

382 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN SCHOOL HERE

Plymouth's school enrollment this year is slightly under the 400 mark set last year with 382 pupils listed. There is a possibility that this number may be increased somewhat when complete schedules and classes are established.

The sixth grade has the greatest number of pupils with 44 enrolled. A total of 201 comprises the first six grades as follows: first grade 36; second grade 33; third grade 24; fourth grade 36; fifth grade 28 and sixth grade 44.

In Junior high, the seventh grade has 38 students; eighth 30 and the high school as follows: freshmen 31; sophomore 30; junior 27 and the senior class 25, making a total of 382 students, eighteen less than in 1945.

LICENSES GO ON SALE MONDAY

State Registrar of Motor Vehicles Frank M. Quinn announces that 1947 Ohio drivers' licenses would be placed on sale, Sept. 9 at 750 deputy registrars' offices throughout the state.

Present licenses expire at midnight, Sept. 30, and Quinn cautioned it would be illegal to drive without a 1947 permit after that time.

All applicants, except returning servicemen, must present a 1946 license to obtain registration without a driving test. Servicemen may obtain examination-free licenses for six months after discharge, but will not be permitted to drive without one during that time, Quinn asserted.

Applicants without 1946 permits will be required to present themselves to the state highway patrol for examinations before obtaining next year's licenses, Quinn declared.

Prices of the permits remain the same, 40 cents for an automobile operator and 90 cents for chauffeurs and truckers.

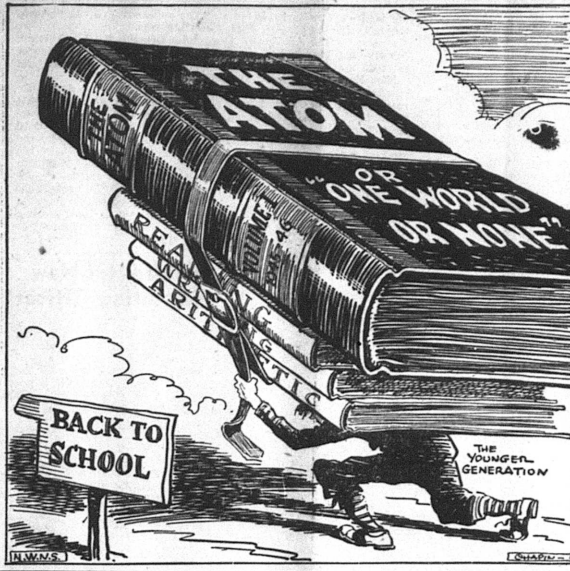

LOG CRUSHES MAN TO DEATH

RETIRED HURON COUNTY FARMER DIES AT NEW LONDON AFTER ACCIDENT.

NEW LONDON — Frank Deenen, 83, retired farmer, died in New London hospital Saturday afternoon of injuries received in a logging accident on the H. H. Johnson farm north of here Saturday morning.

Witnesses said Mr. Deenen was crushed by a log that rolled from the top of a truck owned by James Francisco, of Olenia, during loading operations. Deenen, an old hand at logging, was watching the operations when the accident occurred.

Hospital attaches said both his arms were broken and his chest was crushed. He never regained consciousness.

Mr. Deenen is survived by one son, Elmer, with whom he lived on a farm seven and one-half miles northwest of New London on the River Road.

BAY BRIDGE IS NOW TOLL FREE

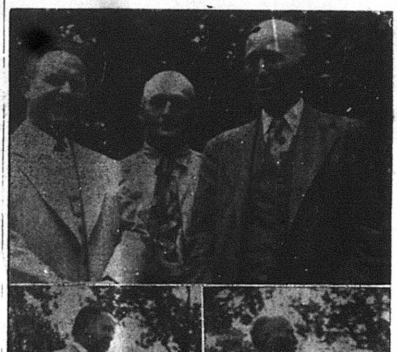
The Sandusky bay bridge is now toll free.

MANY FARMERS TURN OUT PICNIC; HEAR CONG. LEMKE AND M'GREGOR

Before an audience of approximately 3500 farm women and men, Congressman Wm. Lemke of North Dakota, scored the present administration for its reckless spending, a continuance of foreign loans, and warned of communistic activities in this country.

Congressmen Lemke and J. Harry McGregor of the 17th Ohio District, appeared on the speakers platform Sunday afternoon at the fourth annual picnic at Mary Pale Park, sponsored by the Ohio Marketing Quota Protest group, and school systems.

Lemke didn't take long to get started on his attack on Communism which he states exist in activities of our State Department and school systems. He stated that there are 50,000 "commies" on government payrolls, and some of them on various committees in Congress. "Back in 1940 there

M'GREGOR GIVES SUMMARIES OF CONFERENCES

Fulfilling his announcement of Friday, May 10th, in the House of Representatives in Congress, Congressman J. Harry McGregor made his annual visitations to the six Court Houses of the counties in the 17th Ohio District, so that he might have the opportunity to be of service and learn the views of his constituents. The conferences started on July 29th and were completed on August 10th.

During the Court House meetings approximately 675 persons called upon the Congressman; about 60 per cent of this group submitted definite problems for assistance such as veterans insurance, dependency, allotments, priority problems, questions relative to securing surplus property. State Department matters relative to bringing relatives and friends from foreign countries to the United States, and even to the extent of bringing sweethearts to the United States from overseas for marriage. A number of students called upon the Congressman to ask his aid in order to expedite financial benefits as given under the G-I Bill of Rights. Those persons who did not come for specific cases discussed problems of general interest and the questions most asked were—why don't we have sufficient sugar; why is farm machinery so scarce; why so many materials are being shipped to foreign countries; and what is necessary in order to secure permission to construct houses and buildings.

Great interest was shown especially in the atomic energy program and a number of views were given relative to the establishment of permanent peace. The Congressman stated he was highly pleased with the response from the constituents of the 17th Ohio District, which shows the people are greatly interested in the subjects of the day and are willing to give him help in his many legislative problems. The Congressman in a statement, complimented the people of the 17th Ohio District for their knowledge of governmental affairs, both historic and foreign.

Following the Court House meetings, Mr. McGregor made seventeen speeches to various groups in the 17th District and at the conclusion of each meeting an open forum was held, in order that various views might be exchanged. Approximately 2700 people were in attendance at these meetings.

AUGUST WEATHER
August, 1946 was one of the coldest Augusts on record. The average for the entire month was 66.1 degrees or 5.1 degrees below normal. Only once did the thermometer hit 90, on the 4th. The last nine days were exceptionally cool, with a low of 40 degrees on the 30th. Light frosts were reported on the muck, but apparently did little damage.

Rainfall was also scanty the total being 2.03 inches, a deficiency of 1.13 inches. The greatest was .53 inch on the 21st, 12 days were clear, 16 partly cloudy and 3 cloudy. The prevailing wind direction was from the north.

At the end of the month most corn was in the "milk" stage and almost all stand-still. At least three to four weeks of warm days and nights and a good rain are needed to insure a good crop.

Since March and April got turned around, maybe the same thing will happen with August and September. Here's hoping! J. A. R.

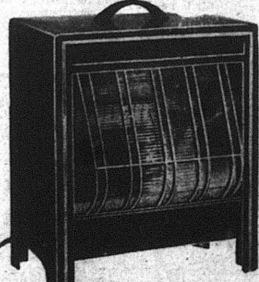

Jesus and Sincerity of Speech.

Lesson for September 8: Exodus

Proverbs 26:23-28; Matthew 26:59-72.

Memory Selection: Ephesians 4:25.

The dates of the several passages used in the lesson show that after several thousand years we are still prone to insincerity of speech. For the last passage tells how Peter thrice denied his Lord. And insincerity of speech is still prevalent. So the lesson is a timely one.

Not so many are guilty of bearing false witness in court, for comparatively few are summoned. But there are other ways to hurt a neighbor by a bad tongue. Even a string of the shoulders, with no word spoken, can slander another.

Respect another's character if you would have your own respected. For "curses, like fowls, fly home to roost." The passage from Proverbs shows that falsifying is bad policy. "Whoso diggeth a pit shall fall therein."

Poor old Peter! In the freight he was afraid and ill at ease. He could not remain still. When one man accused him of being a disciple of Jesus, he denied it; then went out onto the porch, where he again denied his Lord. When he had returned to the fire and this and that accused him, saying his speech betrayed him as a Galilean, he began to curse and to swear, saying, "I know not the man." No wonder he then went out and wept bitterly.

The only way to avoid the perils of insincerity is always to speak and act the truth.

(Continued from Page One) were 18 members of Congress who registered as members of the Communist Party. Today, 1946 there are 84 such members registered. It will be your opportunity this Fall to change the situation, and it is your duty to know for whom you vote.

Opposed British Loan Lemke reviewed the recent British loan of four billion dollars, and he minced no words in calling the American people and Congress a "bunch of suckers." In venomous terms he scored the International Bankers and the "Foreign Colony" in Washington. Lemke said the time has come to stop supporting the loafers of the world. Claiming that while England controls 30 per cent of the world's wealth against the United States' 9 per cent, Lemke stated that Great Britain, if financial aid was desired, should sell some

of her holdings, rather than beg the U. S. out of its much-needed dollars. In discussing the recent British loan, Lemke told of the terms and conditions under which the loan to England was made by the U. S. "England," he said, "is to pay back \$50 million dollars a year while it is able to pay back. And if she does pay back a down payment, we have agreed to spend \$50 million a year in England for an educational program." Lemke claimed that England's war debt was only \$5 billion, 750 million dollars. He gave statistics on the fighting forces of England compared with those of the United States, and in his remarks about the British Empire, Lemke said that "If Great Britain ever had a virtue she had lost it."

Any Indebtedness Lemke pointed out the accumulated indebtedness of the nation by comparing its debt of 19 billion dollars sixteen years ago when the present administration took over to the huge \$282 billion dollars in expenditures and future liabilities. He revealed that every man, woman and child is faced with a \$4,000 mortgage, that it will take many, many years to wipe away this debt.

During his discourse Lemke made some biting references about our present day Supreme Court, the White House, and has been changed to a profit-making racket from various angles, and that present conditions can be said to be the result of the Administration and "the communies."

Lemke's New Plan

After concluding his attack on the Administration, Congressman Lemke outlined his plan, which he stated would give our government a new life and new blood, and do away with the perpetuation and build-up of one man or one clique. Lemke favors a direct primary and a direct election. He wants the Four Freedoms for the world written into the United Nations Charter. No veto power would be granted to any nation.

Sovereignty of State to the States, to stop deficit spending, and balancing the budget. Congressman Lemke said it was about time for the States to take care of their own problems; that the States are and can solve their own problems without the Bureaucratic dictates from Washington, who think they have to run the whole country.

Speaking of "inflation," Lemke said it can be stopped if we stop the printing presses. He pointed out that there is six times more money in circulation today than at any time of the Roosevelt Administration. He gave several examples of inflation and its reaction, and inferred that the returning soldier boys would have to pitch in and help pay off the seven hundred billion dollar debt.

In his closing remarks Congressman Lemke stated that government by bureaucracy must be stopped. He told of 29 government agencies lending government money; 65 agencies and bureaus; 2100 bureaus and agencies on our backs all the time. He scored the continuance of subsidies, bureaus and needless expenditures which have been popular the past four years. Lemke said that the three million employees on government payrolls should be cut to 500,000 within the next two years, and charged the Administration with keeping this vast number on the pay roll as a build-up for votes at election time.

Instead of lending money to foreign countries, shipping our products to nations who do not even know the use of them, Lemke would give the common American laborer a living wage so that he could properly live and support his family; enjoy a freedom that he has not known for years, and to insure a good education for his children.

Lemke favors in returning part of the nation's wealth back to those who produce it by providing \$100 a month for those who reach the age of 60 years. The plan, as outlined by Lemke, is feasible for it is honest to the voter and to the American citizen; the six-year (1 term) office of the President and Vice President would hold no grapes for an individual who might want to run for a second term. He has vision in the cutting of red-tape and government expenses, and the care of the aged. It was a grand wind-up to a well-delivered talk. Threatening rain clouds brought the affair to a quick close, but not before Congressman McGregg and Lemke were surrounded by scores who asked questions, and sought information on government affairs and conditions.

Chairman Fackler extended thanks and appreciation to all those who had assisted in getting organized for the picnic, and special mention was made of those farmers who came great distances. Forty-four representatives were present from forty-four counties, and a goodly number was in attendance from this vicinity.

HOFFMAN FARMS PURCHASE NEW TYPE VEGETABLE HARVESTER

Modern methods of farming took another step forward this season when a new mechanical vegetable harvester was added to the equipment of the Charles Hoffman farm, located west of Plymouth, and managed by Burr Knaus.

The harvester will handle carrots, onions, beets, turnips and other small vegetables, and with a special attachment potatoes can be successfully gathered. Mr. Knaus, in explaining the harvester, points out that it will save many man hours for the vegetable grower in gathering in crops. In a recent test the harvester averaged nine crates of onions per minute. In regular production the machine will dig, clean, top and crate five to six crates of onions per minute. The machine has been in action on the Stambaugh farms, where it has proved very satisfactory on the large onion acreage there. It is reported that one day last week, four men harvested eleven hundred crates of onions. So effective does the harvester function in the field, it is said that the Stambaugh farms has placed an order for four of these units.

In announcing the purchase of the Chickering Vegetable Harvester, Mr. Knaus stated that he came across this machine while up in Michigan last fall, and that the order was placed in December, 1945. Mr. Knaus is highly enthused over the harvester as he feels that it will play an important part in vegetable production on some parts of the large 750 tract under his supervision. This season, Mr. Knaus stated, he experienced a loss in onion acreage and the machine is being operated on the Stambaugh Farm to check its performance, which everyone has found very satisfactory.

Sprays and Machines

In a long-range program for the Hoffman Farms, Mr. Knaus pointed out that there is no doubt but what quite a number of acres will be used in the growing of vegetables, including onions and carrots. With this in view, Knaus is experimenting with weed-killing sprays. The first of the spray experiment which was used this season on carrots, has given bright aspects for a continuance of this type of spray. The particular type of spray used destroys all weeds in the field, and does not harm or damage the plants.

Vast Operations

Few citizens in the community hardly realize the vast operations which are carried on at Hoffman Farms. Knaus, who has managed the farm for the past twelve years, tells of them under the new owner, Charles Hoffman of Mansfield, states that new methods of farming are applied each season, many of them proving successful. "While the Hoffman Farms are not an experimental station," Knaus said, "we do believe in trying and pioneering new practices such as spraying and the employment of new machinery."

Some of the new practices employed on the farm, not in a conservative measure, nor on an extensive scale in the feeding of cattle and hog production. A great recreation area within easy driving distance of the great majority of Ohio's population is being developed by the Muskingum Conservancy District. Stretching from Newark on the west to the Ohio river on the east, from Marietta on the south to Akron on the north, the Muskingum Valley with its ten beautiful lakes occupies over 8000 square miles—almost a fifth of Ohio's total area.

Though already popular (more than a million and a half visitors are expected to visit the lakes this year) their charm, beauty and facilities are still unknown to many Ohioans.

The lakes themselves cover a total of 25 square miles and have a shoreline of 365 miles. They are picturesque, irregular in shape, and reach up in long bays into the valleys between the hills.

To insure their use by the general public, the entire shoreline is owned or under control of the Conservancy District. Fishing, boating, camping and picnicking can now be enjoyed at virtually all of the lakes.

However, the Conservancy board has chosen Seneca Lake near Seneca (Noble County) Ohio; Atwood Lake near Carrollton, (Carroll County) Ohio; and Pleasant Hill Lake near Loudonville, (Richland County) Ohio; for major development. Here shelter houses, playfields, picnic tables, ovens, wells, parking areas, bathing beaches and cottages will be constructed.

Not only have all ten lakes been stocked with fish which are furnishing sport for thousands of Isak Waltons, but conservation plans are resulting in a continuous increase in the game and bird population of the area.

Nor is the usefulness of the Muskingum lakes limited to the summer season. Winter sports, such as skating and skiing, are being enjoyed by ever increasing numbers.

In addition to the three lakes mentioned above, the construction of this great lake system involved more than the building of huge dams. Two villages were relocated, railroads moved, power transmission, telegram, telephone, oil and gas lines relocated, highways changed and bridges built, protective levees constructed and cemeteries moved.

There are seven other lakes in addition to the three mentioned above. They are: Charles Mills (Richland County), Beach City (Tuscarawas County), Leesville near Leesville (Carroll County), Tappan northwest of Cadiz (Harrison County), Clendenen southwest of Cadiz (Harrison County), Piedmont near Freeport (Belmont County), and Willis Creek southeast of Coshocton (Coshocton County).

When plans now under way are fully developed Ohioans will have recreational and sporting facilities said to be unparalleled in this country.
