

President to Make Platform Speech in Willard Monday

When the presidential train arrives in Willard, Monday, October 11th, President Harry S. Truman is scheduled to make a brief talk from the platform, according to an announcement made this week by Jack T. Hoggett, chairman of the Huron County Democratic Executive and Central Committee.

Everyone in this community is invited to go over to Willard and see and hear the President. Harlow A. Stapp of Willard is in charge of the reception committee, and plans are being made to give the President a cordial reception for the brief time he is in Willard.

The President, for the past two weeks has been on an extended tour through the Far West up into Washington, and as far

South as Texas, where he has been well received by all Democrats. He has been accorded fine receptions at many places where his train stopped for only a few minutes, and there is no doubt but what a huge crowd will be on hand to greet the President and his party next Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

OCT 15 DEADLINE

Huron County Treasurer H. B. Collier states this week that the second half 1948 Personal Tax collection is in full swing. With approximately one-half the total collection already in, the balance will probably come in full by October 15, 1948 which is the final date without penalty.

Normally the final date for paying second half Personal Tax is September 30th but the time was extended this year due to the fact that a deluge of additional returns as well as for former years were brought in by Mr. Elmer A. Brown, Special Investigator for the State Department of Taxation.

A record number of returns as well as a large increased amount of money are shown on the Personal Tax duplicate this year.

SEPTEMBER WEATHER
The average temperature for September was 66 degrees, or 1.2 degrees above normal. The highest was 90 on the 17th; the lowest was 50 on the 29th.

Rainfall was practically normal—3.06 inches—a deficiency of only .10 of an inch. Rain fell on 14 days, the greatest in 24 hours was 1.27 inches on the 29th and 30th. A moderate hail storm occurred on the 19th, but no damage was reported.

No crop came through September without frost damage and all indications are for a bumper crop. A year ago the first frost hit on September 27th, causing a lot of soft corn and consequent high market prices.

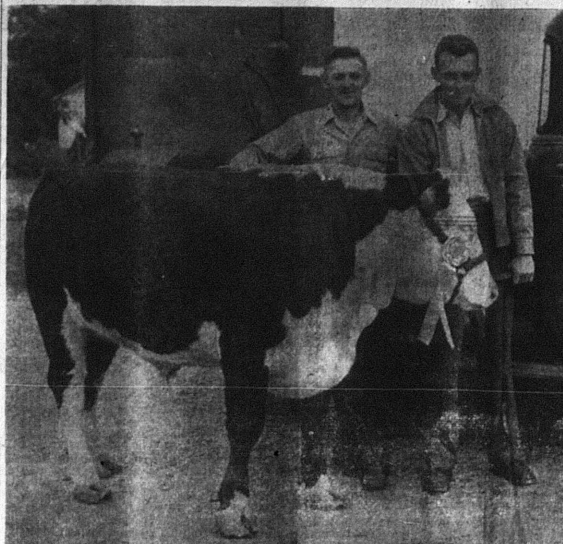
GOLD STAR STAMPS

PLYMOUTH, SHELBY PRIESTS FLY HOLD RITES FOR TO MEXICO CITY FOR CEREMONY FRANK DAVIS

Last week Friday, Rev. Anthony Wortmann M. S. C. pastor of St. Joseph's Mission and Rev. Charles J. Petrie, M. S. C. of Shelby returned from their trip to Mexico City, where they had flown in a Cessna 140 to represent the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart at a solemn ceremony of coronation of an image of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus which is venerated at St. Joseph's Cathedral in that city.

Father Patrick is now on his way to the South Pacific where he will be in charge of a mission field—operating from Manus Island as a base.

The trip was the first flight for Rev. Wortmann who thoroughly enjoyed every mile of the 4000 mile journey even when they reached an altitude of 15,000 feet.

The following is a description of the ceremony: The coronation of the Blessed Virgin Under the Title Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus! At ten o'clock on September 25, there took place at the Cathedral of Mexico City the solemn opening of the First Eucharistic Congress ever to be held in the Mexican Republic. His Eminence Louis Maria Martinez D. D. Archbishop of Mexico, solemnly crowned the image of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which is venerated at St. Joseph's Church of this city.

At the stated time His Eminence, the Head of the Church in Mexico, in the presence of many Archbishops and Bishops, celebrated a solemn Pontifical High Mass, of which the most inspiring moment was the Archbishop dressed in Cappa Margae ascended the High Altar to place a crown of gold and precious stones above the picture of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

With tears of joy and shouts of "Viva Maria Christo Rey" the faithful gave expression to their unbounded enthusiasm. The Crown is a piece of art. It is wrought in pure gold and studded with precious jewels. The four escutcheon in the lower part are those of the Supreme Pontiff, of the Archbishop of Mexico, of the Mexican Republic, and of France, where the devotion to Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus had its origin. There is one diamond of 12 mm. the gift of a benefactor who has received a signal favor from Our Lady of the Sacred Heart.

The sermon was delivered by Dr. Gregory Aguilar, who explained to the faithful how this devotion united the cult of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, who started this devotion, no doubt, heavenly inspired in 1854, the year of the definition of the Dogma of the Immaculate Conception. In 1869 it was introduced into Mexico and came newly to life in 1929, when this picture was brought to its present shrine at San Jose and by 1940 the devotion had spread all over Mexico, so that today there is hardly a Church in the whole country where there is not a picture of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

He referred to the many miraculous happenings that must be ascribed to this venerable image of the Blessed Virgin and that the Mexican people have many reasons to crown her picture for the favors Our Lady of the Sacred Heart has bestowed upon them these last years.

At the end of his eloquent sermon he addressed the Heavenly Queen imploring her to continue her favors to her afflicted children as she has been wont to bestow upon them at her shrine in St. Joseph's Church.

At the close of the solemn ceremony, many of the faithful accompanied the Sacred Image on its solemn return to her own shrine at St. Joseph's Church.

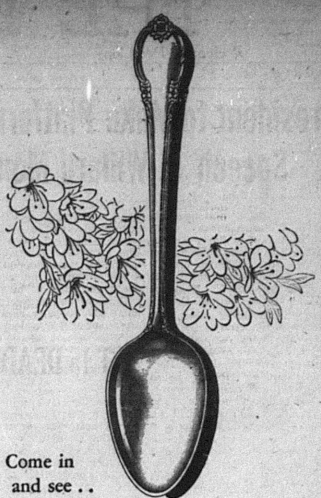

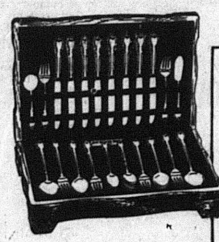

ORDINANCE NO. 172 AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AN ADMISSION TAX AGAINST PERSONS ENTERING PARTNERSHIPS, ASSO- CIATIONS AND COMPANIES FURNISHING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMER- GENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, there is hereby levied against persons, individuals, partnerships, associations and corporations:

(1) A tax of three per centum of the amount received for admission to any place, including admissions by season ticket or subscription, if such place be within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, O. Provided, however, that the activities in, on or about the Public Schools, under the direction of the Board of Education, be exempt.

(2) A tax of three per centum on the amount received for admission to any public performance for profit at any cabaret, dance, or other place, where the charge for admission is in the form of a service charge, or cover charge, or entertainment charge, and such place of entertainment be within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 2. Every person, individual, partnership, association or corporation receiving any payments for admission, taxable under this ordinance, shall on or before the last day of each calendar month make a return, under oath, to the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, showing the number of taxable admissions collected during the preceding calendar month, and the amount making such return shall at the time of making the same pay the amount of tax thereon to the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and if the tax imposed by this ordinance is not paid when due, there shall be added as a part of the tax interest at the rate of one per centum per month from the time when the tax became due until paid.

Section 3. On and after October 1, 1948, it shall be unlawful for any person, individual, partnership, association or corporation to continue to conduct any form of amusement, permanent or temporary place of amusement or any itinerant form of amusement without a license, and, as hereinafter provided. Every person, individual, partnership, association, or corporation desiring to continue to conduct or hereafter to begin to conduct any amusement at any permanent or temporary place of amusement, or any itinerant form of amusement, shall file an application for a permanent, temporary or itinerant form of amusement license or licenses, as the case may be, with the Clerk of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio. Upon the finding by the Village Council that the applicant is in proper form, the said Village Clerk shall forthwith issue such license or licenses, upon payment by the applicant of the fee of One Dollar (\$1.00). An amusement license shall be issued only for the person, individual, partnership, association or corporation in whose name it is issued and for the conduct of amusements at the place designated therein; it shall not be assignable and shall be conspicuously displayed at the place or places for which issued during the period of ticket sale and conduct of amusement. All licenses for permanent places of amusement shall expire on the first day of December next following the date upon which they are issued. Licenses for temporary place of amusement or for forms of itinerant amusement shall expire at the time specified therein.

Licenses issued for permanent place of amusement under the provisions of this ordinance may be renewed annually before the first day of January upon application made to the Village Clerk and the payment of a renewal fee of One Dollar (\$1.00).

Section 4. Whoever continues to conduct or begin to conduct any form of amusement at a permanent or temporary place of amusement or any itinerant form of amusement, within the corporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, without having a license therefor, as provided in this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) or more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each day of such violation may be deemed a separate offense.

Section 5. Whoever, being a person charged by this ordinance with the duty of collecting or paying the taxes imposed by this ordinance wilfully fails or refuses to charge or collect or to pay such taxes, or to make return to the Village Clerk as required by this ordinance or to permit any authorized agent of the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to examine his books and other records, in or upon the premises where the same are kept, to the extent necessary to verify any return made or to ascertain and impose the tax imposed by this ordinance if no return is made, or to maintain and keep for one year or such lesser or greater time as may be permitted or required by said Village Council, such records, tickets, stubs and other documents pertaining to the sale or other disposition of admissions as may be required by the Village Council, shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) or more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each day of such violation may be deemed a separate offense.

Section 6. Whoever, being a person charged by this ordinance with the duty of collecting or paying the taxes imposed by this ordinance or to permit any authorized agent of the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to examine his books and other records, in or upon the premises where the same are kept, to the extent necessary to verify any return made or to ascertain and impose the tax imposed by this ordinance if no return is made, or to maintain and keep for one year or such lesser or greater time as may be permitted or required by said Village Council, such records, tickets, stubs and other documents pertaining to the sale or other disposition of admissions as may be required by the Village Council, shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) or more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each day of such violation may be deemed a separate offense.

Section 7. The Village Council shall, so far as not to be inconsistent with this Ordinance, have the right to prescribe rules and regulations for the administration of this Ordinance, including the right to revoke or suspend licenses.

Section 8. The license required herein shall be in addition to any and all licenses otherwise required by law.

Section 9. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective October 1, 1948.

Section 10. The reason for such necessity is that this revenue is needed to help maintain the public peace, health and safety and general welfare of the citizens of said Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

LEVERING'S BOOK
ON BATAAN MARCH
GRAPHIC, CONVINCING

The main portion of Robert W. Levering's new book, "Horror Trek," proves to be fast-moving and attention - holding reading matter as it moves in stark and simple language thru the story of the Bataan death march and the years of prison life which followed, in the Philippines and Japan, for those who survived the march.

Levering, now a Mount Vernon attorney and Democratic candidate for 17th district congressman, has not attempted to write a novel. His book is a personal journal of what he saw, heard, and felt during three and a half years of a brutal fight for sur-

vival. He says and repeats that "Horror Trek" is intended to remind Americans that it was "lack of preparedness which put the American and Filipino troops and civilians in the hopeless and helpless position of waging a battle which they knew from the start could not be won.

From the hour of the surrender on Bataan on April 8, 1942, until the war's end in August, 1945, Levering's tale is a graphic and convincing story, written with restraint and yet with force.

Levering's book is well documented. It contains nineteen letters from fellow prisoners, relating some of their outstanding recollections of their captivity. It has a letter of greeting from

Gen. Wainwright. And it has a foreword from Rear Adm. G. G. Harrison, retired, who was senior American officer in American Prisoner Camp No. 11 at Manila, and is highly complimentary in his statements on the author's record in that camp.

"Robert W. Levering was a tower of strength, cheerful, able, a builder of morale," says the naval officer. He adds that Levering was elected by the American prisoners as leader of one of the six groups of prisoners.

The jacket design for the book, showing Jap troops beheading an American prisoner, was done by George Loomis, Mount Vernon high school art teacher. Privately published at \$3.50 the book is on sale at Don's Grill.

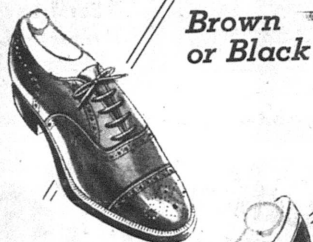

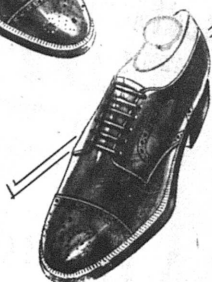
