

FR-H SHOP NEWS

In my rounds for news items, Neal Shepherd told me that HARRY HAS been said about me, but that he didn't have the heart to repeat it. Thanks, I say, for what a fellow doesn't know doesn't hurt him. ... my slogan happens to be "Don't worry about your enemies, but keep an eye on your friends."

Well, what's holding up tractors this week? Perhaps Bill Root can answer this one. At any rate, you can be sure that it's no lack of cash at FRH, but reverts back to material shortages, such as engines, gas tanks, etc. The production for the past six weeks ran about 150 units, but next week the outlook isn't so good.

Jack Hoppert, who has been somewhat of a liaison man between source and production, looks forward to the adoption and priorities on steel, etc. Jack has had many years experience, and he knows the overall picture as far as steel and its relationship to heavy goods is concerned. He predicts that if priorities are adopted, the FRH equipment will get a high rating, followed by export demands. Some interests in the country seem to be concerning the FRH equipment instead of accepting cash, they demand sheet, which in turn gets a higher price. There is no doubt but what black market operations are causing much concern, but the adoption of restrictions will have a tendency to ease the situation.

It may be interesting to know that all the shipments of locomotives which were made to France under Lend-Lease, only Plymouths are still in operation. In fact, we were the only ones that were able to make delivery on schedule, which speaks well for FRH. Incidentally, our export representative is now in South America, and it looks mighty good for Plymouths and FRH Clay Machines there. In fact, we're taking considerable orders for the King of Sparta, which is the King of Sparta. We can get the natives trained in keeping their knives beautiful.

W. M. SNOW a tractor dealer of another make, who resides in Cycle, N. C., recently wrote a letter to us, saying "Dorsey, I opened up the letter by saying: 'I saw my first Silver King Tractor today, and was amazed at its performance and in the field. But on the other hand, those who are buying equipment these days are looking at the background of a firm and its ability to render service. So we should be really proud of our ability to render service, and the necessary parts when required.

The "Friendship Train" which is now touring the nation to boost food conservation program for Europe will stop in Mansfield on Saturday, November 15th, at 4:30 p. m., coming over the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Plymouth has been asked to help and Mayor Joe Lasch has asked Rev. M. P. Paetzsch to assist in the project. With such short notice, it is impossible to make any kind of a house-to-house campaign, but Rev. Paetzsch is contacting all organizations, churches and businesses that care to participate in same.

The idea isn't a can or a can of that, but rather cash donations to purchase cases of food such as dried beans, evaporated milk, macaroni or spaghetti. Containers will be placed at the Peoples National Bank, Black & Gold, Suttles' Clover Farm Market, Weber's Cafe, Fortney's and the Advertiser. These will be picked up at the close of business Friday evening, and a check sent to Mansfield to purchase food.

Food donated in the area will be loaded on the Friendship Train when it arrives from the West and the side area is participating in the project.
