

Republicans Take Huron Co.; Dems Sweep Over Richland

Holding to tradition, even in the closest race in many decades, Huron county voted in all Republican candidates in Tuesday's election, while Democratic candidates in Richland county made a clean sweep. One of the upsets in Richland was the defeat of Theodore Lutz, county prosecutor, by Harold Lutz, Guy Stewart, who had strong opposition in the commission's race, won out with a nice majority. Fred Dill of Belleville, who enters politics for the first time other than serving as a member of the county board of education, stated Wednesday afternoon: "I was dumfounded over the outcome of the whole election. I had little hope of winning even a commissioner's seat."

Here is a summary of the Richland county Democrats who won over their Republican opposition: Harold Lutz, prosecutor; Harold Weening, clerk of courts; E. P. Long, sheriff; Guy Stewart and Fred Dill, commissioners; C. L. Mitchell, state representative; C. Payne, treasurer; D. D. O'Leary, recorder; G. E. Kalbfleisch, common pleas judge; H. C. Brown, probate judge; and Walter Runk, county engineer.

School Bond Issue Gets 83% Majority

Voters in Plymouth Village School district approved the \$48,000 school bond issue for Plymouth's new grade school building by a majority of almost 83 per cent. Tuesday's bond issue was the third that has been approved by Plymouth school district voters to get funds with which to build a new school.

Funds have been available for sometime to construct a four-room building, but with six rooms added and completely finished, the school board again asked the voters for more money—and they got it.

Results of the bond issue are as follows: Plymouth township, for 1112; against 33; New Haven, for 3; against 5. North Auburn, for 18; against 1. Cass township, for 5, opposed, none. In Plymouth there was a definite trend favoring the school, and the voters checked in as follows: Precinct B, Huron county side, for the school 250; against, 4. In Precinct B, Richland side, 329 voted for the same, and 68 opposed it.

Organizations Set Up Program

In a rural organization meeting, sponsored by the USDA Board in Huron County, plans were laid to attempt a safety program for rural people. Mr. W. E. Stuckey, the speaker Thursday evening, October 28th, stated that one farm house out of five would have a serious accident some time during the next year. Without a county safety committee cataloging these accidents, any definite program to remedy the cause would be limited. The rural leaders present at this meeting decided it was time to find out what was causing Huron County farm accidents and deaths. This could only be done through an extensive county-wide survey over a period of time.

Mr. Stuckey felt that every rural organization and any other group that may be in a position to help this county-wide rural safety campaign in the educational, publicity, finance, special projects and survey phases should be put in a working capacity. Those organizations would include County Schools, Granges, Farm Bureau, Parent Teachers Associations, Churches, Women's Organizations, Red Cross, Service Clubs, Insurance Companies, Utilities, Machinery Dealers, Bankers, Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics, 4-H Clubs, Rural Youth Organizations, Production Marketing and Agricultural Extension Service.

Mr. John Wells, Association County Agent and acting chairman of the organization meeting, appointed representatives from each of the types of rural organizations as a temporary committee to contact these rural organizations and have them select a member from their group to act as safety director on one of the committees necessary in conducting the county safety campaign.

There are, at the present time, twenty-seven counties in Ohio having a similar safety organization. Several others are in the organizational stage. These committees will set up a long-time plan over a period of years to try to bring to the rural people of Huron County the causes for our high accident and death rate.

Mr. W. E. Stuckey, who is the Extension Farm Safety Specialist and also a representative of the State Department of Hygiene, will speak to a meeting of all committees which will be held December 1, at 8 p. m., at the Huron County Court House. All organizations are requested to have their representative attend this meeting.

The Agricultural Extension Service is organizing the third annual Farm and Home School for young farm married couples. The first of a series of six meetings will be held on November 11 at 8 p. m., in the Methodist Church at North Fairfield, Ohio.

This first meeting will be conducted by John Wells, Associate County Agent, and setting up program for the meetings to follow. Specialists from the Extension Service at Ohio State University will be on hand for at least four of the six meetings.

The program for this year will consist mainly of outdoor activities, complete plans for various enterprise activities on each farm and home. One of the highlights of the series of meetings will be a discussion by Miss Lucille Poon, Child Development and Family Relations Specialist, who will speak on Family Relationships.

The Extension Service is setting up this Farm and Home School trying to meet the problems of the young people getting started in farming, as well as managing the home. All young married farmers and their wives are cordially invited to attend the first meeting to be held November 11th, in order to enroll in this Farm and Home School.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1: The members of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall receive as compensation for their services \$200 for the first hour or fraction thereof for each call, and shall receive \$1.50 for each hour or fraction thereof after the first hour, for each call.

SECTION 2: In addition to the compensation provided in Section 1, above, each member of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall receive \$150 for each attendance at the regular monthly drill meeting held by the Volunteer Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, this compensation to be paid to each member semi-annually, i. e., in July and December of each year.

SECTION 3: This ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall become effective immediately. The reason for such necessity is that the compensation herein provided is necessary in order to obtain competent services of the Volunteer Fire Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, for the protection of the lives and property of the citizens of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

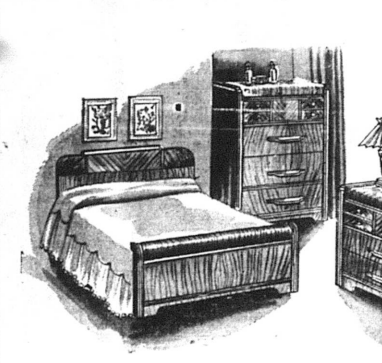

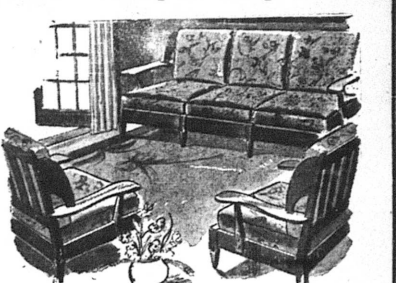

Vets Eligible For Ratings

M/Sgt. L. R. Portman of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station, Norwalk, announced that certain veterans of World War II are eligible for Reserve commissions as second Lieutenants, to be assigned to active duty with the U. S. Army.

This new program, set in motion of the Department of the Army, is designed to procure junior officers to fill vacancies in the currently expanding Army. Sgt. Portman pointed out that any veteran between 19 and 32, with at least one year of service in any branch of the Armed Forces between December 7, 1941 and June 30, 1947, in good physical condition, who has had two years of college, but is not attending college at the present time, is eligible to apply for a commission. Members of the Regular Army on active duty and members of

Reserve components of the Armed Forces not on active duty, who meet similar requirements, also are eligible to apply. Successful applicants will be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Reserve, will be sent to school and upon satisfactory completion of the course of study and training, will be given two years of active duty as officers with the U. S. Army.

Farmers To Push 'CROP' Program

Last Tuesday evening a good sized group of farmers and a number of the pastors from Huron County met in the court house at Norwalk to hear James D. Wyker, State Director for the "CROP" program. Work is well under way for organizing each township in the county to solicit corn and soy beans for a Food Train which is expected to pass through Huron County on or about November 20th. Before Thanksgiving Day it is expected that a number of car-loads of food raised by Huron County farmers will be on their way overseas to feed the hungry in war devastated lands.

One of the leading farmers of the County expressed himself at the Norwalk meeting saying: "As a county we should give a car-load of soy beans and four or five car-loads of corn."

Seldom have the farms of Ohio

produced so abundant a harvest, as they have this year.

The solicitation in each township of the county is expected to begin very soon. All grains donated should be delivered to some elevator within the county, where a slip indicating the amount donated to "CROP" will be given to the donor. Managers of elevators will be contacted as to the loading of grain on the "CROP" Food Train.

Ohio contributed a train of fifty-two cars of wheat to "Crop" on August 26th. At the latest reports from the state, office between twenty and fifty counties are now preparing to solicit for the second Food Train.

Locally

Rev. L. E. Smith, pastor of the local Methodist Church has agreed to act as chairman for the "Crop" program in Cass and Plymouth townships. Grain may be delivered to the Plymouth Elevator here or to the Shiloh Elevator. Anyone wishing to donate cash may do so and receipts have been left at the Advertiser for contributions or Rev. Smith may be contacted. In Shiloh, donations may be left at

All churches have joined this enterprise and are cooperating jointly including the Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service and the Lutheran World Relief. Those residing in Shiloh and vicinity who wish to make cash donations may leave same at Page's Hatchery.

Hunting Law Digests Ready

Printed folders containing abbreviated hunting and trapping regulations for the 1948 season may be secured from county game protectors and hunting license agents throughout the state, according to Lester C. Bailey, Law Enforcement Chief of the Ohio Division of Conservation.

In past years the game law digests were forwarded to license agents along with the first shipment of license books. This year the Ohio Conservation Commission delayed officially naming the hunting seasons and regulations until a thorough study of the game population could be made. Therefore, there was not sufficient time for the digests to be printed and distributed with the licenses.

The Commission, at a recent meeting, promised Ohio hunters that this same procedure, of not setting game regulations until all possible information about game populations in the field can be studied, will be followed.

A brief review of the 1948 regulations reveals that the season on pheasants will open November 15th and remain open through November 25th with a daily bag limit of two cock birds and possession limit of two. For rabbit the season opens November 15th and runs through December 18th. Four rabbits may be taken in one day; the possession limit is also four.

Daily hunting hours for both rabbit and pheasant will be the same as last year, 9 a. m. to 4 p. m., including the opening day. Regulations for grouse shooting will be the same as for pheasants. Trapping regulations will be the same as last year.

There will be no open season on Hungarian Partridge and Skunk for the entire state in 1948.

The 1948 hunting season represents three more pheasant shooting days and five more rabbit shooting days than last year.

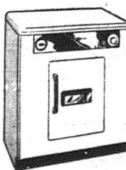
