STEAL RABBITS

TWO INJURED IN AUTO WRECK

Two people miraculously escaped death in an auto accident at 7:15 Monday evening, when the 4-passenger coupe in which they were riding crashed into a bridge abutment on Route 61, at the south-end of town.

Mrs. Levering, driver of the car, and Miss Dorothy Ross, were returning from Mansfield to their home in Plymouth when the crash happened. At the time of accident snow-furries made visibility poor, and a light coating of snow had hidden the highway. Indications point that Mrs. Levering had left the highway some 200 feet before the crash, and it is assumed that when she pulled the auto onto the road, it swerved into the bridge abutment, causing serious injuries to the occupants and completely demolishing the car.

A late check Wednesday morning on the condition of Mrs. Levering, who received the brunt of the impact, revealed that she may be suffering from a skull fracture or a severe brain concussion. Miss Ross, it is reported, is suffering from a fractured pelvic bone. Both women were badly cut and bruised, and shock was severe for a few hours. Immediately following the mishap the McQuate ambulance was summoned, and the victims were rushed to the Shelby hospital.

The impact of the car striking the solid concrete abutment was so severe that it threw Miss Ross out of the car into the bank of stream, and pushed the motor of the machine into the clutch and brake board, making the auto a total loss.

Mrs. Levering is the wife of Don Levering, who operates the Don's Grill, and they have resided in Plymouth for only a few months. Miss Ross, an employee of the grill, resides here in a furnished apartment on West Broadway.

The deceased was born Dec. 8, 1862 in Paris, Ill., but spent most of his life in the vicinity of Ganges, where he operated for many years as a farmer, but he retired from farming a few years ago. Mr. Lybarger was not content to sit by idle hands, and he practiced on a lot of painting and wood carving. At these hobbies he became exceptionally good, producing some very beautiful work on canvases and carving that portrayed much skill and patience.

Mr. Lybarger was a member of the Reformed Church at Ganges, and was one of the best known citizens in that community, holding the highest respect of all who knew him.

He was also a charter member of the Ganges Band.

Surviving are his widow, Minnie Lybarger; two daughters, Orla and Mabel; and a son, Walter. Wilda Bistline of near Ganges; and two sons, Maurice Lybarger of Mansfield and Glenn Lybarger of Shelby.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. Friday at the Ganges Reformed church, Rev. Harlan J. Miller officiating. Burial will be in the McCate funeral home in Shiloh until Friday noon.

Thieves Enter 2 Club Houses

A thief or thieves entered the club house at the Shelby County Club, either late Saturday night or early Sunday morning and took \$500 in cash from the lockers. Hubert Wayne greenskeeper, who has been locked after the club house while Manager Wade Bricker is in Florida, reported the robbery to the Richland County sheriff's office.

Wayne said that admittance to the club house was made by breaking a pane of glass in the door. The thief obtained a pass key to the lockers and rifled several of them before coming onto the club cash which had been put away in one of the lockers.

Nearly all of the money was silver, receipts taken in at the club, few past days.

Evidently money was the only object of those who ransacked the club house as very little damage was done to any of the furnishings, and none of the golf equipment was molested. Authorities are carrying on an investigation with the hope of obtaining a clew.

Following a window to gain entrance into the main hallway of The Sky Club Restaurant at Municipal Airport, Mansfield, a thief used a cleaver taken from the kitchen and went to work some time Monday night. He chopped open the office door, and finding a steel safety box, he took it out on the landing floor and carried it to the street.

After rifling the box, which Harry Junker, Sky Club auditor, said contained approximately \$500 the thief nonchalantly walked off, leaving the wrecked box and cleaver at the scene of his crime. Deputies from the sheriff's office said they tracked him in the snow for a distance of three miles before losing his trail.

This robbery followed closely on the one that was staged at the Shelby County Club Saturday night, and authorities are inclined to believe it is the work of the same person.

Awaits Sentence

Charles Tabb, 30-year-old man, who gave Cleveland as his home, was convicted Tuesday afternoon in Richland County Court on a charge of attempted breaking and entering a building and larceny.

Tabb was found guilty of an attempt to burglarize the Quality Coal Co. in Shiloh last October. His defense, hinging upon the claim that he was in Cleveland at the time of the crime, failed when the three judges hearing the case agreed unanimously in the guilty verdict.

Sentence was deferred to give the prisoner's defense counsel, Atty. Joseph Ellison, opportunity to file a motion for a new trial on the ground of appeal if he so desired. Hearing the case were Judges G. E. Kalbfleisch of Richland County, and Judges S. S. Sams, county, and Leland R. Rutherford of Morrow county.

Model Egg Room At Caravan Show

Another feature, designed to keep the humidity of the egg room at a desirable level, is a pipe connected to the water system which will spray the walls whenever necessary.

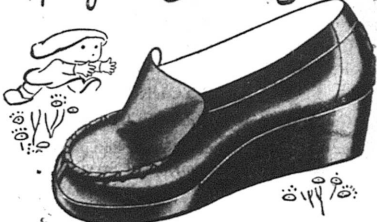

OHIO POWER JOINS IN NEW STEAM PLANT

Today Mr. Harold Turner, Vice President and General Manager of The Ohio Power Company, announced that his company was about to begin the construction of a steam electric power station with an initial capacity of 190,000 horsepower to be located on the Ohio River near Graham Station in West Virginia, a few miles upriver from Pomeroy, Ohio. The announcement comes at a particularly opportune time, for this month the world of science and industry is celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the birth of Thomas A. Edison, a native Ohioan. Edison, best known for his development of the incandescent electric light, also invented the dynamo, a machine that has made possible service to the public by business managed electric power companies such as The Ohio Power Company.

In making the announcement of his company's decision to build this addition to the system's facilities Mr. Turner said, "The beginning of this plant marks the culmination of ten years of planning on the part of The Ohio Power Company officials and the engineering staff of the American Gas and Electric Service Corporation, the service company affiliate of The Ohio Power Company. Studies by the engineers over a period of years indicated that when loads became of a sufficient magnitude a large steam electric generating plant should be located in the

southern part of our system. "The management of the company, after making comprehensive estimates of probable increases in demand for power during the next few years, decided that now is the time to go ahead with the project. "The plant is to be owned jointly by The Ohio Power Company and the Appalachian Electric Power Company, an affiliated company. "The idea of a jointly owned plant is not new with us," said Mr. Turner. "For some thirty years we have operated jointly with the West Penn Power Company, a non-affiliated corporation, a power station in West Virginia north of Wheeling known as the Windsor Station. Joint ownership and joint operation permits economies in first cost and in operation that cannot be obtained if each company builds its plant independently of the other. "The plant will be known as the Philip Sporn plant, named after the Executive Vice President and Chief Engineer of the American Gas and Electric Company, in recognition of his leadership in the development of economical steam power generation and transmission. It will be located adjacent to a large coal acreage controlled by the company with sufficient coal underlying to supply the plant with coal for about thirty years. However, for the present it is not planned to construct an mining operations to the coal used will come to the plant by barges on the Ohio river. "The capacity of the first unit in this plant will be 190,000 horsepower, although with the load growing at its present rate it is probable that before this first unit is in operation another of the same size will be under construction. The generating unit technically known as a cross-compound turbine will be operated at a throttle pressure of 2,600 pounds per square inch with the steam at a temperature of 1050 degree. "On the basis of engineering estimates, and we expect to meet these estimates," said Mr. Turner, "this new turbine will be more efficient than any other steam power unit that has ever been built or projected. "Last summer," he continued, "we began installation of an additional 134,000 horsepower unit at our Tidd Plant located near Brilliant, Ohio, on the Ohio river. This unit, however, will not meet the load requirements of The Ohio Power Company after 1949 and, therefore, we found it necessary to undertake this new project. It represents a very large investment but we have every reason to believe that it is justified by the demands of our customers. New industries are coming into the territory and existing industries are expanding their operations. In addition, we find on all sides that wider use is being made of electricity not only industrially but by commercial and residential customers as well. "Business establishments are finding it profitable to use electricity to a greater extent for lighting, refrigeration, air conditioning, and in many other ways," he said. "Our residential customers are clamoring for electrical devices for kitchens, laundries, and other home uses. As soon as such devices are available in quantity we shall need more electrical capacity to operate these appliances. "Work on the new plant will be started in April and completion is expected by the summer of 1949. The cost of the initial development is estimated at approximately \$20,000,000.

Poultry Feeding To Be Discussed

Poultry keepers of Huron County will be given an opportunity to hear D. D. Moyer, Poultry Specialist of Ohio State University. This discussion meeting will be held Friday evening, February 28, at the Court House in Norwalk, starting at 8 o'clock. Mr. Moyer will discuss "Feeds and Feeding of Poultry." This discussion will apply both to the growing and laying flocks. Recent experimental data has proven the importance of good range in the economic production of pullets. Mr. Moyer will be in a position to present these newer ideas in the use of range and home grown feeds. Poultrymen throughout the county are cordially invited to attend this meeting. Job placements made through the Mansfield office of the Ohio State Employment Service, a division of the Ohio Bureau of Unemployment Compensation, increased during January, totaling 238, compared with 226 during December, Manager C. W. Handley said today. Placements made by occupational groups, included: professional and managerial 1; clerical and sales 27; service 33; skilled 7; semi-skilled 55; unskilled 115. Out of the 238 filled through the Mansfield office, 115 were taken by veterans and 69 by women. Manager Handley said. Still available for job openings at the close of the month were 944 applicants for work, including 239 women.

**What Day Did

I close this great subject feeling that Christ had some definite purpose in mind when He gave us the Sabbath. Why has He given us this particular day? The answer given in the book of Ezekiel 20:12 "Moreover also I gave them My Sabbath, to be a sign between me and them, that they might know that I am the Lord that sanctify them." The Sabbath is a two-fold sign. Its proper observance reveals Christ, first as Creator, then as Redeemer or Redeemer. The Sabbath stands out as a sign that Christ made this world in six days. The Sabbath is also a sign of Christ power to save us from sin or sanctify us. (Eze. 20:12) When man sinned, and a Redeemer became necessary, the same Sabbath that Christ gave to man first as a sign of creation, became also a sign of redemption, or redemption, of Christ's power to save man from sin and sanctify him. Again the Sabbath stands as God's appointed sign of creation and redemption.

Hence there was no need nor room or resurrection of Christ for any other day to come in as the Lord's day to memorialize redemption. All who love God, should love the Sabbath of Jesus, which points to the blessed Son of God as Creator and Redeemer. What a privilege it is to keep His Sabbath and wait for the badge or sign of Christ, acknowledging Jesus as our Lord Creator and Lord Savior.

The 66th Chapter of Isaiah, verses 22 and 23 shows that the seventh day Sabbath will be kept in the new earth. "For as the new heavens and the new earth, which I will make, shall remain before me, saith the Lord, so shall your seed and your name remain. And it shall come to pass that from one new moon to another, and from one Sabbath to another, shall all flesh come to worship before me, saith the

**Unemployment
In Richland Co.
On The Increase**
Unemployment benefit payments in Mansfield increased during January with an average weekly number of 179 unemployed individuals receiving payments under the Service Bureau Readjustment Act of the G. I. Bill of the Ohio unemployment compensation law, according to Manager C. W. Handley of the local office of the Ohio Bureau of Unemployment Compensation. During December the average was 153. Payments in Mansfield totaled \$16,813.24, with \$10,928 going to unemployed ex-servicemen in readjustment allowances and \$7,885.34 to jobless civilians covered by the state law. New claims filed under the two laws totaled 230, a gain of 17.3 per cent from January. Manager C. W. Handley stated the increase to the gas shortage in industry, shortage of freight cars needed in shipping, shortage of steel and critical parts, and inventories being taken.

Continued claims under both the federal readjustment act and state law are now being filed in the Mansfield office every two weeks instead of weekly because of a recent drastic cut in Bureau administration funds by the Federal Bureau of the Budget necessitating the layoffs of approximately 450 Bureau personnel throughout the state. In addition to reporting bi-weekly, claimants also will receive their benefit checks every two weeks instead of weekly because of the short-

age of claims processing personnel in the Central office of the Bureau of Unemployment Compensation at Columbus.

John F. Root has been with the firm since he got out of college and that's been quite a few years ago. For twenty-one years, Miss Pearl Elder has been in the bookkeeping department, and it's very hard to believe that she's been with us that long. To day she looks as young as she did twenty years ago, and her disposition is just as charming and pleasing as it was when she first began her duties here. She has the capability of pleasing everyone all the time, and she feels very badly when a mistake bobs

up in her figures. All through the day Miss Elder handles invoices, and a couple of times each month she takes time to write out the checks. Even with all the intricacies of seeing that each invoice is approved, paid and filed, she has scores of other things to divert her attention.

Her background as a bookkeeper is a very interesting one, and gives her the experience of many years with several firms. Being a native of Canton, she finished her schooling there, and her first bookkeeping work was with the Penton Publishing Co., Cleveland. She liked her work there, but was attracted back to her home town when she was offered a place with Knight Tire & Rubber Co., which was later merged with the Republic Tire Co., Youngstown. She went with Republic as a member of the auditing department, and after several years she resigned there. Her next position with the R. L. Watkins Co., Cleveland, was as a manufacturer, and after much consideration, she resigned from this organization and decided to leave her profession altogether.

Leaving the Watkins Co., Miss Elder journeyed to California and while there she became interested in hydro-therapy. After a course in this work she became associated with the Pasadena branch of the Glendale Sanitarium, which was under supervision of the Battle Creek (Mich.) Sanitarium at that time. While it was a wonderful experience, Miss Elder undoubtedly had been at figures too long to be content with anything else, so on her return to Ohio she became employed at FRH, and here she has been happy and contented since. In Plymouth she makes her home with her brother on Plymouth Street, where she enjoys the best in reading and finds much of her pleasure in radio. 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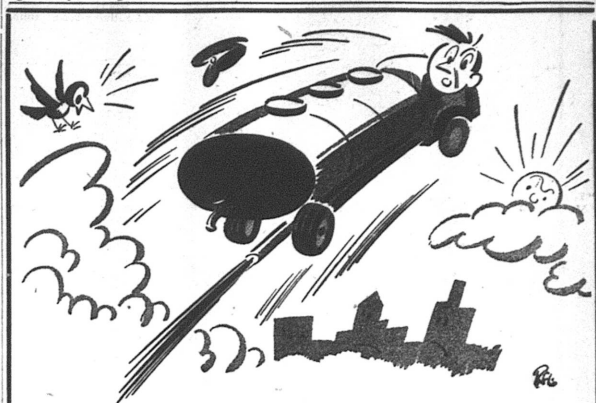
