Max Smith Quits Street Job; New Parking Rules Adopted

After having served the past year as street commissioner of the village, Max Smith resigned his position at Tuesday night's council meeting. Smith had estimated some weeks ago that he would ask for more money (\$3400) at the beginning of the year.

At a prior council meeting the street commissioner's request had been given consideration, and the council decided to ask for applications for the job. Out of the three applicants who applied on Tuesday night, Wm. Krumb was appointed for a three-month probationary period. Other applicants included Lawrence Ruff and Tom Kusinik. Lamb has been employed whenever needed by the Board of Public Affairs.

Try-Out Time Parking

Since the first of the year council has had under consideration a new parking plan that it is hoped will do away with double parking on the narrow street from the corner of the Public Square starting at Jump's Clothing Store to the Holt building, occupied by the Top Cleaners. This thoroughfare is a narrow one, and motorists have been parking on both sides of the street, crowding delivery trucks with supplies for stores located on the north side of the Square, or better known as Sandusky streets. Trucks have been forced to "double park" on both sides while making deliveries to stores, causing a one-way traffic hazard.

It was the full intent of the council to pass a "no parking ordinance" at any time, reserving approximately forty feet on each side of the street exclusively for trucks. However at Tuesday night's session a representative group of business men who appeared on this street appeared before council with various objections to the passing of a "no parking" zone. Council revised its original plan, and compromised by making the street twenty minute parking zone.

It is believed that if trucks will cooperate and not park double, there will be no further changes. However, inasmuch as double parking does cause a traffic hazard, council will more than likely stick to the no parking ordinance if the twenty-minute parking period does not alleviate the traffic condition.

Will Place Signs

Just when the twenty-minute parking will begin is not definitely known, as signs have been ordered and it will take two or three weeks to have them. The entire text of the new parking ordinance will be found elsewhere in this issue. After the ordinance becomes active, no violations will be subject to a fine less than one dollar fine nor more than \$10.00.

Provide Bus Stops

In checking over traffic conditions, village council also decided to establish a bus zone on the east and west sides of Sandusky Street. The southbound buses will unload passengers at a designated location, just north of the village jail. Northbound buses will have reservations made for unloading next to the Tourist Inn. Hereafter, buses will be forced to "double park" while loading and unloading, again causing a dangerous traffic hazard. With the new bus stops

properly marked, and an additional east and west street crossing painted on Sandusky Street, this will aid materially in preventing accidents.

Fire Chief McDougal was present at council meeting, and he conferred with the mayor, solicitor and clerk on the proper procedure and necessary papers required to get the new fire truck which Plymouth purchased many months ago. Chief McDougal expects to leave some time this week or early next week for Battle Creek, Mich. where the truck is being assembled with fire fighting equipment. It is understood that Luther Peters, former councilman, and a very active and interested citizen, will accompany McDougal to assist in bringing the truck here.

Other routine business was given attention, and current bills were ordered paid. Mayor Robinson was present as well as all members of the council, including Omar Burket, Whitney Briggs, Robert Fogleson, Glenn West, Harry Trauger and Marshall Burns.

Lawrence Ruff, who has been caretaker at Greenlawn cemetery for the past six years has resigned his position which took effect February 1st. Some time ago Ruff notified the board of his intention to resign March 1st, and asked the board to secure some one in his place.

Lyle Bittling has already been appointed by the cemetery board and has begun his duties as caretaker.

C., leaving for overseas in April, 1944. He served in both England and France and met his death in the Battle of St. Lo on July 23, 1944.

New Lights To Get Try-Out On Square

Don't look now, but within the next week or so, you'll see that the NEW LOOK on the Public Square. At the January meeting of the Board of Public Affairs both hot water heaters and new street lights for the Public Square was discussed at some length, and the clerk and superintendent were instructed to secure data on the latest lighting equipment.

Some two weeks ago Westinghouse representatives were in Plymouth and checked over the requirements of the lights around the Square. Four new lights were ordered to be used as a test and they are expected here at an early date. The lights are the latest development by Westinghouse and it is estimated they have 60 per cent more efficiency than those now in use.

If the new type lights prove satisfactorily the Board will probably install new lights on all the poles on the Square. It was revealed also that General Electric engineers are interested in making a survey of the entire lighting system in Plymouth, which no doubt will include a string of white lights from the A. C. & Y. Crossing to the corporation line on Sandusky Street. However, this survey is only in a tentative state, and no definite action will be taken for some time.

Rate To Be Discussed

It was decided at Monday night's session of the board to bring in Ohio power rate experts and talk over tentative changes in the power rate structure. About a year ago, the board, through cooperation of Ohio Power engineers, reviewed the light rates offered by Plymouth, and at that time the engineers stated that Plymouth enjoyed one of the lowest rates in this section of the state. However, they did suggest a rate of reduction for those who want to use electric ranges.

At the end of the survey the Board of Public Affairs put into effect very attractive rates on both hot water heaters and electric stoves. As a result, many residences are now cooking electrically, and several hot water heaters have been installed.

The purpose of a study in the power rate structure is not so much as to revise a rate schedule but a revision of the steps in power consumed before earning a lower rate. The present "step-up" is from 1 to 50, 50 to 200, and 200 to 750. The power rate will be discussed at the March meeting of the Board.

Salary Increased

The salary of William Wolfe, assistant superintendent, was increased by the board from \$2400 a year to \$2750. The board sent up the request for this salary increase to council Tuesday night, and this body took the necessary procedure for approving the increase.

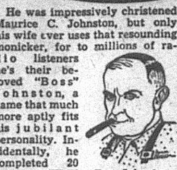

DOINGS IN CONGRESS

BY CONGRESSMAN LEMKE

Before you read this release, the tax reduction bill will have passed the lower House. Then the Senate will wrestle with it. The American people demand tax relief.

We gave Britain \$4,400,000,000, and with \$650,000,000 of our taxpayers' money, she settled the \$34,000,000,000 she previously owed us at less than two cents on a dollar. She used the balance of your money, and reduced her taxes.

Is the American taxpayer to be held white to permit other nations, who started the war that we finished, to reduce their taxes? Are foreigners to be preferred to Americans? The answer is emphatically no. The House bill increases the exemptions \$100 per person. If you are married, have three children, or three dependents, your exemptions will be increased by \$500.

In addition, if after exemptions you have a taxable income of \$1000, the tax on that \$1000 is reduced by thirty percent. The bill makes further exemptions for the blind, disabled and the aged, running all the way from \$600 to \$1800. This bill unquestionably favors the lower bracket taxpayers. Don't let any politician fool you.

In addition, it puts all the states on a par with the community property states, which is another reduction of \$200,000,000 for the states that do not have the community property law. If the President vetoes this bill, it will be his headache, especially so unless Congress passes it over his veto. The American people are not going to continue to reduce their standard of living in order to help grafting and questionable politicians amass their fortunes.

There may be a reason for the President's opposition to this bill. He is still under the spell of the Marshall Plan—the influence of the multi-millionaires in his Cabinet. He still follows the General who has not yet discovered where he was on the night of December 7, 1941. He is still influenced by the Wall Street element in the Executive Departments.

Eighty percent of the American people, however, are opposed to our continuing to pour billions into Europe to aid the communists and grafting politicians. They know that you can't give the Reds. They refuse to make the same mistake that we made with Japan when we sold her millions of tons of scrap iron, some of which later found its way into the bodies of our sons.

I warn these foreign nations now that, after the 1948 election, there will be a halt to selling American shorts. The Reds and the multi-millionaires will be kicked out of the Executive Departments. Then, we will welcome the friendship of all sincere democratic nations. We will welcome the friendship of our vanquished foes, but we are not going to bribe them. We will not continue to destroy ourselves by giving to other nations that which is not ours to give, but which belongs to future Americans.

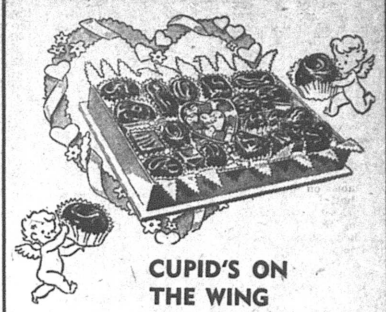

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HERD HEALTH DISCUSSED AT DAIRY MEET

Dr. H. G. Geyer, State Veterinarian, discussed Herd Health with more than one hundred and twenty-five dairymen and veterinarians at a meeting in Norwalk last Thursday evening.

Dr. Geyer discussed briefly some of the regulatory work as it will be administered from the State Department of Animal Industry.

Much of the evening's discussion, however, was given from the standpoint of a successful practitioner and included suggestions on practices that will maintain high health standards in the farm herd.

Dr. Geyer emphasized the point that he became interested in assisting with the State Department of Animal Industry only after it had been taken out of politics.

The livestock of Ohio represents more than a billion dollar industry and with the needs for health facilities and services offers a challenge to both the veterinarians and dairymen. Some of the problems which lie ahead are a more permanent accreditation program for tuberculosis, further information on the use of vaccines for brucellosis, eventual area testing for brucellosis, better methods for checking on mastitis, and adequate laboratory facilities to serve the animal industry.

According to Dr. Geyer, the Department is tentatively planning on setting up four new area laboratories to serve the animal industry here in Ohio. These and many other changes will be inaugurated in the long-time program for improved health and general livestock disease control.

Seven veterinarians from Huron and surrounding counties were present at the meeting. The control and elimination of dairy diseases was frankly discussed and commented upon. Many dairymen expressed the opinion that with the new State Department of Agriculture and the present Department of Animal Industry, a new era is ahead for livestock in Ohio.

At the close of the meeting the County Committee briefly discussed plans for the area Tuberculosis test which will be made early in 1949.

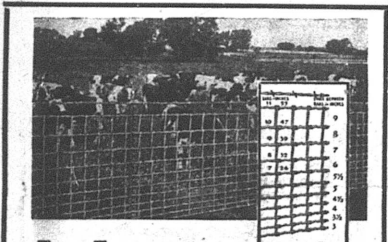

ARMY NEEDS CRIMINAL EXPERTS

Captain Robert L. Pine, commanding officer, U. S. Army and Air Force Recruiting Station, Room 303 Broadway Bldg., Lorain, headquarters for the recruits in this area, has just received the information that the U. S. Army is attempting to enlist Criminal Laboratory Experts. Any man that meets the qualifications, regardless if he is a veteran or not, will be enlisted in the grade of Master Sergeant with the base pay of \$165.00 per month, plus all allowances. Any person enlisting for this special assignment will be assigned to the 27th Criminal Investigation Detachment, European Command, the captain said and authority for this enlistment closes March 15, 1948.

These Criminal Investigation Experts are divided into three special skills with definite qualifications for each. (1) Document Expert, compares handwriting, hand-printing, and machine printed material, use of microscope in performing examinations; (2) Ballistics Expert, identifies bullets, firearms, removes bullets from victims and makes paraffin tests; (3) Chemist, analyzes and identifies such substances as poisons, narcotics, body fluid, must be acquainted with such special devices such as fluoroscope, spectroscopy and microscope, write reports which describe chemical analyses.

Captain Pine stated that these jobs necessitate long hours when developing ballistics or identification information. The majority of the time is spent in the laboratory with very little field work. Usually only one of each expert is assigned to a theater of operations and is directly responsible for his duties to the Theater Provost Marshall. Pine said that any person interested should contact M/Sgt. Portman in Room 5 of the Norwalk Post Office Bldg., or phone him at 1010.

ORDINANCE NO. 160

AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING UNLOADING AREAS AND NO PARKING AREAS IN THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO.

Be it ordained by council of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to park any vehicle, except for the purpose of discharging passengers or freight at any time between the hours of seven A. M. and six P. M. of each week day in the following areas whereby designated as "Unloading Areas."

(a) On each side of Sandusky Street from the curb to the north line of the cross walk at the Sandusky Street and extending along Sandusky Street to the south line of Spring Street.

(b) On the west side of Plymouth Street next to the curb from the intersection of Plymouth Street with the Public Square to the south line of Lot No. 120; and on the east side of Plymouth Street, next to the curb, from the intersection of Plymouth Street to the south line of Lot No. 20.

(c) On the south side of Spring Street beginning at the intersection of Spring Street and Sandusky Street and extending forty feet east.

Section 2. The following areas are hereby designated as "Bus Unloading Areas," to be used for the purpose of vehicles except common carriers:

(a) Beginning at a point

where the north line of Spring Street intersects with the east line of Sandusky Street and extending north along the east side of Sandusky Street a distance of forty feet.

(b) Beginning at a point where the north line of Spring Street intersects with the west line of Sandusky Street and extending along the north side of Sandusky Street a distance of forty feet.

Section 3. No vehicle shall be parked facing traffic or vehicle lawfully proceeding on the right side of the street.

Section 4. Any person violat-

ing any of the provisions of the parking regulations here established shall upon conviction be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

Section 5. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance herewith be repealed and this ordinance take effect from and after the earliest period provided by law.

EXPERIMENT STATION RECOMMENDS WAYS OF INCREASING 1948 OHIO FARM YIELDS

COLUMBUS, O. (SPECIAL)

Planting the right seeds at the right times will help Ohio farmers to raise the larger crops required in 1948 to supply the needs of this country and abroad, according to Dr. David F. Beard, extension agronomist at Ohio State University. Helping toward that end is this new adaptation map and chart compiled by the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station and the Ohio State University Agricultural Extension Service. Each Ohio farmer can tell quickly the best seed varieties for his part of the state. Recommendations are based on extensive tests by Ohio's agricultural specialists and by farmers in the field.

To guide farmers in the proper selection of best adapted crop varieties, the state has been divided into seven areas, as shown by the drawing in the next column. The best available hybrid corn, oats, soybeans, clover and winter wheat are indicated for the various sections for planting in 1948.

The terms "short season," "mid-season" and "full-season" as applied to good corn land in an average season are used to indicate the time required for any hybrid, to reach maturity in a particular area, with due recognition to the influences of soil productivity, seasonal conditions, and management activities.

Relative maturity of various Ohio hybrids is shown by the letters M, E, W, G and L, the "W" hybrid requiring least time to mature with the others progressively later at intervals of about three days between each letter group.

"Full season" seed requires early planting, and "short season" seed should be used to insure a mature crop from late plantings.

For winter wheat, the varieties Butler, Thorpe, Trumbull, and Fulho are good for all areas except the extreme southwest where Thorpe is not recommended.

Kentucky No. 1 and Ohio No. 1 are recommended varieties of winter barley for all seven areas. In the case of oats, Clinton and Wayne are approved for all areas except the southern section. There Columbia and Clinton are advised.

For soybeans, the recommended varieties to precede winter wheat are Earlyana in the extreme northeast, Earlyana and Richland in most other portions. Richland and Lincoln is suggested in the southern part, and Richland and Lincoln in the extreme southwest. For the full season, the recommended soybeans are Richland in the northeast and Lincoln for all the rest of the state.

Although Harlowe soybeans and Ajax oats have been added to the recommended list, seed of these will not be generally available for the planters, and they have therefore been omitted from the table below.

Recommendations on red clover are Van Fossen and Midland for the northern half with the addition of Cumberland in the central section. In the southern part, Cumberland and Kentucky 215 are advised. In the case of timothy, the Loran variety gets approval for central and northern Ohio, and Marietta in the southern part.



To determine the correct corn hybrids, oats, soybeans, clover, winter wheat and winter barley to plant, locate your farm on the map above and check its area number in the table below. The table lists the best hybrids and varieties for each area. The information was prepared by the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, the Agricultural Extension Service and the United States Department of Agriculture cooperating.
