

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to purchase water of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for purposes of hauling or transporting the same for a distance porting the same for a distance of more than four miles in any direction from the corporate lim-its of the Village of Plymouth,

Ohio.

SECTION 2: Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than \$5.00 for the first offense and not more than \$5.00; and shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$250.00 for each subsequent offense. quent offense. SECTION 3:

This Ordinance SECTION 3: This Ordinance is an emergency measure, neces-sary for the immediate protection of the health and welfare of the people of the Village of Plyor the health and weitare of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio and should go into effect immediately.
