

Death Takes Mrs. Eastman

Former friends, neighbors and relatives gathered Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the McQuate Funeral Home for final rites for Mrs. Stella May Eastman who died at her home in Plymouth, Ohio, at the age of 84.

Mrs. Eastman was the daughter of George and Georgianna Eastman and born in Plymouth March 1, 1861. She spent her childhood in this village and graduated from the Plymouth High School. She was united in marriage to her childhood sweetheart, Will Eastman, and to this union was born one daughter, Grace. Her second marriage was solemnized in Toledo, to George Eastman and their home was made in Cleveland where they lived until 1927. In that year they moved to Plymouth where they remained until the death of her husband in 1943.

Since that time the deceased has made her home with her daughter, Grace Trilling, and her granddaughter, Juanita of New York.

In her childhood she affiliated with the Lutheran Church and was life member of the Eastern Star in Plymouth and the Stella Social Circle which bears her name.

She is survived by her daughter, granddaughter, one sister, Frank Eltzner of Plymouth, her beloved friend Dorothea Root, many nieces and nephews and innumerable friends. She will be long remembered for her kindness and will be missed greatly by all who knew her.

Rev. H. L. Bethel, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, officiated at the service and burial in the Greenlawn cemetery, Plymouth.

World Prayer Day Will Be Observed Here, Friday, 13th

The 1948 program for the World Day of Prayer, the twenty first annual observance, makes a plea for "the oneness of humanity—the one family of God" by considering separately each phase of the Prayer Union, "The Lord's Prayer." This service or a translation and adaptation of it is used in many lands and has been used in the Near East and Far East, in Europe, Africa and Latin America, with about 15,000 observances in the United States.

In Plymouth, the service will be held at the Presbyterian Church at 8 o'clock Friday, Feb. 13th. Throughout the 24 hours of the day, the service will be broadcast by radio for Christian fellowship around the world, beginning in far away Fiji Islands and New Zealand and closing with the reverent observance by far-flung Eskimos on Little St. Lawrence Island off the coast of Alaska, 90 miles from the Arctic Circle.

Prayer for the day will be broadcast by radio, and the annual World Day of Prayer has become the most widely observed Protestant service.

On this day, thousands of groups will pray "Forgive us our National hatreds, class hatreds, racial hatreds. Forgive us for those sins which keep us small and divided and which should be united and united." They will pray for their national leaders, for the work of the United Nations, for deliverance from "false leaders and false ideas." In a world of strife and dissension, consecrated groups, led by women of all churches, will pray for peace and unity.

W. H. Paramore of Crestline asked Richland County common pleader to name a receiver for a farm partnership in Butler township. He also asked a restraining order to enjoin his partner, Loren Snyder, Shiloh, R. D. 1, from interfering with his removal of livestock from the farm. Paramore wants the partnership dissolved and the property distributed by court order.

The plaintiff said he and Snyder were unable to agree on care and marking of the livestock. He and Snyder made a verbal agreement in March, 1946, with Paramore to work Snyder's land and share the crops, Paramore said.

March of Dimes Goes To The Dogs

Success of this year's March of Dimes Campaign "went to the dogs." The goal set by Richland County is \$10,000 but this amount has not been received. Clyde A. Smith Passes Away

Last rites were held Saturday afternoon for Clyde A. Smith, 66, who passed away at the Willard hospital early last Thursday morning. Services were held at the McQuate Funeral Home in Shiloh with Rev. E. R. Haines, pastor of the Methodist church officiating. The remains were laid to rest in Broken Sword cemetery.

On Thursday, January 29, Mr. Smith had come to the home of the Child Saw Mill to supervise some repairs. He had not complained when he left home, but when he returned to his home a few minutes before noon, he entered the sitting room and took a seat in a rocker. He apparently suffered a cerebral hemorrhage soon after entering the room, and was found by his wife, Mrs. Smith, who called for Dr. Haines, who arrived at the home about 10:30 p. m. Mr. Smith was taken to the Willard municipal hospital, but he remained in a stupor for an entire week, with but one exception, when he regained consciousness momentarily. Death came early Wednesday morning of last week.

Mr. Smith was born in Bucyrus, Ohio, in 1882, the son of Daniel and Mary Smith. The family moved to a farm near the Kuhn farm on the Shelby Road, many years ago. On December 10, 1912 Mr. Smith was married to Ethel Monahan, and to this union were born three children, Mrs. Wm. Jones of Akron; Mrs. Edgar Youngblood of Central, S. C. and a son, Carl of Shiloh. Mr. Smith and the children are the survivors.

With the passing of Clyde Smith the community loses one of its best known and well liked citizens. From early youth, when he began work with the late George Bodley and Sam Trautman, he was interested in starting this business. He was a farmer with scores of farmers. After serving several seasons with these two men, he entered business for himself. He operated a thrashing rig for more than forty years in this vicinity. At one time he had three rigs going for about 1000 seasons. He was one of the big, old-fashioned steam engine types.

Advancement in farm equipment has made making the annual rounds of the thrashing rigs, and in 1934 Mr. Smith purchased the saw mill which he operated in the County Line Road, east of Plymouth. Just prior to a period of two years and then sold it to his son, Carl. Entering the service in 1914, Ed Child purchased the mill, and continued with the outfit for a short time. However, in 1941 Mr. Smith started a mill at his home located on the County Line Road, east of Plymouth. Just prior to his death, he was turning out the mill, and had an air of romance in it.

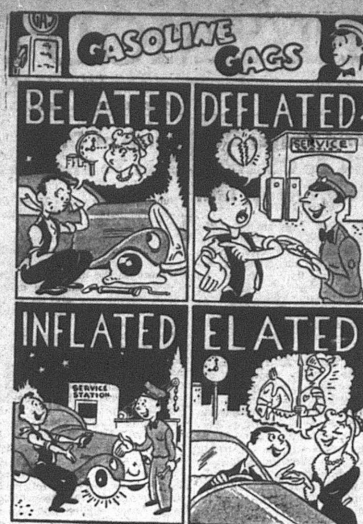

Easter Seal Sale To Begin Feb. 28

The fifteenth Annual Easter Seal Sale for crippled children will open February 28th and close Easter Sunday, March 28th. It was announced recently by Dr. Walter A. Zaugg, president of the Ohio Society for Crippled Children.

The Easter Seal drive in this state will be sponsored by the Ohio Society and seventy-two affiliated county societies for crippled children and cooperating service clubs. It will be part of a nation-wide campaign led by the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

"Funds raised during the pre-Easter month," Zaugg stated, "will be used to meet the needs of the physically handicapped which are not met by any other agency."

Easter Seal funds provide for hospital and convalescent care; medical treatment; corrective shoes, braces and wheelchairs; special training in care of cerebral palsied children; vocational guidance and job-training; and many other special services.

"Expenditure of the funds will depend on the needs of the particular community and the services already available," Zaugg stated.

The Ohio Society for Crippled Children has since 1919 provided on a continuous program leading to more adequate medical, educational, recreational and vocational opportunity for the physically handicapped. Forty-three county societies are affiliated with the state organization. In furtherance of the program, the main source of funds for the work is the Easter Seal.

Ohio Election Law Changes Are Cited

The new Ohio election law, passed at the last regular session of the Ohio legislature, which is now in effect, makes a number of very important changes in the usual voting procedure and should be carefully noted by all voters. The law specifies that "no ballot shall be counted which bears any mark other than 'X' marks placed in a blank space provided therefore ..."

The old law gave election officials leave, stating that "no ballot shall be counted which is marked contrary to law" and added that ballots should not be rejected for a technical error unless it was impossible to determine the voter's intent.

THE LAST SESSION of the legislature made many other changes in the election law. These changes include:

Residence requirement for an elector is hiked to 40 days (now 30) in the county and 40 days (now 28) in the precinct. It remains at one year in the state.

Election boards are permitted to locate a polling place outside the boundaries of a precinct, but not more than 250 feet from the boundaries.

CANDIDATES for state-wide office cannot file more than 500 signatures on nominating petitions with the secretary of state, and there must be a minimum of 1000, with a third of the 88 counties represented.

Signatures of any one petition cannot be from more than one county. This eliminates the necessity of sending petitions to more than one election board to check the validity of signatures.

THE REQUIREMENT for nomination by write-in of a person's name at a primary is increased from eight to fifteen percent of the total number of persons voting at the primary.

To vote an absent voter's ballot, an elector must be only 10 miles distant from his voting precinct, instead of 50 miles.

VOTED BALLOTS shall be preserved for forty days, instead of thirty.

In cases of a recount, there must be four per cent (now two per cent) change in the vote before money posted for the recount is refunded.

The original winner in an election is given a chance for a recount, too, if he is counted out by a loser in a recount.

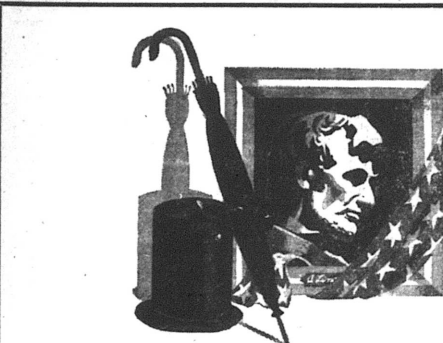

ORDINANCE NO. 160
AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING UNLOADING AREAS AND NO PARKING AREAS IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO

Be it ordained by council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to park any vehicle, except for the purpose of discharging passengers or freight at any time between the hours of seven A. M. and six P. M. of each week day in the following areas whereby designated as "Unloading Areas."

(a) On each side of Sandusky Street, next to the curb, from the north line of the cross walk at the Sandusky Street and extending along Sandusky Street to the south line of Spring Street.

Except that the following area is hereby designated as "twenty minute" parking areas, wherein passenger automobiles may park between the above mentioned hours for periods of time not exceeding twenty minutes:

(1) Beginning at a point on the east side of Sandusky Street forty feet north of the north line of the cross walk at the intersection of the Public Square and Sandusky Street to the south line of Spring Street.

(2) Beginning at a point on the north side of Sandusky Street forty feet north of the north line of the cross walk at the intersection of the Public Square and Sandusky Street, and extending along Sandusky Street to the south line of Spring Street.

(3) On the south side of Sandusky Street beginning at the intersection of Spring Street and Sandusky Street and extending forty feet east.

Section 2. The following areas are hereby designated as "Bus Unloading Areas" to be used for the parking of no vehicles except common carriers:

(a) Beginning at a point where the north line of Spring Street intersects with the east line of Sandusky Street and extending north along the east side of Sandusky Street a distance of 40 feet.

(b) Beginning at a point where the north line of Spring Street intersects with the west line of Sandusky Street and extending north along the west side of Sandusky Street a distance of 40 feet.

Section 3. No vehicle shall be parked facing traffic or vehicles lawfully proceeding on the right side of the street.

Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing regulations here established shall upon conviction be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00).
