

ARCHITECT R. E. PECK AT PTA MEET; SUPPORTS BOND ISSUE

Architect Charles Marr of New Philadelphia, Ohio, who has been employed to build the new grade school building, presented facts and statistics Thursday evening before the P. T. A. Association.

The bond issue which comes up before the voters on November 2 is of vital importance to the school and town and the P. T. A. voted to support it. L. E. Brown was appointed publicity agent and Ford Davis and Miles Christian to assist him. \$25.00 was pledged for this purpose but Mr. Marr came to their rescue and donated the \$25.00 to be used as they deemed best.

After the meeting that the school now being used to house both the high school and grade school was originally designed to accommodate only two hundred and fifty but that four hundred and thirty is the present enrollment of the school. Neither students nor teachers can accomplish the best results under such handicaps. He also stated that the amount of material now on hand bought at \$6000 would cost approximately twelve thousand if purchased at present prices and that this would be a great savings.

Mr. Marr also pointed out to help the overcrowded condition, that the annex of the Lutheran church, if it could be the State, will be used this winter for the little folks.

Preceding the business, which was presided over by Sup. Div. VanBunt, in the absence of C. E. Riggle, president, the school teachers, both old and new members were presented. New teachers are Miss Kantzer, Mrs. Kent and Mrs. Schaeffer. Wayne Mock and Coach McMullen.

An invitation was also extended to every parent in the area, regardless whether they have children in school or not to join the association and take a part in the bond issue.

Refreshments were served by the Senior Class under the supervision of Miss Joy Bethel.

This year's P. T. A. officers are: C. E. Riggle, president; P. L. VanBunt, 1st V. P.; Miles Christian, 2nd V. P.; Mrs. Leland Briggs, treasurer and Mrs. D. K. McGinty, secretary. Mrs. L. E. Brown was appointed social chairman and Mr. VanBunt, program chairman.

The November meeting will be held Thursday of the month.

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RULING ON HOW TO COUNT VOTES

Edward J. Hummel issued to The Huron County Board of Elections Saturday morning, October 16, 1948 the following instructions on how to count the Presidential and other Ballots. He ruled as follows:

A Presidential ballot, marked with an (X) in the circle at the top of either the Democratic or Republican ticket OR marked with an (X) in the circle at the left of the space in which are printed the names of the candidates for the office of president and vice president AND also marked with an (X) in the rectangular space before the name of ONE or MORE of the TWENTY-FIVE INDEPENDENT CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS, should be declared an INVALID ballot and NO 2 vote counted for any candidate.

A Presidential ballot bearing an (X) in the shaded space at the top of the column in which the names of the TWENTY-FIVE INDEPENDENT CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS appear and also an (X) mark in the circular space appearing at the bottom of either the DEMOCRATIC or REPUBLICAN ticket should be counted as a vote for the DEMOCRATIC or REPUBLICAN candidate, as the case may be.

3. A ballot which bears any marks other than (X) marks placed there by the voter is INVALID and the entire ballot should be INVALIDATED and NOT COUNTED.

Ballot where No. 3 applies to any Ballot whether Presidential, Party Column, Judicial or Special Issues.

Plymouth Man Dies in Florida

Word has been received in Plymouth of the death on October 10th of a former Plymouth citizen, Mrs. Harriet Striet Schaeffer, 79, who died in Florida following a long illness. Mrs. Schaeffer suffered a broken hip nearly two years ago and since been confined to the Morton Plant Hospital in Clearwater.

The deceased was born in Plymouth and spent her childhood and early youth here, graduating from the Plymouth schools in 1888. She married Fred Schaeffer and for a number of years resided in Marion, Ohio, and later moved to Florida where she lived the past twenty-five years. She is the last surviving member of the Striet family, early pioneers of Plymouth. Old friends will recall the Schaeffer Harness Shop, which was located on the Striet grocery where the Weber Cafe is located.

Survivors include two sons, William and Claude, N. Y., and George of Clearwater, Florida, and one grandchild; her husband preceded her death some years ago. She is a sister of the late Mrs. Josephine McClintchy of Plymouth.

Funeral services were held on Monday in Marion, Ohio from the home of the deceased and burial made in that city.

Section 4. That this ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately. The reason for such necessity is that appropriation of the land herein described is necessary for the erection of a sewage disposal and treatment plant to protect the health, safety and general welfare of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

ORDINANCE NO. 178
AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT THE DEPLETION OF THE WATER SUPPLY OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to purchase water of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for purposes of hauling or transporting the same for a distance of more than four miles in any direction from the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.
SECTION 2: Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than \$5.00 for the first offense and not more than \$50.00; and shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$250.00 for each subsequent offense.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate protection of the health and welfare of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio and should go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency is that the provisions of this Ordinance are necessary in order to protect from depletion the water supply of the Village of Plymouth, O.

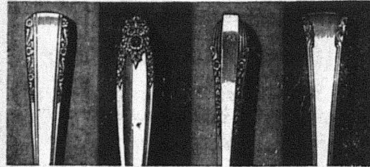

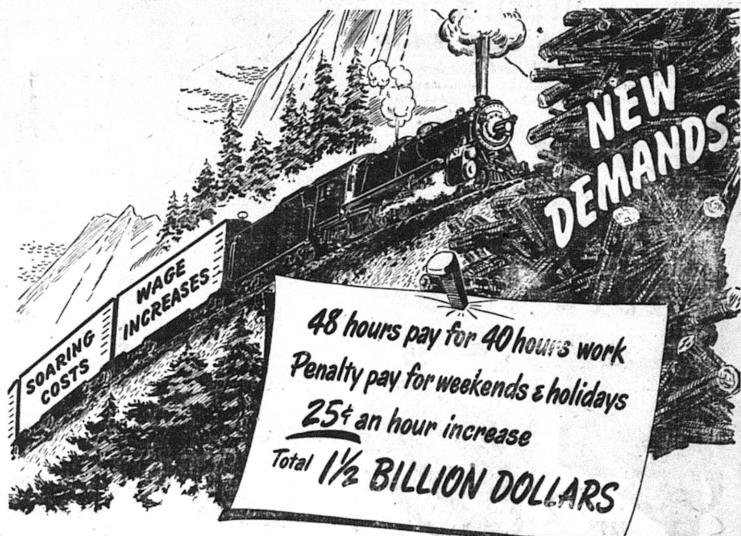
