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Doings In Congress

By Congressman Wm. Lemke

The prophets in the recent election are now trying to explain how they missed their guess. Their explanations, however, are as unreliable as their predictions of Dewey's victory. Some are trying to explain away the disastrous effect that the Taft-Hartley bill had on the election.

These point out that Roosevelt, in 1944, got more votes in the industrial centers than Truman got in 1948. Therefore, they say, ipso facto, Truman did not get the solid labor vote. Nothing could be more illogical. These apologists forget that many businessmen and professional men that voted for Roosevelt did not vote for Truman. The effect of their switch, however, was offset by the solid labor vote for Truman.

And, I believe the principal one, was that a majority of the American people are sick and tired of our foreign flirtations. They are opposed to the giving away of America's resources. They object to committing national suicide. Dewey, surrounded by Dulles and other New York internationalists, forgot that there was still a real American sentiment — Americans who believe that their nation comes first, and that it must be protected from foreign intrigue and looting.

There were several million who voted for Truman because they felt there was no difference between Truman and Dewey on foreign issues. There were also several million who voted for Dewey with apprehension. These felt that his policy might be an improvement over Truman's, but they lacked enthusiasm. Dewey failed to make the issue clear.

Dewey can blame himself for his defeat. In this he was aided and assisted by his campaign managers and the Taft-Hartley

bill. If he had washed his hands of the Taft-Hartley bill and the international gang for a profit that surrounded him, he would have been elected.

Depot Workers To Receive Increase

Colonel R. W. Dyer, Commanding Officer, 831st AF Specialized Depot, Shelby, Ohio, announces a wage increase for ungraded employees at the Depot. 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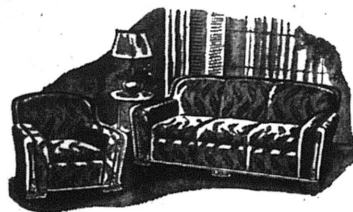

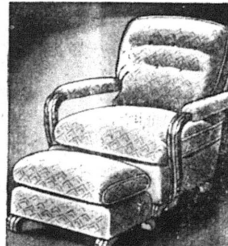
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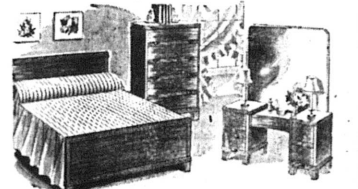
