

LOCAL ELEVATOR IS BREAKING RECORD IN WHEAT SHIPMENTS

With the biggest wheat crop in years being harvested, farmers in this section are fast filling up all available storage space with the finest quality wheat ever harvested. Judging from the opinions of local farmers, the average yield this season will run around twenty-eight bushels to the acre.

The quality of wheat this year, as pointed out by John Ganzhorn manager of the Plymouth Elevator, is very good, which enables direct loading into cars. Last year's wheat crop averaged around twenty-five bushels to the acre, and this was considered very good.

Lack of Cars
While the harvest season was felt extensively throughout the western states, and certain sections of Ohio, the Plymouth Elevator, through cooperation of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, has been very fortunate in securing so far sufficient cars to handle the grain. In some nearby communities, the lack of cars held up the shipment of wheat by some elevators, and as a result many farmers came to Plymouth this season with their grain. It was through friendliness and wide contacts of Messrs. George Rogers, proprietor of the elevator, and John Ganzhorn, manager, that the local elevator was able to continue the peak season without any interference from the car shortage.

Shipments Heavy
With the harvest season about half over, the Plymouth Elevator has made a record in carloadings of wheat. The fifteenth car of the season was shipped out on Tuesday, and Manager Ganzhorn predicts that the elevator will ship at least thirty-six cars before the season is over. Last year the elevator shipped only twenty-six cars for the season.

A Good Record
Six years ago while under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Ratcliffe, the local elevator was just beginning to come through the effects of the depression, when John Ganzhorn became the manager.

PHONE CO. GIVES REASONS FOR DELAY IN SERVICE IMPROVEMENT

Plymouth telephone service, which has been somewhat irksome to patrons the past few years, will no doubt be improved considerably within the next few months, according to plans revealed by W. C. Henry, president and general manager of The Northern Ohio Telephone Company.

Acknowledging receipt of a petition sent to the company in July by Donald Fetters, and signed by many phone patrons, Mr. Henry points out basic reasons why the local phone service became greatly impaired during the war years and the year following the war.

We believe our readers will get a clearer picture of the phone situation as revealed by Mr. Henry in his communication to Mr. Fetters in regard to improving the service in Plymouth by the installation of a dial system. The letter in full is as follows:

Willard Housewives Want Softening Plant

Over in our neighboring town of Willard, the women are getting out of patience with their "hard water" and are going to do something about it. Banded together under the name of "The Householder's Committee," and headed by Mrs. Paul Fackler, the group appeared Tuesday evening before the board of public affairs and because of their indifference, the women are now circulating petitions among the citizens to have their proposed \$50,000 water softening plant put before the voters in the November election.

They were in Plymouth the first of the week talking over Plymouth's water system with Mr. Rooks and have also consulted with the Shelby engineer.

The committee presented their proposal and evidence that the plant would not use any appreciable extra amount of water, that the cost of the plant after installation would not exceed \$25,500 per year, and that the taste would not be altered, the three chief objections of the board.

A motion by the board to take the matter under advisement for thirty days was not satisfactory to the committee and the petition last Wednesday morning.

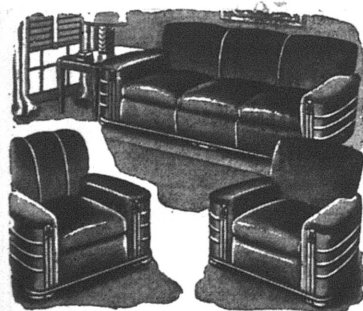

DALE CARNEGIE

HE REFUSED TO RECOGNIZE HANDICAP

WHAT are the qualities that make for success? Superior knowledge? Yes, sometimes; but more frequently it is flaming enthusiasm backed by horse-sense and persistence.

Let me illustrate by telling you the story of a man I have known for years. He is one of the most famous aviators in America and one of the luckiest husbands I know, for he is married to a beautiful woman with infinite charm.

His name is Alexander de Seversky. Born in Russia, his father was a military aviator in Russia, and the lad had grown up virtually in a cockpit. By the time he was fifteen he had built two airplanes which would actually fly.

Suddenly the World War was on. But that was all right with him. It would give him a chance to show what a fighting aviator he was.

The day came for him to go up for his first flight. His big moment. He would make his country proud of him.

He went up . . . so did an anti-aircraft shell from the enemy's gun. The shell struck his airplane and hurtled it down into the Gulf of Riga. A Russian battleship steamed toward the floating wreckage. Blood everywhere. But someone's hand moved, gesturing for aid. A rowboat was lowered. A young man was lifted from the water. A man with but one leg. The other shot off!

The lad was sent to a military hospital where he remained for a long month. When he came out—what was left of him—they asked him what he wanted to do.

"I want to fly," he said promptly and decisively. What? Flying with only one leg? Ridiculous! So they gave him a job on the ground in the Petrograd district. One day when no one was looking, he hobbled out to an airplane, strapped his good leg to a rudder-bar—and up he went.

His superiors were shocked. And they were mad. They would teach him a lesson. Well, it took a pardon from Czar Nicholas himself to square things.

But Alexander de Seversky's enthusiasm never waned. In 1918 he came to this country and got into our air service. He had ideas and he had enthusiasm. One of his ideas concerned a bomb-sight. That is, a method for aiming a bomb at a target. He worked it out. Our government paid him \$50,000 for it.

He invented shells for flying boats.

He proposed refueling in the air. It worked.

He became a United States citizen, and a major in the United States Air Corps Specialist reserve.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—Racketeering schools and employers are reaping a rich harvest from the veterans' education program, charges Dr. Francis J. Brown, national authority on the GI bill of rights educational provisions. Dr. Brown states that tighter controls are needed. Over 900 million dollars have already been expended in the program. Before the end of the year Dr. Brown predicts that two million former servicemen will be enrolled in various forms of schooling and training. His charges are contained in a report to the American Council on Public Affairs.

Some schools, asserts Dr. Brown, have increased fees and have added "questionable courses" to get all they can from the government. Employers in many cases have looked upon the "on-the-job" apprentice training for veterans as merely a way to get a lucrative government subsidy. These abuses cannot be corrected under the present loose laws, Dr. Brown comments.

The Veterans' administration can exercise control over the veteran, but not over the school which he chooses to attend. It is up to the states to inspect and supervise the schools that are receiving federal payments for veterans' tuition fees. Many states are not doing so, says Dr. Brown. The Veterans' educational law does not provide any funds to reimburse states for supervisory expenses.

There are already more than 100,000 training establishments

that states have approved for veterans. You can see what a tremendous job it would be to inspect all of them," explained the doctor.

While it is impossible to estimate how much unscrupulous schools and employers have profited through loopholes in the educational laws, the sum must be tremendous, continues Dr. Brown. He cites these typical cases:

A flying school has divided the training course into three parts so that it can collect \$500 per course for each veteran, or a total of \$1,500 per man. For the entire course had been given for a fee of \$500.

A shoe shop that hired men under the "on-the-job" program gave no instruction, and the veterans learned only what they could pick up by watching other workers.

Most of the offenders are private trade schools, Dr. Brown says. Non-profit institutions including most colleges and universities, are not guilty of these practices.

The senate committee that is investigating war contract scandals is running out of funds. Senator Mead, chairman, has asked for more money to deal on the committee's tasks. It got \$35,000 early in the year. Now, for more money was explained by Senator Brewster. He said unexpected expenses had been incurred during the probe. The committee combine, in which Representative May has been called for testimony.

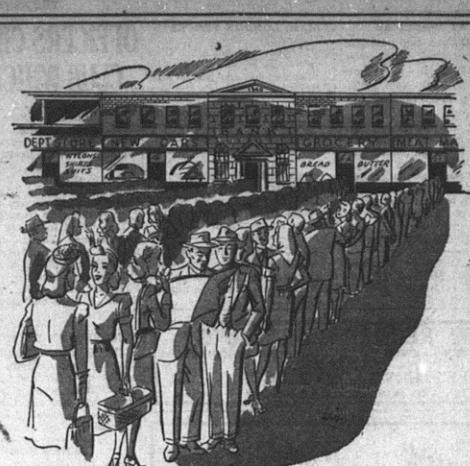
light and other sensitive aircraft

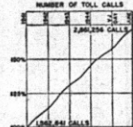

and has continued to increase, another 22% since the war ended. And during the war W. P. B. restrictions prevented us from ordering additional switchboard equipment or providing more copper toll lines. As a result we are trying to complete in 1946 over two times as many calls with the same amount of equipment and lines that were in service in 1941.

Immediately following release of W. P. B. restrictions, we placed orders for three more switchboard positions for Norwalk. The manufacturer quoted us a delivery date of eighteen months, but by paying for overtime work we were able to get two positions the middle of this month, and they should be in service by September first. After six months of strikes at the copper mines, we have now secured copper wire and are constructing more toll lines between Willard and Norwalk, and will then add to the Plymouth-Willard toll lines.

These are the reasons for delays in present telephone service, and we are doing everything possible to remedy the condition at the earliest possible moment. We believe that plans now under way to render proper telephone service are of primary importance. When they are completed, further consideration will be given to the type of equipment.
