Report Reveals Record Peak In Old Age Benefits

More persons are receiving monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits at the end of 1947 than at any previous time in the history of this Federal insurance system. This was reported by Mr. Edward P. Blanton, manager of the Mansfield office of the Social Security Administration, who said that at the end of 1947, 1,975,000 persons throughout the nation were receiving monthly benefits at an

average monthly rate of \$38.10. This compares with 1,648,000 beneficiaries and an average monthly rate of \$31,081,000 one year ago.

Nationally, monthly benefits certified for payment to retired workers, their wives, and their dependent children during 1947 amounted to approximately \$900,000,000. Monthly benefits to families of deceased workers (children, widows with young children in their care, aged widows, and aged parents) totaled about \$153,000,000. In addition, approximately \$30,000,000 was paid during 1947 in lump-sums to survivors of insured workers who were not immediately eligible for monthly benefits.

Reporting on the area served by his office, Mr. Blanton estimated that monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits paid at the end of 1947 amounted to \$55,000,000, an increase of about 5% over the amount in force at the end of 1946. The service area of the Mansfield office includes Ashland, Crawford, Knox, Morlet, Clark, Richland, and Adams counties.

Benefit payments in this area by type of beneficiary are approximately as follows: Retired workers, aged 65 or over, Number 1330, monthly benefit amount \$32,444.00.

Wives, 65 or over, of retired workers, Number 580, monthly benefit amount \$7,510.00.

Children of deceased or retired workers, Number 850, monthly benefit amount \$16,950.00.

Widows, regardless of age, of deceased workers who have their care one or more unmarried children under age 18, Number 250, monthly benefit amount \$5,100.00.

Parents aged 65 or over who were dependent on deceased insured workers, Number 20, monthly benefit amount \$255.00.

Emphasizing the family insurance characteristic of the old-age and survivors insurance program, Mr. Blanton said that 3 of every 5 beneficiaries now on the rolls are women and children.

Approximately 11,600,000 wage and salary earners in the United States have now attained lifetime insurance protection for themselves and their families under this program through completion of a required number of years work in jobs covered by the Social Security Act, Mr. Blanton said. This is an increase of 3,000,000 since the end of 1946. These workers have at least some insurance protection for life, regardless of their future work history.

The Social Security Administration also estimates that at the end of 1947 approximately 76,700,000 living persons had some wages credited toward old-age and survivors insurance benefits, an increase of 2,100,000 persons over the number reported at the end of 1946. During 1947, some 49,800,000 workers received wages in covered employment.

Still a problem is the fact that old-age and survivors insurance benefits are being lost because of delayed claims. Many persons are still unaware that benefits

are payable only if they are claimed, and that back payments cannot be made for more than three months before the date of application. Mr. Blanton emphasized two rules for preventing benefit losses: (1) workers reaching age 65 should come in to the local social security office at 405 Richmond Trust Bldg., Mansfield, even though they do not plan to retire immediately; (2) when a worker dies, some member of the family should get in touch with that office.

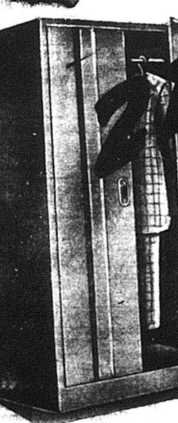

Stover is also the author of other books, among them are "What do we know about Life After Death," "Is Heaven a Place," "Are the Fires of Hell Real," and "Is There Life After Death?"

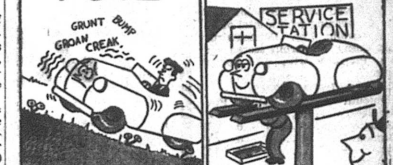

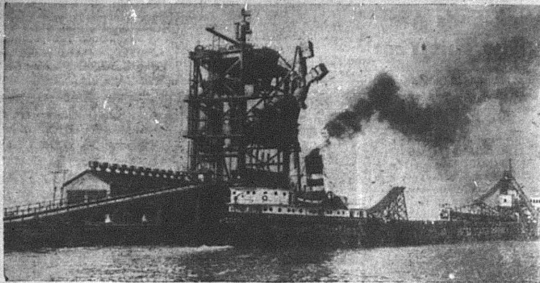

NEW B & O COAL DOCK AT LORAIN, OHIO READY FOR 1948 SHIPPING SEASON — The new four-million-dollar coal dock built by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad at Lorain, Ohio, as shown above after a test loading operation of a lake vessel. The dock, just completed, will be open for the Great Lakes shipping season in the spring. Principal feature of the dock is the electrically-operated coal dumper, the steel structure shown above the stem of the ship in the photograph, which is capable of picking up and dumping a 70-ton loaded coal car and then replacing it on the track so that the car may be returned automatically to the empty yard. As the coal is handled by the dumper, it is automatically washed and sprayed with a chemical solution to cut down the dust.

Lots of Cash Value In Farm Inventory

LIVESTOCK AND FEEDS RISE IN VALUE DURING YEAR CONDITIONS MAY CHANGE.

One cow is almost equal to three horses in the Ohio farmer's inventory at the beginning of 1948, and the only things on the inventory list which are worth less than a year ago are horses, meat fowl, and the seed of alfalfa, timothy, and alsike clover.

Rural economists at Ohio State University advise farmers to make careful inventories of their livestock and supplies of feeds and seeds to start their bookkeeping year because possible changes in value during 1948 might make the inventory an important item in making income tax returns for this year.

Average Ohio farm prices for dairy cows on December 15, 1947, were \$164 per cow and the value of horses averaged \$59 a head. Cows increased in value \$1 a head during the year but horses were worth \$7 less apiece in December, 1947, than a year previously. A 10 per cent decline in prices of cows would cause a loss of \$164 on a 10-cow herd.

Feed inventories will run very high at the beginning of 1948 when the average farm price in Ohio is about \$2.30 a bushel for corn, \$1.25 for oats, \$6.50 a ton for silage, \$19.50 a ton for mixed hay, and \$1.96 for soybeans. The prices given are on the farm and probably are low for eastern Ohio or for other areas where a considerable portion of the feed is bought.

Hogs are worth about \$25.60 a hundredweight, beef cattle \$20.40, calves \$26, and lambs \$21. The value of breeding stock should be partly determined by the age and condition of the animals when the inventory is made. Rises in farm prices of livestock during the past year have been \$2.60 a hundredweight on hogs, \$2.40 on beef cattle, 70 cents on lambs,

and \$5.50 on veal calves.

University specialists in farm management say the inventory is important if only to call the farmer's attention to the amount of money he had tied up in herds, flocks, and the feed supplies for them. The farmer's problem is whether he prefers to bet that whole amount on future price trends or to take part of his financial eggs out of that basket.

G. A. Hummon Enjoyed Work In Huron Co.

G. A. Hummon, Huron County Agricultural Agent, has been appointed to the newly created post of Business Manager of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, at Wooster, effective March 1st. Mr. Hummon, who has been Extension Agent in Huron County for the past nineteen and one-half years, makes the following statement:

"We greatly appreciate the opportunity of working with farm people in Huron County these many years. We appreciate the cooperation extended the workers in the Extension Service by farm organizations, special interest groups and the many, many individuals with whom we have come in contact.

In this new field of work as Business Manager, the duties will include the financial, the maintenance and the farm management programs at the Ohio Experiment Station. There will also be an opportunity to assist with the correlation of research work and the needs of farm people.

A successor to the position of County Agricultural Agent for Huron County will not be named until early February.

75 JOBS TO BE FILLED

COLUMBUS, O. — More than seventy-five assorted jobs with the Ohio Bureau of the Unemployment Compensation will be filled on the basis of showings made in Civil Service examinations scheduled for January 29-31, Frank J. Collopy, BUC Administrator, reported today.

Collopy cited openings for more than dozen auditors whose duties will include the auditing of payrolls for compliance with the Ohio Unemployment Compensation Law and the explaining of the Law and BUC regulations to employers.

Other BUC openings include those for employment office managers, interviewers and tabulating machine operators. Such openings, Collopy said, exist in a number of communities throughout the state.

Civil Service examinations are to be held in Athens, Canton, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton and Toledo. Application blanks are available at all local offices of the Ohio State Employment Service, a BUC division.

TAFT OPPOSES RATIONING WASHINGTON

— Sounding a keynote of Republican opposition to meat rationing, Sen. Taft (Ohio), predicted recently it would revive black markets and lead to even higher prices.

The Ohioan told a reporter that while he is not completely barring rationing or price controls, he does not believe that meat rationing would work.

"You have to set up just as big an organization to ration one item as to ration everything," Taft said.

"Besides, meat is the one thing most susceptible to black market operations. I am afraid that we would have a repetition of the time when cattle were killed widely on the farms instead of at the slaughtering houses, with the hides and other by-products being lost.

"Certainly the people who got beef through the black markets would have to pay even higher prices for it than they are now and a great many people would get practically none at all."

Although a handful of GOP lawmakers led by Senator Flanders (Vermont) have said they believe meat rationing may be necessary by spring, Taft's views reflect the attitude of Republicans generally toward President Truman's appeal for stand-by power to restore rationing and wage-price controls on a limited basis.

The party skepticism and outright opposition came into sharp focus when Secretary of Agriculture Anderson plugged for meat rationing and wholesale price ceilings on meat. He testified before the Senate Banking Committee, which is considering various bills to re-establish these war-time controls.

The committee assembled recently to hear representatives of veterans' organizations and Secretary of Labor Schwelmbach taking issue with Anderson's proposal for control over wholesale meat prices. The American Meat Institute said in a statement issued in Chicago last night that such a step would imperil the "health and lives of large numbers of people."

Halloween also falls on Sunday, October 31st.

Christmas will fall on a Saturday, and so will New Year's Day, 1949.
