JANUARY WEATHER

January, 1947 was a comparatively mild, wet month. The average temperature was 31.7 degrees or 3.4 degrees above normal. The highest was 59 on the 30th; the lowest zero on the 22nd.

Precipitation totaled 3.97 inches or 1.73 inches above normal. The greatest in 24 hours was 1.38 inches on the 29th and 30th with many fields flooded.

On the 21st a near-blizzard raged all day, but the total snowfall for the month only 2.8 inches. In fact, the snow melted by November, December and January amounted to only 8.3 inches. This compares with 15.7 inches for the same months a year ago and 45.5 inches (remember!) two years ago.

While this dearth of snow is good for man and beast, it isn't so good for wheat. There were 24 days of alternate freezing and thawing. Nevertheless, wheat still looks fairly good, due to the good start in the fall, and may still survive the "dies of March."

What Day Did Christ Sanctify

PART III

Mark 2:27 says "He said unto them, The Sabbath was made for man." Those who claim that the seventh-day Sabbath was intended only for the Jews squarely contradict the Lord Jesus, who declares that the Sabbath was made for man. The command to keep the seventh day, the fourth commandment, is binding on everybody

in the world, just as the third commandment, which says, "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain," and as the fifth which says, "Honor thy father and thy mother."

Since the Lord Christ spoke this seventh-day Sabbath command from Sinai along with the other nine (1 Cor. 10:4; Neh. 9:11-13), Exodus 20:8-11 is a commandment from Jesus Christ for man to keep holy the seventh day, or Saturday. If we take Him as our Lord, how can we refuse to keep this seventh day, which is the only day He ever blessed and set apart for man to keep. (Luke 6:46.) When did Christ as the creator sanctify or set apart the seventh day for man? In the Book of Genesis we find that the seventh day was set apart as the last day of creation week. "And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it; because that in it He had rested from all His work which God created and made." Gen. 2:3

The keeping of the seventh day is not some Jewish ordinance instituted by Moses and later abolished by Christ. The seventh day was sanctified or set apart for man by Christ the Creator at the very beginning, when He made the world for man, twenty-five hundred years before Moses was born.

In 1 John 2:6 we read these words: "He that saith he abideth in Him ought himself also to walk, even as He walked." Christ is our example. (1 Peter 2:21.) 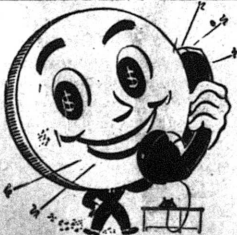
"Of course," says Sam, "you run into intolerance from time to

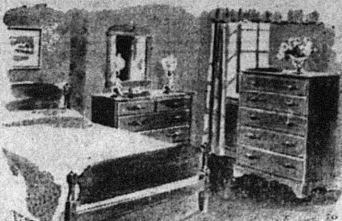
