What's Going To Be Our Fate In 1948

During the war we became very familiar with every nook and corner of the world. We got to know important cities and countries because "our boys" happened to be located there. There is no doubt but what the war broadened our minds and imagination, and since the close of the fighting, we are still familiar with Sydney, Melbourne, London, Paris, and other large cities of the universe.

Our state department, press and radio keep telling us of the many changes that are taking place throughout the world, and we are prone to maintain a "personal" feeling. We in the small rural areas of the richest agricultural and industrial section of the world are about to forget the one hundred and forty million people that make up our United States.

There are always undesirable aftermaths after any war, but those that have been exposed the past year have shaken the faith of our people in our government. We cannot have good government without good leaders, and the quicker our congressmen and senators realize that it is im-

perative to re-establish confidence in our national conduct the better off the nation will be.

The Marshall Plan is familiar with most of us as an act of sending money, food and supplies to distressed countries. Certainly with the average American facing extreme costs in living, a high rate of taxation which is taking every cent he is earning, it naturally makes him feel that he is entitled to more wages. This is another year when labor will ask for more money, the manufacturer will increase his costs, and the average American consumer will pay out more for commodities. It is an endless spiral which is leading to a dangerously high point.

Our government can taper off the inflationary conditions that are causing great anxiety and hardship on American citizens. The first step to a definite solution is to freeze all wages, prices and to cut exports 50 per cent. This measure in effect for twelve months will do more good than operating all of the government's printing presses twenty-four hours a day for the next six months.

Since the depression of the late thirties statisticians and economists have tried vainly to remedy some way to overcome inflation, but you and I know that there is only one safe way and answer to the problem—supply and demand.

The Administration spoke last week of favoring an average cut of 40 per person on income taxes. This wouldn't be a drop in the bucket compared to increases in living costs, and the continued hidden taxes we pay on gasoline, oil, electricity, cosmetics and amusement, as well as scores of other items. Yes, we need tax reform and need it badly. A substantial tax reduction at the present time simply means that the wage-earner would have more take home pay and that the manufacturer in turn could reduce prices from 10 to 15 per cent. Steps in this direction are the only solution to re-adjustment to a normal and happy life. The slap-happy attitude of our government in the continuance of spending money which should be checked, and the only way to check it is to watch your

Congressman and Senator this Fall. And ending on down the line even to our state representatives. Discrepancies that occurred during the war can now be overlooked, but let's not let out too much sympathy to those foreign countries who keep on insisting they will go Communist unless they send them money and food. Machinery and equipment is a much better solution for them, plus a little work and responsibility, and as for making a choice between Marxism, Christ or our own skin, I'll stick to self-preservation first.

President Truman's program, which included everything except a quart of milk, is all right for those who are willing to take the crumbs of the few who run our government, but I still like the idea of State Rights and Individualism, which cannot be supplanted by an overall program doled out by a certain clique in Washington. The less our government has to do with our personal welfare the better off the country will be, and it will bring back a certain self-respect which we just lost during the Rooseveltian regime.

This idea is so great and important that it was the first lesson taught by Christ, even before He began the preaching and teaching of His world-saving Gospel, when as a mere boy, after having displayed in the temple of Jerusalem His superlative wisdom to the learned men of his time, "He went down with His parents and came to Nazareth (His home) and was subject to them."

If only our children today would follow the example of Christ! If only the families throughout America would model themselves after the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph! What a wonderful thing it would be if each family would set aside a little time each day together to Almighty God! Remember, the family that prays together stays together. To pattern our family life according to that of the Holy Family is the surest safeguard for ourselves and for our own great nation.

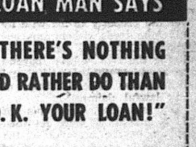

A resolution was passed requiring carnivals, circuses and other commercial enterprises to post a bond, on signing a contract for rental of the grounds.

A motion permitting the Rural Life Center group to hold a rummage sale at the fairgrounds to raise funds was approved. No date for sale has been set.

A financial report for 1947 presented by Secretary Kibler showed that the society's receipts totaled \$5,862, received from rent, fees, and tax funds. Interest received on \$14,000 worth of government bonds totaled \$382.

Spent was a total of \$4,048, on salaries, stationery, premiums, repairs and utilities. The balance in the treasury was listed as \$7,880.

ARMY AND AIR FORCES OFFER MANY BENEFITS

The U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force has a new plan for High School graduates which places greater emphasis than ever on education for Uncle Sam's soldiers, according to M/Sgt. Portman of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station, located in Room 3, P. O. Bldg., Norwalk.

"For the first time," said Sgt. Portman, "the High School graduate who wants to get the splendid training offered by the Technical schools, can make his own decision about this, type of work he wants to do in the Army or Air Force before he enlists. Further, he can specify the subject in which he wants schooling, and is guaranteed that education after he completes his preliminary basic training."

"The Army maintains some of the finest technical training schools in the world. More than a hundred different courses are taught. Likewise, the Air Force offers a wide variety of courses, ranging from radio, radar, wire communications, weather, and photography, to automotive mechanics, administration, and many other less usual subjects."

Electing an education in the Army or Air Force is now much the same as in schools and colleges. The prospective enlistee obtains an application form at the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station. After completing the application, checks are made to determine that there are openings in the particular course which the enlistee has selected. If such is the case, as it will be in most instances, the young man may enlist for three, four, or five years. The privilege of preselection is not open to those who enlist for a 2-year period, nor is it open to those than high school graduates or those with equivalent education. After enlistment, which is dependent on passing prescribed mental and physical tests, the enlistee takes the usual basic training and then is assigned to a school which teaches the subject for which he has applied.

"It is important for everyone to know that every man in the Army and Air Force who can qualify can enter the Technical

schools," said Sgt. Portman. "The preselection plan simply requires that he be a High School graduate or equivalent education."

"This is a really splendid opportunity for the young man to literally write their own tickets in the service today. They get a fine education in something that interests them. They prepare themselves for advancement in Army or Air Force and for a future career in civilian life. "The important feature of the plan is knowing beforehand just what you are going to study after you get into uniform. Judging from the large numbers of young men who have inquired about it, there seems to be no doubt that the plan is finding almost universal acceptance by the boys themselves and by their parents."
