

YOUTHS ASKED TO REGISTER IN KITE CONTEST

AWARDS WATER LINE CONTRACT

For the second time in two years contracts have been awarded for the improvement of the water main on Plymouth Street. A Cleveland firm was lowest bidder when the Board of Public Affairs reviewed the two bids for the project at its meeting on Monday night, April 7.

The B. F. Ashland, Cleveland turned in a bid of \$3,909.00 for the half mile water line construction.

L. Walker Fauber, Ashland, made a bid of \$8,108.00 for the same job. The Ashland firm was the successful bidder last year, quoting a price at that time of approximately \$4,600. Due to material shortages and continuing price increases the Ashland firm failed to sign an acceptance contract, and the water line extension was held up until last year, when the Board had to start over again.

Mr. J. Metz, representing the Cleveland office of the firm, said his firm would be willing to sign the contract, which calls for a \$500 penalty in the event the water line is not completed by August 1 of next year. The contract will be drawn up, and negotiations will be completed this week.

The removal of the old light plant building is on the Board's improvement program for this year, and the working out of detailed specifications for the construction of new outdoor switches to replace the old building is now under way. For many years the square building has housed the necessary electrical switches that make connection with the Ohio Power Co. feeder lines into town. The structure is considered a hazard from the standpoint of fire, as the majority of the equipment it now houses is obsolete, the Board plans to dismantle the building and make a new one, which will house electrical apparatus. With modern equipment being used, it will not be necessary to build a new building, as all of the new switches are designed for outdoor service.

The Board also plans the purchase of refrigerated drinking fountains to replace the ones around the Square. The new fountains, if kept water at a low temperature during the summer months, will be no different from a big feature with those who are thirsty.

A new street lighting transaction is to be purchased, which will be held in reserve in case of an emergency.

Current bills were approved and paid, and the meeting provided for President Harold Cashman, and members Thomas and Scott.

FR-H Shop Talk

Seems mighty good to be back on the job this week. Week before last, Roy Johnson had me right in the middle of a locomotive catalog when he was conducting for his department, and last week the flue had me on my back. . . but this week I'm determined to get back on the job with my column. . . even if I have to sacrifice the front page.

Although I haven't made the room for a couple of weeks I do have sufficient notes on hand to take up a little space, and I'll start where I left off. My last visit took me over to the service department of Silver King Tractor, and I found the boys busy getting tractors ready for local farmers. I mean by that they were working on Silver Kings which had been brought in by neighboring owners for a complete overhaul. And right here, I want to point out this feature is a big one for farmers who reside within twenty-five miles of Plymouth. They can get factory service when they need it, and the price is very reasonable.

I found Walter Myers fitting some piston bearings in a motor, and if you don't think that's precise work, you should see the operation. Every bearing had to be just right. . . not too tight, or too loose. . . and the pistons had to fit like wicks. Myers came on the tractor line in 1942, and he's been in the army took him, and he "signed up" with the 9th Army. He was in service two years and two months, eight months in the States. Myers used to work at the Shelby Carlton Service and he had some knowledge of printing, which proved beneficial, perhaps. He followed the army to the States, and he was his job to run the presses which were mounted on trucks. And his outfit advanced with him, and he would move up too. Maps, reports and detailed information of many activities were run off on the "off-set" press, and these were passed onto the men. Myers did a swell job in service, and he's doing equally as well on tractors, and the best of all, he likes his work.

Clarence Barnes is another vet back on the job. While Barnes is not in the service department, and Fred Ross are handling the farm tools equipment, and he is housed in the same building. Barnes went into service Nov. 11, 1943, landing in France on May 12, 1944. He was spotted by the Germans were overrunning that section of France when he went into action at the Battle of St. Lo. Here he was wounded, and he was sent back to the States. He was hospitalized at Camp Atterbury from Sept. 1944 to Dec. 1944. He came on the job at FRH in 1945, and he was employed at FRH many years before entering service, and he has performed outstanding service in both civilian life and in the infantry. Commendations on his work, and a desire to do his best at all times, it helps him to forget his many thrilling experiences while overseas. Clarence is keeping a thorough check on his department these days, as it won't be long before the "grand rush" is on, and he doesn't want to be caught short.

Remember back some fifteen years ago when Old Number One Silver King first went into action? Well, if you don't recall the date, Olie Lamoreaux, and Rusty Ross do. They were on the job that day, and they have been on the job ever since. Silver King is just past the two well known and well-liked men, and what they don't know about tractors isn't worth putting in the book. Lamoreaux isn't exactly "fastidious," but after seeing his home work shop a couple of summers ago, I'm convinced that he must be an unusual mechanic. He found his workshop clean, benches free of the usual rubbish; all screws and bolts neatly placed in glass jars and labeled according to size. In fact, I didn't think it was possible for a man to be so neat, especially in a place where he spends his spare time. And

ed tax system. I do not know where you can get a worse where-podge than that.

First, we have a normal graded income tax. Then to blind people we have a surtax. Then to confuse them still further, we top it with an excise tax. Any one who knows the way to accomplish the same results with a simple, graduated, net income tax, or by a tax on manufactured or produced articles to be added at the source. In the latter case the tax would be added to the price by the producer or manufacturer. It would be passed on to the consumer, but it would not be pyramided. Then every consumer would know what portion of what he buys goes for taxation.

I feel that the bill that we passed should have further reduced taxes in the lower brackets. This could have been accomplished by raising the exemptions. But under the gag rule we could not offer that. We single, people, and we amend an amendment would have been adopted, and the exemptions would then have been raised to \$2500 for married, and to \$1500 for single, people. That would have taken care of the tax reduction where it was most needed.

As to a general tax reduction, we should have thought of that before we permitted ourselves to be propelled into World War II. We single, people, guard the internationalists' prop. Now into World War III. Our Government now owes and has assumed future obligations amounting to \$685,000,000. That is six times our normal income. It will have to be paid by taxation.

READERS' FORUM

Dear Editor:
We hear much nowadays about Juvenile Delinquency and parental delinquency. There is much talk and blame passed out by responsible authorities and by parents. But as usual nothing is done about it. If parents ask for police help too often, they do not get it.

This problem of "Juvenile Delinquency" can never be probably handled unless parents, school authorities, police and the community work together. For some time a condition has existed in Plymouth which I believe is leading many children into wrong attitudes. That condition or problem which I refer to is the "borrowing" of bicycles. I am sure that many parents, in most cases, have sacrificed certain necessities, in order to even keep a bicycle for their own. Doings in Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

The House passed the tax reduction bill. This bill will be considerably amended in the Senate. Then, it will go to conference. Needless to say that many Members of the House are not satisfied with all the provisions of this bill. It contains many good provisions, some that are not so good, and some that are bad.

The bill was passed under a gag rule. That rule provided for general debate, but also provided that no amendment could be offered unless accepted by the Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee. In other

words, the majority first voted to gag themselves, and later on to amend that they could not amend the bill because they were gagged. I have opposed gag rules. I have advocated their abolition. The argument for the gag rule is that a tax bill is so complicated that the whole tax structure might be destroyed by an amendment. However, I feel that the tax bill is not all that complicated. The Ways and Means Committee is not all that wise as proven by the complicated

tax system. I do not know where you can get a worse where-podge than that. First, we have a normal graded income tax. Then to blind people we have a surtax. Then to confuse them still further, we top it with an excise tax. Any one who knows the way to accomplish the same results with a simple, graduated, net income tax, or by a tax on manufactured or produced articles to be added at the source. In the latter case the tax would be added to the price by the producer or manufacturer. It would be passed on to the consumer, but it would not be pyramided. Then every consumer would know what portion of what he buys goes for taxation.

I feel that the bill that we passed should have further reduced taxes in the lower brackets. This could have been accomplished by raising the exemptions. But under the gag rule we could not offer that. We single, people, and we amend an amendment would have been adopted, and the exemptions would then have been raised to \$2500 for married, and to \$1500 for single, people. That would have taken care of the tax reduction where it was most needed.

As to a general tax reduction, we should have thought of that before we permitted ourselves to be propelled into World War II. We single, people, guard the internationalists' prop. Now into World War III. Our Government now owes and has assumed future obligations amounting to \$685,000,000. That is six times our normal income. It will have to be paid by taxation.

Data On Our American Legion

NOTE: This is the fourth in a series of fourteen articles explaining the aims and workings of the American Legion.

WHAT LEGION IS WORTH
Members of the American Legion during the past 28 years have paid more than \$13,000,000 in local, state and national dues and these have been the basis for its prosperity. Commander Alvin H. Garrett of the Garrett-Riest Post No. 503 revealed this today in a story on the organization's worth.

"The American Legion today is worth well more than \$100,000, 000 in all its national, state and post assets," Commander Garrett said. "This is represented by national, state and local endowment, reserve, restricted and building funds, by post treasuries and by the thousands of clubhouses and other real estate held by the organization."

"The national, state and post organizations also own millions of dollars' worth of war bonds." National assets, he said, include a \$7,000,000 child welfare and rehabilitation endowment fund, \$5,000,000 of which was raised in 1923.

"This has been so well husbanded," Commander Garrett said. "That despite the great depression the original fund is still in excess of \$7,000,000 and in addition 21 states have yielded \$3,250,000, which has all gone into national child welfare and rehabilitation activities."

"The operating budget of the American Legion for 1947 is 4,047, 207.18, the largest in its history."

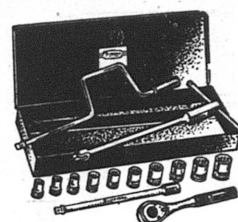
