

REMAINS OF SGT KUHN ARRIVE; FUNERALS TUES.

Services for Plymouth's first returned soldier were held Tuesday afternoon when final rites were conducted for Elwood Kuhn. Members of Elmer-Paisel Post, American Legion, were present and participated in the services. Rev. Paetznick, Legion Chaplain officiated.

The remains were shipped from the European theater, arriving in Galion Monday morning. Members of the family, relatives and friends gathered at the Snyder home where they were the services. Interment was made in the Galion cemetery.

The deceased was born near Shiloh on March 1, 1911. Attending Shiloh schools, Mr. Kuhn graduated in 1929. After his school years, he was employed in various local business places, where he made many friends and acquaintances.

At the outbreak of World War II he entered the 82nd Airborne Division, receiving early training at Camp Albion, and at Ft. Bragg, N. C. He left the States in May, 1943, to serve in the African area. He saw action there, and also in Sicily, Italy, France, Holland, Belgium and Germany.

Elwood made a splendid record while in service, and shortly after entering, he became Technical Sergeant. He was twice awarded the Purple Heart, and also received the Bronze Star. While in Germany he was wounded severely and on February 2, 1945, he passed away.

Surviving Tech. Sgt. Kuhn are his mother, Mrs. Ida Kuhn, three sons, Mrs. Marie Dierker, Galion; Mrs. E. D. Stull, Lexington; and Mrs. Ruth Kuhn at home; three brothers, Paul Kuhn of Akron; Woodrow Kuhn, Mansfield; and Arthur Kuhn of Plymouth.

During the years Elwood Kuhn made Plymouth his home he won the admiration of the entire community. He was a man of many people. During the three years he was employed at Darling's Market, he became well-known to hundreds in the community. His happy smile met customers daily, and he seemed to inject some of his cheerfulness into everyone. Elwood also served part of the old Elmer-Paisel Market, and Wayne's Restaurant.

In training and in actual combat, Elwood Kuhn still carried the same spirit with him that made other people happy. And the one thing that most of his friends and acquaintances will remember most about him was the smile he always wore. The deepest sympathy of the community is extended the family in the last hours of sorrow. . . thoughts of those yesterdays that come back as as the years pass. . . paid to one of Plymouth's finest and best soldiers. . . Tech. Sgt. Elwood Kuhn.

Doings In Congress

By Congressman Wm. Lemke Congress is in session. The President delivered his message—a message full of holes large enough to throw a cat through. Let us have the facts. Let us stop playing politics. The situation is too serious. America's future is at stake. As to foreign relief, during the adjournment, we had over two hundred Congressmen roaming about in Europe. These are the DP groups. They are in number. They are as po-

litical minded as the various individuals in the Executive Department. Upon their return, a few talked more like representatives of foreign governments than as members of the American Congress. Others give you the low-down on the European situation. They agree that this foreign romance, at the taxpayers' expense, should be stopped. They tell us that there are some worthless short ribs of beef and other

American luxuries to the extent that they have grown fat and lazy. They tell us that there are also some worthy DP groups. These cut the wood and render services for the favorite groups. This under the auspices of the American Occupation Army. There are also official crooks, grafters and black marketeers. They tell us that due to misgovernment—due to the Teheran, Yalta and Potsdam blunders—there are millions of indolent. These hate us, but live on American charity—or should we say American stupidity. There are also hungry children—hungry because of indolent parents. A sensible solution to this problem would be to have the Red Cross and the Salvation Army take over. They are best equipped for the job. No political grafters or black marketeers or incompetents are needed. The indolent parents should be told to go to work or suffer the consequences.

The Marshall plan will produce only hatred and war. It is as stupid as it is dangerous. If adopted, it will create an additional indebtedness of \$20,000,000,000. If adopted, we will have created an international WPA that will be hard to abolish. Under the existing rate of taxes, it will take eighty-six years to pay our present indebtedness. This \$20,000,000,000 will have to be borrowed, and payment postponed for eighty-six years. With simple interest at two and a half percent it will, at that time, amount to \$38,000,000,000. With compound interest, it will be \$160,000,000,000. The time has come that we talk plainly and call a halt to the further looting of America under the Marshall or any other plan. Anyway, why accept a plan by a General, who does not yet know where he was on December 7, 1941. If he did not know then where he was, does he know now where he is?

much different, underneath. City folks work hard; like to come home at night to their families; and relax with a moderate glass of beer, like we do.

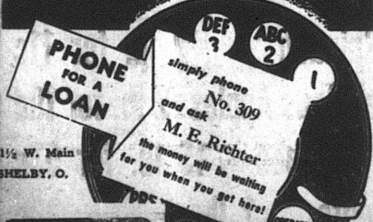

OPEN LETTER TO RURAL PEOPLE

A meeting was held November 6th, in the Court House by members of the Ways and Means Committee of the Richland Rural Life Center and township captains and solicitors working in a county-wide campaign to raise sufficient funds to purchase and develop a site for the promotion of better rural living. A check-up of results to date from eight out of eighteen townships showed slow but sure gains. The option on an acre tract for the Center calls for \$2,500.00 cash by December 1st. To obtain deed for the place, a four room house is to be built which will be a part of the permanent development of the site, but on which the present occupants, Floyd and Bertha Reding, are to be given a life lease. We have money enough to make the cash payment and a part, but not enough yet, to build the house. We must have this in sight before December 1st.

This project was started as a result of leaders and workers in all rural organizations getting together and discussing the needs of rural Richland County and trying to find means of meeting some of our common needs on a cooperative basis. So a county-wide call was issued to all rural people who might be interested, to meet and decide upon a proper procedure. After much work and research by a steering committee, their recommendation to buy an 80 acre farm belonging to the Redings and develop it into a Rural Life Center was unanimously approved. This farm lies one-half mile east of Oakland Church as you drive out Route 545 from Mansfield. It is as near central in the county as could be obtained for a suitable site, and is within a half hour drive from almost any point in the county.

People of rural Richland County, here is a great opportunity for each of you to help yourselves to a place of your own for camping, schools and institutes for any age group... a Center for rural life recreation, programs, parties, picnics and public gatherings. It is a long-time proposition, but it requires cash now to develop the site. It will not spring into complete development over night, like the mushrooms that pop up on the premises... the development of the Richland Rural Life Center needs your hearty financial support and mine.

Farmers Hear Talk On Swine

Nearly forty Huron County farmers heard Herbert M. Barnes, Extension Specialist in Swine Production, discuss feeding, parasite control and the Ohio Swine Improvement Program on Tuesday evening, November 18th, in the Court House.

Barnes emphasized the uses of protein supplements to increase the efficiency of corn in the ration. One experiment, which Barnes related, showed that a group of hogs in dry lot receiving corn alone gained 363 pounds of corn for 100 pounds of gain. A similar group of hogs on dry lot receiving corn and protein supplement required but 400 pounds of corn and supplement for 100 pounds gain. The rate of gain with supplements was also much faster.

Control of round worms with sodium flouride was also discussed. Several producers present indicated they had used that treatment. Barnes recommended one pound of sodium flouride to 100 pounds of dry feed. Just enough of this mixture should be prepared to last one full day. Feeding the dry feed in self-feeders or troughs gives best results. Slop feeding sometimes results in overdosage.

The next meeting for farmers interested in swine production will be held on December 16, in Norwalk. Mr. Barnes will further discuss feeding, emphasizing the use of soft corn and local feedstuffs. He will also emphasize

size swine breeding programs. O. H. Seiler, Perry Township, is chairman of the committee which planned the meetings. The third in the series will be held on January 6, 1948.

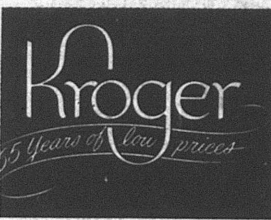
