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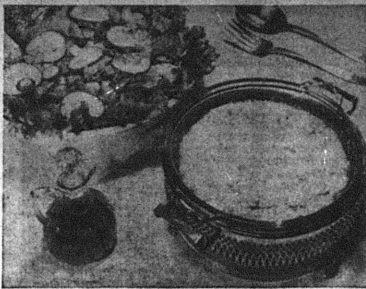

STRAIGHT THINKING

All over the country people are talking about two things: Our foreign policy or lack of one and "Labor troubles."

Could it be that our befuddled mind over big, full-sized issues is due to what almost amounts to a national way of thinking in terms of besidismen?

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We need to drop the diminutive. . . . We drop it where it will break all to pieces.

We need to think in a grown-up way, seeing things in their right size and in their right importance.

The little woman may be a 200 pounder, married to a shrimp — so she isn't really the little woman at all, in relation to her spouse.

We must begin to think straight and to do that we must start from scratch.

You can't think sloppily on a part-time basis.

We hear men talk of this big son of mine, in a clear effort to make it appear that the son is bigger and more nearly a man than he is actually.

Now the Chinese make it a practice to demean their possessions before strangers. Especially is a gift a poor and insufficient thing.

But this is a national courtesy custom, intended to convey the idea that the guest is greatly respected or admired and that it is impossible to show him sufficient hospitality.

With us it is a national self-kidding business. . . . When we talk of the boys who are men, possibly well past middle life, we betray a type of infantism and we also rob the boys of the dignity of manhood.

Likewise, the little woman, by the reason of the description, a person of inferior status, is a dependent, although generally it isn't intended.

But all this exaggeration, up or down, is arrant nonsense. It is most inaccurate. Thinking accurately part of the time surely doesn't make for accuracy the rest of the time.

How about getting grown up in our thinking, about the little things as well as about big things?

It could not fail to help us in assessing the larger issues of life. . . . And the larger issues get larger all the time.

POULTRYMEN ARE ELIBLE TO ENTER CONTEST

Richland County poultrymen will compete with poultry breeders in ten north central states in the 1947 phase of the nation-wide Chicken-of-Tomorrow program.

With more than 2400 poultry raisers from this county eligible to enter the competition, according to D. D. Slade, chairman of the Chicken-of-Tomorrow contest committee.

"All that is required for Richland County poultrymen to become a part of this important breeding program is a flock of 50 baby chicks hatched between April 13 and 19," Slade said. "Poultrymen entering the contest are urged to contact C. M. Ferguson of Ohio State University, chairman of the contest committee in this state."

Aimed at developing chickens with improved meat-type characteristics, the contest calls for regional prizes. The top award will go to the poultry breeder who develops the most improved meat-type chicken.

Slade urged Ohio poultrymen to continue their efforts to develop superior meat-type chickens, which, he said, are paying in the dividends to the entire state. He pointed to the Chicken-of-Tomorrow contest as an outstanding example of the poultry industry's determination to provide practical use on farms.

The importance of poultry farming in Richland County, Slade said is reflected in the latest report from the Census Bureau which shows that 84 per cent of the county's farmers received income from poultry. These producers, according to the report, have more than 1,632,000 chickens and sell nearly 2,100,000 dozen eggs.

Meetings of the Flying Farmers will be held in Townsend Hall on the campus, so some of them will travel about as far by automobile between the airport and the campus as the hardy travelers of 1914 covered between their homes and the University. The program for rural airman runs from 9:00 a. m., to 3:00 p. m., March 21st.

In 1914, those attending the meetings on the campus had never heard of 4-H boys and girls clubs, because no such organizations existed. The 4-H club program at Farm and Home Week in 1947 will have as its feature event, March 20th, the awarding of service certificates to rural men and women who have been 4-H club advisors from ten to twenty-five years.

The machinery exhibit in Ives Hall, March 19-21, will consist of equipment which was only a fair off vision in 1914. Experiments then were being made to find whether electricity could have any practical use on farms. People talked about possibilities of using gasoline powered machines to replace horses in farm work, and the well or the cellar was the only farm refrigeration.

A small group of Ohio men have attended every Farm and Home Week at the University. The total attendance in 1914 was only 140. 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Know Your INDIANS

Louis Boudreau

"Lou" (Shorthand)

Born in Harvey, Illinois, July 17, 1917. Bats right. Throws right. Height: 5'11". Weight: 170 lbs.

Now in his sixth season as chief of the Cleveland Indians, Lou Boudreau can hardly be referred to as the "Big Manager of Baseball"—an appellation he has carried since succeeding Roger Peckinpaugh during the 1942 campaign. Not only will Lou lead the thirty "Big Managers of Baseball" in the American League throughout the past five pennant races would make it a double misnomer.

Although Boudreau has broken and tied a host of American League records, he is probably best known as the author of the famous "Williams Shift". So effective was his scheme of holding the right field side of the diamond against this famous Boston slugger that it was used by nearly all the other American League clubs, to a degree at least, and finally by the Cardinals as they humbled the mighty Williams in the 1946 World's Series.

Lou first gained national recognition during his undergraduate days at the University of Illinois where he was a member of basketball and baseball. As an infielder-catcher he attracted the attention of Cleveland scouts and was quickly signed to an Indian contract and sent to Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The following summer, at Buffalo, he teamed with Ray Mack in what developed into one of the most brilliant keystone combinations in baseball—a combination which was brought into Cleveland late in the 1939 season.

Lou, however, far outstripped his teammate and went on to lead all American League shortstops in fielding in 1940, '41, '42, '43, '44, and '46, setting a new world record in 1944 with 978. This same season he also hung up a

new double play mark for shortfielders as he participated in 134. During 1945 he added two more major league scalps to his collection when he tied a record with four doubles in a single game and another with five extra base hits in one contest.

In his first three full seasons of play he was named to the American League All Star team and fully justified his selection by hitting safely in half of his six appearances for a .500 average.

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Doings in Congress

Will we end the international WPA, and elect a Republican President in 1948? If the Republicans will realize that the election on November 5th was not a mandate to go back to the dark ages, but a repudiation of bureaucracy because of inefficiency, arrogance, regimentation and Russification, then there will be a Republican President.

The Republican standard bearer must be a liberal. He must be for America first, last and all the time. He must be devoid of foreign ideologies. He must be big enough to cooperate with other nations, not as a perpetual Santa Claus, but as a statesman. He must demand equal justice for all nations. He must insist that the Atlantic Charter be incorporated into the United Charter.

President Truman will be no pushover. When he first became President, he took his advice from his own leaders in Congress and his Administration met with approval. Unfortunately for him, before the election he was inundated by the Rooseveltian leftovers—the rest of yesterday's. He followed their advice and made blunder after blunder. His popularity was at low ebb on November 5th.

The President, however, did

learn more from the election than some Republicans. Since November 5th, he has taken a firm stand against labor abuse, but not against labor. He knows that strikes are caused by employers as well as by employees. He knows that labor, with its friends, casts forty-eight percent of the vote, and that they have forty-eight percent say about the Government under which we and they live.

President Truman's personal and family record in the White House is gratifying to every American. The White House is no longer a revenue producing institution for the President's family and hangers-on. No wonder Elliott does not like Truman. No wonder that Mr. Wallace and Mr. Ickes no longer like Truman. The White House and the office of President have again become American institutions.

May I remind the Republicans that eighty-five percent of the American people are through with our Government being an international Santa Claus. They will be reminded of the cost on this international flirtation on March 15th when they pay their income tax. They will not accept as their candidate any Santa Claus who would buy good neighbors and deplete our natu-

ral resources, that belong to unborn generations. They will repudiate any candidate who wishes to surrender our sovereignty to any combination of foreign nations.

President Truman's foreign policy has not yet squared itself with American tradition, but it is rapidly moving in that direction. Since the election he has, and is playing a splendid game of politics. He has learned a lot from the last election. Let the Republicans profit by his example.

I am for this movement with all my heart, and am willing to donate my spare time or all my time to see this thing through.

Why can't we get some co-operation and start immediately. Boy Scout and Girl Scout funds can be raised without any trouble. People are generous with the Red Cross. Why not with this? Isn't this just as important to our community, as these other things are to our country?

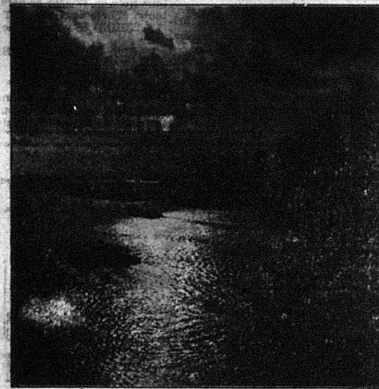

The SNAPSHOT GUILD



Shot by moonlight? No, this picture was taken late in the afternoon with the camera pointed toward the sun.

MOONLIGHT ON ORDER

SEVERAL years ago while vacationing at a small lake in the Adirondacks, I made a series of time exposures of the lake and the mountains by moonlight. After the film was developed and printed, I discovered that what had been a full, round moon appeared in my prints as an oval. This was caused by the relative movement of the moon and the earth during the time the shutter had been open. Had I shot from a different angle, so that the moon did not appear in the viewfinder, this fault would have been avoided. But there are simpler ways to obtain "moonlight effects"—and by day.
Certainly anyone looking at the snapshot reproduced here would think it was made by moonlight. Actually it was made at 4:30 of a late November afternoon. Still, it has all the beauty of a moonlight scene—deep, black shadows and brilliant highlights.
Such shots are especially effective for marine views or snow scenes and can easily be made with-

out special equipment. To make them, wait until the sun is low in the sky and shoot toward the sun. Be careful, however, to make sure that the sun's rays don't fall on your lens. This can be done by waiting until the sun itself is behind a cloud, by interposing an object between the sun and the lens, or simply by shading the lens with a hat or your hand so that the lens is in shadow.
Moonlight effects are usually made best with the sun fairly low in the sky and, as mentioned, to the front of rather than behind the camera. You simply underexpose to obtain the shadow detail. A snapshot with the smallest opening with a simple single-lens or box-type camera. If the light is bright, you do the trick. With folding cameras or those that have various shutter settings try 1/100 at f/16 or f/22. The contrast between the solid blacks and the brilliant highlights—as in silhouette shots—provides your moonlight effects.

ORDINANCE No. 148
An Ordinance determining that it is necessary to purchase the materials for and to install a Water Line from the south end of Plymouth Street to the corporation line on Shelby Road, authorizing the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs, to expend money, advertise for bids, and to enter into contracts, repealing Ordinance No. 132, passed on April 18, 1946, and declaring an emergency.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That it is hereby deemed and declared necessary to improve and extend the water plant utility by installing a four inch cast iron water line from the South end of Plymouth Street to the corporation line on the Shelby Road, said project including about 3650 feet of excavating about 3 feet 8 inches deep and 18 inches wide, 2700 feet of 4 inch cast iron water pipe, together with valves, hydrants and connections.

Section 2. That the plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed improvement are on file in the office of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs.

Section 3. That the entire cost and expense of said improvement is to be paid solely from the Water Fund. Said entire cost of the construction authorized in this ordinance shall not exceed the sum of \$7,000.00.

Section 4. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the Village Clerk, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the purchase, installation and improvement as hereinbefore set forth, and that the Village Clerk and the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs be and they are hereby directed to open any and all bids submitted pursuant to said advertisement and to enter

into contracts with the lowest and best bidder or bidders as provided by law.
Section 5. That ordinance Number 132, passed April 16, 1946, which ordinance provided for the expenditure of \$5,000.00 for the aforesaid improvement, be and the same is hereby repealed.
Section 6: That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall go into immediate effect. The reason for such necessity is that said line is needed for fire protection and the health of the citizens of said Village.
