Doings in Congress

By CONGRESSMAN WILLIAM LEMKE

On the same day that we voted \$300,000,000 to foreign nations, the House Appropriation Committee cut the Agricultural Department's appropriation \$375,000,000. Foreign nations preferred—America forgotten. Cutting appropriations on wealth producing projects, and then voting billions for foreign nations has become the habit of the foreign colony within our midst.

Shouting economy, and then selling the American people short has become a hypocritical farce. There can be no economy—no tax reduction—as long as we give billions to Europe, Asia and Latin America. Since January 1st, the President and Congress have voted or given over \$3,000,000,000 to the Greeks, the Turks, the Mexicans and other nations.

Some of these gifts are camouflaged under the name of loan. They are made through the Export-Import Bank and the International Bank. However, it is the American dollars that are being given to a few international horse traders to enrich themselves at our expense.

We are traveling a strange road—an international road that leads

to destruction. "We are traveling a road strewn with human corpses—a road of foreign intrigue, deception and disaster—a road on which there are danger signals all along the line."

Just now comes a would be candidate for President, who proudly tells us that he hobnobbed with Stalin, the liquidator. He apparently feels that hobnobbing with this dictator, who outwitted and outgeneraled our Presidents at Teheran, Yalta, and Potsdam, will land him in the White House. He forgets that he too was outgeneraled. The liquidator is just too clever for our amateur diplomats.

This would be candidate now comes and tells us that we must be prepared to give one-tenth of all the wealth we create each year to foreign nations. The Chicago Tribune on May 21st ran a picture of a shipload of farm tractors, grouped on a dock at Philadelphia, ready for shipment to Poland. These tractors by right belong to the American farmers.

On the one hand we arm Greece and Turkey against communist Russia and its satellites, and on the other we send tractors

and war equipment which, in the event of war, can be used against Greece and Turkey. Are we not arming the world for our own destruction? This does not make sense, but it is our foreign policy.

This amateur diplomat does not know that we have already reduced our natural resources from eleven percent to less than nine percent of the world's supply. He does not know that never again

will we have enough copper, zinc or lead for home consumption. If such an amateur diplomat should ever get into the White House, whether the ticket on which he runs be labeled Republican or Democrat, whether he be at the head or at the tail end of the ticket, it will mean the depletion of our natural resources and our ultimate destruction as a great nation.
