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Doings In Congress

It is the old story—party regularity—close your eyes, vote and follow the leader. It was that kind of blind, dumb following of party leadership that kept the Republican Party out of the White House for sixteen years. It was that kind of blind, dumb following of party leadership that spelled disaster to the Democratic Party last November 5th. The Republican leaders should have profited by that experience. The truth is that President Truman learned more from that election than some Republicans.

Drunk with power, the Subcommittee on Appropriations, packed with ultra-conservatives, cut the budget estimates for the Bureau of Reclamation by 47 percent. If these cuts are permitted to stand, it will cripple the west. It will cripple irrigation. It will cripple rural electrification by delaying the production of hydroelectric power. Undoubtedly power interests are behind the scenes. They have singled out the Bureau of Reclamation because it develops hydroelectric power.

The power trust prefers to use twenty million barrels of oil a year in the production of electrical energy. That oil cannot be replaced. When turned into electrical energy it is gone forever. Yet oil is our greatest national defense. It is the only national defense in modern warfare. Our known oil reserves are being rapidly exhausted. We should conserve that national defense rather than to use it in producing electrical energy. This is especially so when the Bureau of

Reclamation can produce this electrical energy through the proper storage and use of water. Yet, the Jones Subcommittee would continue this waste of needed oil, and let the water that should be used for production of power and irrigation go unchallenged to the ocean. The house voted to cut the President's budget estimates of \$7,500,000,000 by \$6,000,000,000. This could be accomplished by a 16 percent cut straight across the board. Why was the Bureau of Reclamation singled out for a 47 percent cut? The reason is very obvious.

If these cuts are allowed to stand, then the Missouri River Basin projects will suffer, especially will the Fort Peck-Croby-Kennmare-Souris project be delayed. It is the east against the west. New York has forty-eight Congressmen, Pennsylvania has thirty-four, North Dakota has two. Fortunately, for the nation, there are just two Senators for each state. Wyoming, Nevada, Montana and North Dakota, with one or two Congressmen each against the forty-eight and twenty-four of New York and Pennsylvania, have two Senators the same as New York and Pennsylvania. We are going to carry this fight into the Senate, and I am confident we can get part of these cuts restored.

I am confident that sanity will prevail, and that the ultra-conservatives will see the light. They have already done enough damage to their party. If they are not careful, they will get a majority in the Senate. This stupidity will not be persisted in.

Did The Apostles Keep Sunday?

Some think that the Lord arose on the first day of the week, that it is divinely appointed that Sunday is to be observed as God's Holy day. After searching the Scripture it will be found that it is no more necessary to keep Sunday in honor of Christ's resurrection, than to keep Friday in honor of His crucifixion.

No one need to keep Friday to honor our Lord's crucifixion, because the Lord's supper is the divinely appointed way of commemorating the Saviour's death. (1 Cor. 11:26) Likewise no one need to keep Sunday to honor Christ's resurrection, because baptism is the divinely appointed memorial of the resurrection. (Col. 2:12)

If the Lord Jesus wanted us to keep the first day of the week in honor of His resurrection, would He not have told us about it in the New Testament?

Baptism and the Lord's supper, which did come in as new ordinance under the new covenant, are fully explained and commanded in the New Testament. If the first day, Sunday, had come in as a new day to be kept after the crucifixion, in place of the seventh day, it would have been fully explained in the New Testament. Since there is no proof whatever of the obligation to observe the first day of the week, either in the eight New Testament texts which mention that day, or in any other place in the Holy Scripture, there is no Biblical authority for keeping Sunday.

Is it safe to follow a man-made custom in opposition to what God commands? The answer to this question is found in Matt. 15:1-14. So dear reader turn to this passage of Scripture and ponder over those words and notice verses 3 and 9. Since there is no Bible authority for keeping Sunday, there is only one course for a person in this matter, and that is to keep the Seventh day, which Jesus Christ has hallowed.

Eighth Grade Tests

Know Your INDIANS

ROBERT WILLIAM ANDREW FELLER
"Bob"
(Pfeiffer)

Born at Van Meter, Iowa, November 3, 1918. Throws right. Bats right. Height: 6 ft. 1 in. Weight: 180 lbs. Hair, brown. Eyes, brown.

When Bob Feller set the Yankees down without a hit on April 30, 1946 he became the thirteenth pitcher in the history of major league baseball to hang up two no-hit games. His first, of course, came on opening day in 1940 against the Chicago White Sox. Oddly enough he won both by the narrowest of margins, 1-0.

To set down the countless other records and outstanding performances registered by "Rapid Robert" would require a good sized book. This prose situation has resulted in the publication of "Strikeout Story," Bob's autobiography, which will appear in store counters early this spring.

During his eleven years with

the Indians, about four of which were spent in the Navy, Feller has accounted for 132 victories—an average of better than 75 per playing season. On the basis of these figures there is every reason to believe that he may well be the first pitcher since Lefty Grove to win 300 games. This possibility becomes even more realistic when one considers his physical condition. Actually Bob is somewhat of a bug on the subject of training and probably takes better care of himself than any other player in baseball.

Digging into the records again briefly it is interesting to note that he has been selected to pitch for the American League All-Stars every summer since 1939 except when he was touring for Uncle Sam. Apparently National League opposition fails to solve his slants in even greater measure than the American for he has been touched for only one run and five hits during eleven and two-thirds innings of this competition.

1946 was a banner campaign for the 28 year old veteran as his 348 strikeouts equaled a record that had stood unchallenged since 1904. In addition he finished third in earned-run averages with 2.8; appeared in the most games, 48; pitched the most complete games, 36; pitched the most innings, 371; allowed the most hits, 277; and the most bases on balls, 153.

Besides his no-hitters, Bob tossed a pair of one-hitters, two three-hitters, four four-hitters, and ten shutouts. The twin one-hitters booded his lifetime total to eight—one better than Addie Joss' daisy record of seven.
