Elias B. Helder Laid To Rest

Friends, neighbors and relatives gathered Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the McQuate Funeral Home to pay final tribute to Elias B. Helder who passed away Monday in the Mansfield General Hospital where he had been a patient the past sixteen years.

Funeral services were held at the Nazarene Church of Shelby officiated and burial made in the Mausoleum in Greenlawn cemetery.

The deceased was the son of Peter and Hannah Plotts Helder and was born January 18, 1860, twelve miles east of Canton, in Stark County and at the time of his death was 87 years, 3 months and 24 days of age. He received his early education in the Plymouth schools, later attending the Ashland Medical School.

However, he decided not to follow this profession and as a young man operated a mill near Stark County where he met his bride, Miss Clara Martin and was married on August 11, 1892 at Windsor, Ontario, Canada.

For fifty years he was a resident of Plymouth where he was known to all as "Doc" and he and his horse "Honey Bee" were familiar sights on the street of Plymouth as Doc conducted his drayage business. "Finer Day" was Doc's byword and his cheery greeting really made the day finer for having come in contact with him.

In February 1940 he became a member of the Church of the Nazarene at Shelby, which church he faithfully maintained through these last seven years of his life.

VETS GETTING POPPIES MADE

Disabled veterans at Sandusky workshop are rushing completion of memorial poppies which will be worn throughout the U. S. in honor of the war dead on Poppy Day, May 24th.

All of the little red flowers are individually shaped by hand, providing employment for veterans unable to do other work.

Making poppies at the hospital (or workshop) is directed by the Poppy Department of the Auxiliary, which provides the material, instructs the workers and pays for the flowers produced.

Veterans of both world wars are employed, older veterans of World War I who have made poppies in previous years working side by side with the younger disabled men of the second conflict, making the flowers for the first time.

the veterans to help provide for themselves and their families and is a powerful morale builder.

Because of the increased public response to the Legion and Auxiliary Poppy Day appeal, more veterans are being given employment this year than ever before.
