

More Births Than Deaths Recorded During Past Year

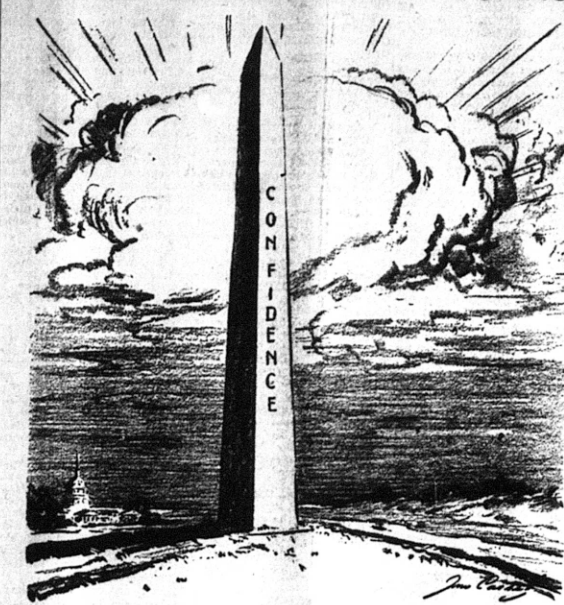
Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Nickler have moved from New Haven to their recently purchased property on Route 61, north of Plymouth, known as the Carpenter farm.

F-R-H Shop Talk
