More Liberal Fishing Regulations For 1949

Fishermen of Ohio will enjoy more liberal fishing rules and regulations for 1949 as a result of last week's meeting of the Ohio Conservation and Natural Resources Commission.

Based on recommendations, presented in a public hearing last week from representatives of the seven conservation districts of the state, individuals and organized sportsmen, the Commission added 18 fishing lakes to the experimental waters which have been open to liberalized fishing in which restrictions of seasons, bag limits and minimum lengths have been lifted.

Commission members generally have agreed that restrictions of seasons, bag limits, and minimum lengths may be eliminated from all impounded waters of the state in the near future if surveys continue to indicate that liberalized fishing does not reduce the fisherman's catch or fish population.

The liberalized fishing experiment was started in 1945 at Alma Lake in Vinton County and in 1946, 1947 and 1948 included eight lakes and one stream.

The fishing regulations adopted by the Commission are tentative

and subject to official action at the December meeting, but will not be effective until March 1, 1949.

Waters included in the liberalized fishing regulations for 1949 include: VanBuren Lake in Hancock County; Harrison Lake, Fulton County; Lake St. Marys, Auglaize and Mercer counties; Pleasant Hill Lake, Richland and Ashland counties; Charles Mill Reservoir, Ashland and Richland counties; (fishing is permitted in the game refuge north of Route 30 in Charles Mill and in the refuge on Pleasant Hill Reservoir between March 1 and August 31 only). The other areas of both lakes are open to year 'round fishing. Guilford Lake, Columbiana County; Mosquito Creek Reservoir, Trumbull County; Seneca Lake, Noble and Guernsey counties; Piedmont Lake, Harrison and Belmont counties; Atwood Lake, Tuscarawas and Carroll counties; Leesville Lake, Carroll County; Beach City Lake, Tuscarawas County; Madison Lake, Madison County; The Lower Basin of Mt. Gilard Lakes, Morrow County; Clouse Lake, Perry County; Buckeye Lake,

Fairfield, Licking and Perry counties; Kiser Lake, Champaign County; Indian Lake, Logan County; Laramie Lake, Shelby County; Alma Lake, Vinton County; Jackson Lake, Jackson County; Vesuvius Lake, Lawrence County; Adams Lake in Adams County; Tappan Lake, Harrison County; Glendening Lake, Harrison County; Willis Creek, Coshocton and Muskingum counties; and Shade River and all tributaries in Athens and Meigs counties.

Other action taken by the Commission gave Lake Erie fishing district fishermen an unlimited possession of minnows. In all other areas of Ohio the possession limits on minnows will be fifty unchanged from last year. Trot line fishermen this year will be permitted to use one trot line containing not more than fifty hooks with no two hooks less than three feet apart or fisherman may use not more than three lines in the same stream having a total of not more than fifty hooks on all three lines. This new provision permitting the use of three trot lines, recommended at the public hearing, was adopted to give small stream trout line fishermen an opportunity to use the total number of fifty hooks.

Although the discontinuance of the use of the fishing license badge is a legislative matter, the Commission listened to recommendations at the public hearing

to abolish the law requiring the use of such a badge. Officials of the Division expressed no objection to abolishing the law which has been in effect for about nine years. Game protectors throughout the state generally agree that the law is unnecessary and is of little benefit to law enforcement. Conservation Commissioner, R. A. Kider, told the Commission members and those attending the hearing that fishing license badge cost the Division nearly \$40,000 a year and that this money would go a long way toward building a new headwater lake each year. Whatever is done about the fishing license badge law will be entirely up to the new legislature which convenes early next year.

Ohio Fur Season Expected Better Than Last Year

Ohio Division of Conservation field men who keep a pretty close eye on the game population trends in every county predict that the trapping season which opened Monday, November 15, will be somewhat better than last year when the total take of trapped furs dropped as much as fifty per cent in some areas.

Reasons given for the decrease were that the weather was too mild and that the brood stock had been seriously effected by heavy trapping and an unusually large take during the 1946-47 season.

Whether the small fur crop of last year will result in a heavier crop this year remains to be seen, however, field men of the Division report that marshland surveys during the past several months indicate that the season will be better.

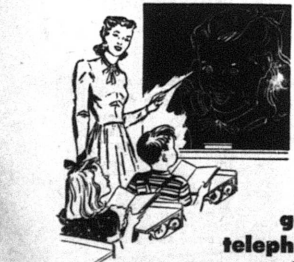
The daily bag limits this year for raccoon is two and possession limit two but there is no limit on opossum, mink or muskrat. The inland trapping season will run through January 15th while the Lake Erie District season continues through March 15th.

Counties included in the Lake Erie District are Lucas, Ottawa, Sandusky, Erie, Huron, Lorain, Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake and Ashtabula.

Xmas Seals Now on Display

The 1948 Christmas Seal Sale opened officially Monday, November 22, in Huron County, with the delivery of Seals in the morning mail to county residents. Huron County's Seal Sale is held in conjunction with the nationwide appeal for funds to support a battle against tuberculosis being waged throughout the country by the 5,000 associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association.

The annual Seal Sale, which will continue until Christmas, represents the only appeal during the year for funds to carry on the year-round tuberculosis control work of the Huron County Tuberculosis Association. Quota for Huron County, the minimum needed to carry out the association's 1948 program, is set at \$6,000.00.

"The nationwide fight against tuberculosis today is just as important as it was in 1907, the year of the first Seal Sale in the United States," Kenneth C. Buckley, chairman, said Monday. "Although tuberculosis has dropped from first to seventh place as the cause of deaths in America since 1907, the disease still kills nearly 50,000 Americans annually. While no age is safe from tuberculosis, the disease today is taking the lives of more Americans between 15 and 44 than any other disease."

"We consider every death from tuberculosis unnecessary as well as tragic, because we know that tuberculosis can be prevented. We also know that our tuberculosis control program is as strong and no stronger than the interest, cooperation and support of every county resident."

Mr. Buckley explained that of the money raised in this county, 80% remains in the county to fight tuberculosis here and the remainder is forwarded to the Ohio State Tuberculosis Association. The state sends five per cent to the National Tuberculosis Association to finance its work on a national level. Of the total raised in the county's Seal Sale, therefore, 95 per cent will be used within the State.

Seal Sale money finances such services in the county as: In 1948 it provided for a scholarship awarded to a Huron County doctor to attend a short course on chest diseases; paying for more than 100 large x-rays for Huron County residents during 1948; paying promotional and attendant costs relating to the recent mass X-ray survey held throughout Huron County; paying for all large X-rays necessary to be taken as a result of the survey. It is hoped that in 1949 several teachers may be sent to Health Education courses held at State universities.

"It is an inspiring thought that the American people themselves, through their annual purchases of Christmas Seals have contributed materially toward the conquest of tuberculosis," said Mr. Buckley. "But we cannot rest on our laurels while there is still a single case of tuberculosis in the country. We have a long road to travel before we eradicate tuberculosis and we must continue to fight the disease with every means at our disposal. The American people make use of a powerful weapon against tuberculosis every time they purchase Christmas Seals."

HUNTERS ASKED TO TURN IN LEG BANDS AND TAG

Dr. E. D. Martin, Chief of the Game Management Section of the Division of Conservation this week urged hunters to watch for leg bands on pheasants and grouse and ear tags on raccoon and other animals trapped or killed during the hunting season. Bands and tags should be sent to the county game protector or mailed to the Ohio Division of Conservation, 1106 State Office Building along with information regarding date killed and location. Each band and tag release information has been carefully recorded by the Division and is a part of the program of wildlife research to determine movement habits of Ohio's game but is of no value unless hunters return the bands and tags to the Division headquarters.

Each hunter returning bands and tags will receive information concerning the release and travel of that particular piece of tagged game as a courtesy of the Division in appreciation for mailing the band or tag.
