

Shiloh Man Killed By Train

Peter Monroe Lykins, 82, was instantly killed Tuesday afternoon about 4:30 when he was struck by a speeding C. C. & St. Louis Fast train at the Main Street crossing in Shiloh.

A witness said he saw Lykins a few moments before he was struck and he was carrying a market basket. A moment later he saw the basket fly through the air. Richland county Sheriff Frank L. Robinson stated the body was thrown one hundred and sixty-five feet and was badly mangled.

The body was taken to the McQuate Funeral Home in Shiloh where funeral services will be held this afternoon, Thursday, at 2 p. m., with Rev. Henry Boehm officiating.

Survivors include six children, Lee of Shelby, Isaac, Shiloh, Mrs. Roscoe Rudd, Shelby, Ben, Plymouth, with Rev. Stewart, Marion and Mrs. Edna Oney, Columbus; nine grandchildren and one great grandchild; three brothers, Sam, Ashland, Ky., Tom of Lykins, Ky., Peris, of Caney, Ky. and one sister, Minnie whose home is also in Kentucky.

Funeral arrangements for interring the body were not completed late Wednesday.

The action states that the defendants are indebted to the plaintiff for \$1,750, plus accumulated interest at the present per annum, totalling \$1,294.30.

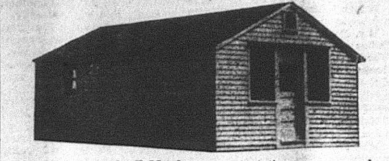

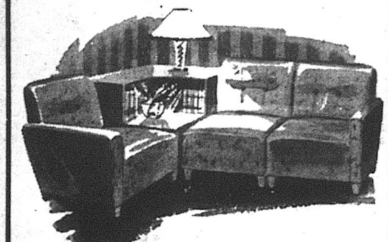

DOINGS IN CONGRESS

We hear groans because of the heavy tax burden. We get demands that the budget be balanced, and taxes further reduced. Later the same parties complain because of a cut in the appropri-

ation for a particular project in which they are interested.

The time has arrived for clearing the thinking. The nation cannot continue to go deeper into debt. Every man, woman and child now owes the Government \$4,750 for debts and future obligations. It is true that you have not given a note and mortgage on your home, but there is a blanket tax lien on you, your children and your home. One-fourth of all you eat, drink or use goes for the payment of this tax.

Little wonder that the most discussed issue in Washington is Senator Vandenberg's plea for \$400,000,000 to arm the Greeks and Turks against Russia — one of these-called fifty-two "peace loving" nations. This means another \$250 in taxes to be paid by the average family. This international lunacy will, in the end, increase the national debt by over \$7,000,000,000.

Senator Vandenberg may think that the "One Worlders," who, in the past, under cover were able to nominate the Presidential candidates in both parties, will nominate him. He is mistaken. The American taxpayers are getting their eyes open. They have had enough of this international lunacy. They demand that at least one candidate for President in 1948 prefer Americans to foreigners—one who will not give away what there is left of America.

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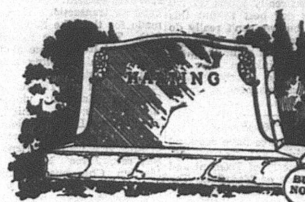

Columbus, Ohio, April 14—The initial distribution of \$11,425,932 in auto license fees to counties and municipalities in Ohio was started Monday, according to an announcement made by Edward T. Fogo, registrar of motor vehicles.

The warrant forwarded to the state auditor for issuing of the individual warrants to the county auditors, which will be accomplished in the next few days was made approximately ten days earlier than in 1946, according to Mr. Fogo.

The registrar also pointed out that this year's initial distribution is the largest in the history of the bureau, exceeding last year's initial distribution by \$1,500,000.

"The early distribution," State Highway Director Murray D. Shaffer said, "will enable the counties to follow the state program of commencing their road improvements at an earlier date."

Richland County \$123,071.04.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THAT IT IS NECESSARY TO PURCHASE AND CONSTRUCT SWITCHING EQUIPMENT FOR THE ELECTRIC LIGHT DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM, AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS TO EXPEND MONEY, ADVERTISE FOR BIDS, AND ENTER INTO CONTRACT THEREFOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That it is hereby deemed necessary to improve the light distribution system by purchasing the following and installing same, to wit:

High Power Switching Equipment and Installation at same at Point of Power Connection.

Section 2. That the entire cost and expense of said equipment and installation shall be paid solely from the Electric Light Fund. Said entire cost authorized by this ordinance shall not exceed \$3,000.00.

Section 3. That the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs and the Village Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and directed to advertise for bids for the purchase of said switching equipment and construction.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
