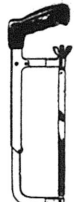

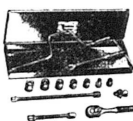

541 Marriages Listed in Huron County in 1946

NORWALK—The number of marriages in Huron Co. last year broke all records with a total of 541 recorded in the probate court, according to statistics from the court clerk. This figure is nearly double the marriages which took place in 1945 when only 309 were recorded. The month of May, June, August and October were the most favored for the weddings with 50, 59, 56, 52 taking place, respectively, during those periods.

Other activities of the court show that it handled 68 guardianships, 31 cases affecting minors, 33 adoptions and two corrections of birth record. Throughout the year there were 114 wills admitted to probate, 100 letters testamentary issued, 145 letters of administration issued, with a total of 933 estates administered. Estates of less than \$500, for which no administration were required, numbered 55.
