'SALES GUNS AIMED AT FARMERS'

THE farmers of America had better put padlocks on their pocketbooks. At least they should be warned that the nation's biggest manufacturers have suddenly "discovered" them, and have put them down as the nation's juiciest market for the sale of postwar products.

The reason for this new interest in the "farm market" is evident in the figures on farm income and savings. The reports show that the farmer is earning almost three times the income which he earned in 1940 and that he has accumulated savings averaging \$4,500 per farm family.

The farmers of the nation, as a group, are said to have earned 28 billion dollars in 1945, as compared with 11 billion in 1940.

With figures like that being bandied about, there is little wonder that the farmer has suddenly been elevated to the position of "Market No. 1" in the eyes of alert sales managers.

'EXPECT DELIVERY IN 1950'

BETTER get your old car fixed up. It is true that automobile manufacturers have straightened out a lot of their problems and are speeding up production, but it's still going to be a long, long time before supply of new cars will even approach demand. Even if there were no more strikes, no more delays, and production breaking all postwar records, it would still take until at least 1950 to fill the demand for new automobiles.

Before the war many of us got in the habit of replacing our car when the time came when it needed major repairs. It seemed more economical in the long run. But today, when you face the decision of whether to have the old car fixed up or order a new one, you must introduce another factor. For, except for a lucky few, the choice today actually is whether to have the old car fixed up or go without one for a long time.

SUCCESS OF CONFERENCE LEADING

ARE you ever called upon to conduct a business conference? Well, if so, here is advice from an expert. Alfred M. Cooper has supervised "conference training" for 45,000 employees, and has trained 600 men in the art of leading a business conference. I am condensing his suggestions from an article in Forbes' magazine.

1. Make the group comfortable. Never attempt to hold a conference with more than 35 people; 16 to 18 group members is ideal.
2. Repress your desire for self-expression. Limit your participation to 25% or less of the time and make your contributions principally in the form of questions.
3. Don't use leading questions which indicate your own opinion or the nature of the response desired—either by wording or inflection—except when leading by the "Negative" method.
4. Don't allow any one to hog the discussion.
5. Keep the group on the subject.
6. Keep the discussion interesting.
7. If possible, get a laugh now and then. It relaxes the group and relieves tension.
8. When dealing with a strange group, expect some obstreperousness, even outright hostility. Meet this calmly, ignoring any contributions which are obviously intended merely to obstruct the meeting.
9. Finally, never dismiss a conference group until a definite conclusion has been reached, preferably by vote.

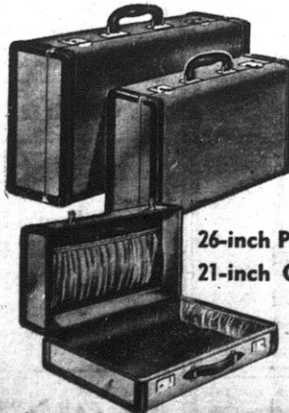

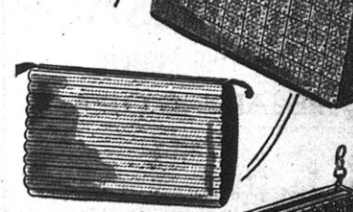
