure expect that they will have to sacrifice the policy committees, but they are still undecided as to giving up the whole reorganization bill.

Most important features of the senate bill are these: Committees with similar functions would be merged into one, such as the naval and military affairs. By this process the present 48 house committees would be reduced to 18.

Congressional salaries would be increased from the present \$10,000 a year to \$15,000. Members also would be eligible for federal retirement benefits.

A new fiscal policy would be set up, under which congress would have to pass a resolution deliberately placing the government on a deficit financing basis if it wishes to appropriate more than could be raised through taxation and other revenues in any given year.

This last provision is a sore point. Administration leaders claim that it would be too cumbersome for efficient legislation. It would require a joint meeting of the appropriation committees of both houses, that is, the ways and means and the finance committees. Proponents of the bill regard this provision as one of the most important steps in reorganization.

The plan to trim down the number of committees in the house is also causing a lot of dissension. If the senate bill passes at all, there will have to be a lot of compromising on this point. At the same time, more than 18 committees would survive the reorganization.

Another important, but exciting bill that will come up this session is the unification of services bill. The army favors this merger, but the navy opposes it. One result of the atom bomb tests at Bikini was the stiffening of navy resistance to the unification bill. The battle ships survived the great explosion, after a fashion; at least they did not go to the bottom, or disappear in a cloud of electrons. Some ships were not hurt at all. It is not even clear yet whether the crews of the bombed vessels would have been annihilated, since some of the tattered gobs lived through the blast. In any case, the tests seemed to prove that battleships are not obsolete after all. That a big navy is still necessary to our security.

Some congressmen have taken a cynical attitude toward the tests, hinting that it is highly unlikely that experiments conducted by the navy would prove that battleships are useless in the future. For the navy to wreck its main reason for existence would be suicidal, say these lawmakers. But as it may, results have tended to strengthen the navy's hand in its battle against unification.

Most powerful man on the navy's side is Chairman Viscuso of the naval affairs committee. Before he left for Georgia to campaign for re-election he has been in office uninterrupted for 22 years he took some precautions. By certain arrangements with the rules and other key committees he practically assured that the unification bill would be sidetracked.

Life congressional reorganization, the unification bill is highly technical, and has little emotional appeal. The public is not clamoring for the immediate passage of either. In both cases, no calamity impends if the bills are pigeon-holed. They are measures for more efficiency in government functions. Unfortunately for the nation at large, a good many points are not as anxious for more efficient government.

## SHELBY HAS A HIGH BUDGET

A budget calling for \$116,070 for operating Shelby's municipal government was approved by the city council Monday night, the biggest financial outlay the city has experienced in one hundred years. In presenting the budget to Shelby councilmen, Finance Director Chester Monn, pointed out that it was the largest budget in

the history of the city, and that the breakdown includes: \$98,720 for the general fund; \$2,350 for firemen's pension fund; \$2,350 for policemen's pension fund; \$2,100 for elections, workmen's compensation and other expenses taken out by the county. Shelby's general fund for next year is set \$6,000 higher than that of 1946. Director Monn stated that this would take care of salary increases which were approved this year. The 1947 budget is \$5,850 higher than the one for the current year, which totaled \$110,220. The budget will be sent as approved by the Shelby council to the Richland county budget commission which will revise the funds to the amount of money estimated to be received from taxation and other revenues. It will then be returned to the council for final approval and the annual appropriation ordinance will be passed in January setting aside the necessary money for the various departments of the city.

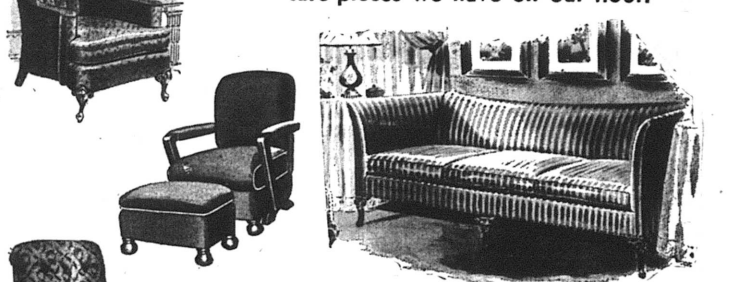

This subsidy was paid from revenue derived from Federal Income Taxes. With the passing of the OPA subsidy payments were also terminated. The producers must have this income if milk receipts are to be maintained, and now with subsidy payments discontinued the only remaining alternative is for the consumer to pay the "true" price "over the counter" instead of paying a portion of the full price through income tax deductions.

The following price structure adjustments will, in our sincere belief, prove sufficient to offset costs that have increased to date. How long the following price structure can be maintained depends upon so many economic as well as political factors that our closest estimate would be no more than a hazardous guess. We simply wish to convey to you this assurance: "Our cooperation in assisting us to retain savings in packaging and distribution costs, resulting from war-time emergency measures, has made it possible for us to hold the price line as much as we have. Had many of the more costly pre-war practices of packaging and distribution been maintained, prices today would be advancing at a staggering rate. With your continued cooperation the price line can be held within reasonable limits. This does not mean that there will be no further price increases, but it does assure you that only such advances as may be necessary to reflect increased costs will be made."

## CONSUMER STRIKES

CONSUMER strikes against high prices are taking place in a number of cities. So far they do not appear to have had any noticeable effect, but it is probable that they will help to keep some prices down.

In the long run, no matter what OPA controls are put on, the only real control over prices will be the amount the people are willing to pay. If we refuse to buy goods at the prices which we think the prices are excessive, manufacturers and merchants will be forced to find some way to reduce those prices in order to sell their goods.

But if we just say, "Inflation is here," dig deeper into our pockets, and take the attitude that there is nothing we can do but pay more, prices will continue to rise. We don't need organized strikes on the part of consumers if each housewife will find some way to get around the things on which prices are unreasonable.

**PAT ON THE BACK OFTEN HELPS**

## GET 192,924 IN TAG FUNDS

SEVEN COUNTIES IN AREA RECEIVE STATE, AUTO LICENSE FEES FOR ROAD REPAIR.

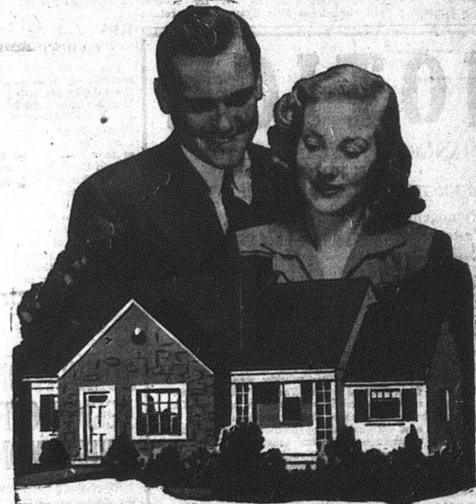

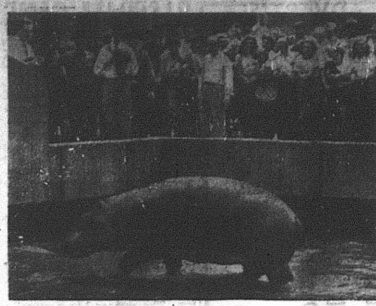

## SHELBY FIREMEN MAY PRACTICE

If the Shelby Council approves a resolution presented to it by the Shelby Better Business club on Monday night, Shelby firemen may get a little extra exercise, for the resolution calls for a trial run to be made by the fire department each week in order to give fire-fighting practice to regular firemen as well as volunteers.

The resolution pointed out that volunteer firemen receive no training and recommend that the regular men on the fire department take part in the dry drills. Drill axes and a lack of masks to fight fires were also mentioned in the resolution, and requested that the fire chief inspect buildings in Shelby's fire district. The resolution went on to state that many downtown Shelby stores had basements filled with waste materials which are fire hazards.

Milk producers of the Cleveland milkshed who shipped milk into the Cleveland milk marketing area during April, 1945, will vote Friday, July 19 on a proposed milk marketing order, in a referendum sponsored by the Dairy Branch, Production and Marketing Administration.

Polling places under the direction of county agents have been established in the following places: Jefferson, county agent's office; Bloomfield, Bloomfield Bank; Danacusa, Belter Garage; Ravenna, county agent's office; Chardon, agent's office; Wellington, Grange Hall; Medina, county agent's office; Wooster, assembly room, court house; Millersburg, court house; Norwalk, county agent's office; Ashland, agent's office; Tiffin, agent's office; Prospect, Farmer's Exchange; East Liberty, school house; Bowling Green, county agent's office.

The milk order would establish minimum classification prices for handlers to pay producers on the basis of ultimate utilization, and would provide for the payment of a uniform blend price to all producers who ship milk to the Cleveland marketing area. It has received the tentative approval of the Secretary of Agriculture.
