

Library to Move Into New Quarters

Arrangements were made this past week by members of the Plymouth Library Board, Miss MacKeller, Mansfield librarian, and Mrs. Lois Fennell, county librarian, to move the local library into new quarters this coming fall.

A five year lease has been entered into with Mrs. F. W. Thomas for the three east rooms on the Public Square property on the Public Square. The house is now undergoing extensive repairs and upon completion the library will be moved. A separate entrance on the east side will be used by patrons.

The library has been in its present location for the past fourteen years in the building commonly known as the Clark Block and recently purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Cornell. Their lease expires in 1949.

Mr. Cornell is permitting the board to take their shelving and furniture lights and the town will continue to furnish the electric power as in the past. The board hopes to have all three rooms covered with oak or asphalt squares and no doubt before Fall a campaign for funds will be inaugurated for this purpose. The amount required will be considerably high, but is more than the Board feel they can do alone. The rooms will be completely renovated and books and shelving arranged according to plans worked out by both boards to the best advantage.

The Plymouth Library which is now a branch of Mansfield started more than twenty-two years ago by a group of interested women. It was originally located in what is now the Board of Public Affairs room in the town hall and has grown to be a modern and up-to-the-minute library. Miss Jessie Trauger is librarian, holding this position for the past eleven years.

Local Growers Attend School

On March 3rd and 4th, vegetable growers in the Celeryville area heard specialists discuss the problems in muck land culture. Nearly seventy men from each attendance each day. The meetings were held in the basement of the Celeryville Reformed Church.

Dr. W. E. Krauss, Associate Director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, reported the progress of the Celeryville Experimental Sub-Station. Wednesday morning, Dr. Krauss complimented the growers on their interest in the project.

From Michigan State College, came Dr. Paul M. Harmer who told of his discovery on muck soils with minor elements and crop rotations. His colored slides and straightforward manner of speaking made his lecture most helpful.

Dr. Freeman S. Howlett, Chief of the Department of Horticulture, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, outlined some of the steps necessary to establish accurate experiments with muck crops. He stressed the importance of balance in relation to soil nutrients.

Mr. Donald Comin, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, and Dr. Harmer, discussed fertilizer practices on the Wednesday afternoon program.

Thursday, Director Frank Farnsworth, Ohio State Department of Horticulture, discussed the part his organization plays in relation to the total agricultural program.

Dr. J. C. Young, Chief, Department of Botany, Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, led the round table discussion on disease and insect control. Producers are always plagued with new pests and diseases. Control measures were explained.

Karl M. Kahler, Ohio State Controller of Retail Merchants, introduced Max Reeder, of J. J. Heinz Company, and P. J. Gunner, of the Kroger Company. These men related new trends in marketing vegetables and fruits.

The final session was devoted to chemical weed control. Vegetable producers have little hope for much success in 1948 with 2-4-D, according to Dr. E. A. Brown, Department of Horticulture, Ohio State University. Albin argued growers to be extremely cautious in choosing their weed killers. He pointed out that much more research is necessary to prove their effectiveness. Damage to vegetable crops seems to be the worst drawback at present.

Dean L. L. Rummel was present at the Wednesday session. His presence was a real treat for the development of the Celeryville Sub-Station.

The speakers, committee and guests were entertained each day for luncheon by the members of United Bank. The meals were served in the bank's new dining room.

The local committee in charge of the program was composed of the following men: John Stambaugh, Jack Wiers, John Holthous, Burr Knaus, Ed Pfeiffer, and Ben VanZest. Cooperating members were John Wise, Willard United Bank; Lester Miller, Baltimore and Ohio Railroad; Karl M. Kahler, Ohio State Conference of Retail Merchants; G. A. Hummon and William G. Kneisel, Agricultural Extension Service.
