

Board Lets Contract For School Building

The contract for construction of the four room grade school building has been formally approved. It is expected that actual construction on the new grade school building will start within a week or two.

HISTORY OF ISSUE
Another chapter is being written in the study of the Plymouth school system. A brief synopsis of the story up to the present starts with the planning in 1941 for a new grade school. Passing a bond issue of \$47,500 and promises of \$30,000 in aid from the N. Y. A started the demolition of the old school house built in 1870. After many delays the building was torn down about the time the World War II started. It was impossible to start the new building, but an annex to the high school was completed at a cost of \$13,000 from the board funds. Some material had been purchased toward the new building and the building fund stood at \$30,000. The N. Y. A aid was withdrawn. During the war years nothing further could be attempted. In 1946 with the school population gradually increasing, the board of education began working again on the problem of expanding the building facilities. A bond issue of \$50,000 was passed by the voters. A new architect, Mr. Charles Marr, was employed to draw up new plans for a building, and advertisement for bids brought a low bid of \$175,000. A short period of time elapsed when the plans were revised and the size of the building cut down. Again bids were received with the low bid of \$155,000. In a third attempt, with a still smaller building planned, NO general construction bids were received. The board extended the period of advertising and on October 1, 1948, received bids of \$85,000 for a four room building or \$138,000 for a six room building.

At this point a new chapter is starting. The building fund now has \$77,000 cash and \$10,000 in materials. This is enough to start the four room building. However that size of building

will not be sufficient for the expanding student body. A bond issue of \$48,000, making an increase in the levy of \$1.34 for each \$1000 valuation which brings the bonded indebtedness of Plymouth school district up to \$133,000, is available to complete the six room building.

Next week the needs of the school will be discussed by the school board. The P. T. A. will meet October 14th. Architect Marr will be present to explain the building program.

The conversion was blocked and the Wildcats led 26-0 at the end of the first half.

A fumble by Pilgrim quarterback Larry Schreck on the third play from scrimmage in the first quarter was recovered by T. Farley of the Cats and he carried the pigskin over the goal line for the fifth score for the visitors. The attempted conversion was not good.

The opposition marked up their last score in the fourth quarter when Ronald Trauger's attempted punt was blocked and the ball fell into the arms of J. Kelly who carried the ball over for the touchdown. The conversion was good and the score was 39-0 in favor of the Cats.

That's the way the score stood as the game ended. The Pilgrims just wouldn't seem to click and they failed to get beyond the Cats 30 yard line all afternoon. Friday evening the Pilgrims will journey to Carey to meet the Carey Eleven in a game scheduled to get underway at 8:00 p. m. COUNCIL ADOPTS ANNUAL BUDGET

The tentative budget for the Village of Plymouth for next year calls for a total of \$100,496. The budget was recently approved by the Richmond County Budget Commission, and approved and adopted by the Village Council at its October meeting held October 7th.

Estimated resources for the Village, beginning January 1st, 1949 are as follows:
General Fund \$25,691.28
Street Maintenance and Repair Fund 4,561.22
Gas Tax Street Repair Fund 9,490.19
Water Works Fund 14,670.01
Electric Light Fund 43,235.61
General Bond Retirement Fund 2,832.97

Total \$100,491.28
Like all other communities and corporations, Plymouth has experienced an increase in operating costs, and the budget for the forthcoming year was made higher in order to meet the increased demands. The fact that the Richmond County budget commission approved the budget in its entirety assures Plymouth that sufficient money will be forthcoming to meet anticipated demands in the various departments, such as police and street departments, park and cemetery upkeep. It has been necessary to increase the hourly wage rate for village employees, and to those who are hired part time.

New Tax Rate
The tax valuation for the Richmond county side of Plymouth totals \$2,806,273. Taxes will go up one dollar per thousand in 1949 on the Richmond county side. The increase is due mainly to the new tuberculosis sanitarium which is now under construction. The current rate for 1948 is \$18.60, and the new rate for 1949 will be \$19.60. The new rate does not include the one and three-tenths mill which is to be added should Plymouth pass favorably upon the forthcoming bond issue which is being anticipated by the local school board. The bond issue will be for approximately \$48,000, the money to be used for the addition to a grade school building here, if and when construction is started.

Total \$9.70
Levies for both, inside the limitation and outside total \$19.60, and will go in effect January, 1949. Out of the \$19.60, the schools get a total of \$11.90, and \$7.70 for the county, village and township operations. As the figures show, the schools will receive well over fifty percent of the tax.

Glenn Haas' appointment to the volunteer fire department by Chief Dalton McDougall, was approved by mayor and council. Haas replaces Gordon Brown, who has served on the department for several years, but who resigned some weeks ago.

Due to the increase legal work of the solicitor for the village council voted a \$200 a year increase in salary for Joseph Dush of Willard, who is acting village solicitor. The annual salary is now \$400.

Sets Price of Land
Norwalk attorneys, representing the Gottfried estate, met with collector Dush in regard to setting a price on a tract of land in the northeast section of Plymouth, and on which the village has started a sewerage disposal plant. The site is necessary and will be used in the proposed sewage disposal plant. Gottfried's attorneys announced that the price of \$14,500 is being asked by the estate for the three acres.

Passes Ordinance
The council passed an ordinance limiting the sale of water from the Plymouth plant to those residents who reside within four miles of town. The ordinance carries a fine of not less than \$5 for each violation and not more than \$50 in any one purchasing water under false statement of location. It was revealed that many thousands of gallons of water had been transported into

However, Mayor Robinson states that the village will not tolerate any wrongdoers, destruction of property or any extreme deeds during Halloween season. A special police will be on the job to assist Chief Meiser and Deputy Warden.

AUTHOR, BROTHER OF LOCAL MAN PUBLISHES BOOK, "HORROR TREK"

A new war book, "Horror Trek" by Robert W. Levering, brother of D. H. Levering, can now be purchased at Don's Grill, Plymouth, Ohio.

Mr. Levering, Mount Vernon attorney, is the Democratic nominee for Congress from Ohio's 17th District.

"Horror Trek" is a true story of Bataan, the Death March, and three and one-half years as a Japanese prisoner of war, with a foreword by Admiral G. G. Harrington, a message from General "Skinny" Wainwright, and illustrated with some sixteen photographs smuggled out of Japanese prison camps.

Much of the documentary evidence which is the basis for this story was collected by Mr. Levering during the years of his imprisonment. For instance, data containing the names of fellow prisoners, the dates and places of cold blooded executions and countless other atrocities by the enemy were recorded on scraps of paper salvaged from heaps of rubbish on the docks of Manila and later buried in a bottle as a safeguard against recovery by the Japanese military police.

After the war, under the direction of the author, the American Army Intelligence Service recovered the materials and sent them to him at Fredericktown, Ohio.

"Horror Trek" is written with a purpose—to give American people facts concerning the hopeless Bataan campaign—a lesson in unpreparedness. In Bataan, Mr. Levering saw the lives of American soldiers become the very blood-grease in the wheels of an antiquated, out-moded war machine of a neglected people.

Evidence produced at the General Homma trials in Manila in 1946 revealed that 17,200 men were murdered or died of starvation and disease on the March of Death.

In the early months of 1942, there were some 38,800 American troops in Bataan, according to War Department figures. At war's end only a few more than 3,000 men remained alive to tell the story of their lives and one-half years of captivity in filthy disease-ridden prison camps. Mr. Levering, a volunteer, was among the "one-in-ten" survivors who returned to his home town of Fredericktown, Ohio.

"Horror Trek" has a strong religious emphasis. The book opens with the heading of an American who was found with a small amount of Japanese money in his possession. Levering's account of the beheading is written as only an eye witness could put it on paper.

Here is the unfolded drama of the greatest tragedy in American history—Bataan and Corregidor,—illustrated with pictures smuggled out of Japan, together with the text of letters and verse composed by the men who fought and suffered there. . . revealing the almost fantastic criminal frenzy of the Japanese military.

This book was written in fulfillment of a pledge which the author made to the brave men of Bataan and Corregidor that if he ever got back to America he would do all in his power to prevent another such tragedy.

Miss Karen Hale, seven year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Millard Hale of Elyria and a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Scraffield of Portland, Oregon, former local residents, is quite thrilled over a new friend, Miss Selma Koskela, Olhava, Yli-Olhava, Finland.

It all came about as a result of a solicitation for used clothing at Gates School where Karen is a student in the second grade. A note was enclosed in the Hale donation and the clothing found its way to Finland.

According to a letter received recently from Miss Koskela, the bundle was delivered to a family including a mother and eight children. The father "fell in battle."

"Here in Finland," Miss Koskela writes, "it is very difficult to find clothes and such as we do find we cannot afford to buy."

Miss Koskela wrote that she is sixteen years of age, that she has one older sister now working away as a servant and that the remainder of the children are younger.

The small sisters and brothers wish to thank you from the very bottom of their hearts for the lovely package and mother also wishes most heartily to express her thanks," the letter read.

The letter written in the Finnish language, was translated up on arrival in Elyria. The postage cost for mailing the letter was \$24 approximately 16 cents in American money since one American dollar equals in value 149 Finnish dollars.

PROCEEDINGS IN HURON COUNTY PROBATE COURT

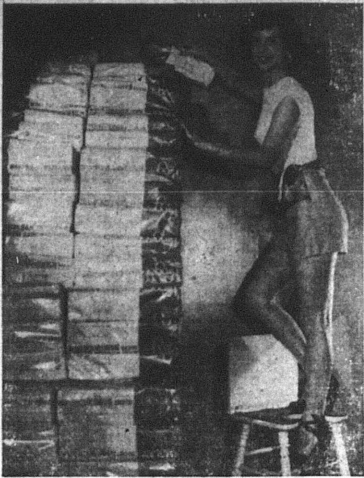

ORDINANCE NO. 178
AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT THE DEPLETION OF THE WATER SUPPLY OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, O. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to purchase water of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for purposes of hauling or transporting the same for a distance of more than four miles in any direction from the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

SECTION 2: Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than \$5.00 for the first offense and not more than \$50.00; and shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$250.00 for each subsequent offense.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate protection of the health and welfare of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio and should go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency is that the provisions of this Ordinance are necessary in order to protect from depletion the water supply of the Village of Plymouth, O.
