ORDINANCE NO. 187
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF THE FIRE CHIEF OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That the salary of the Fire Chief of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be \$300 per year, payable quarterly, effective on the 1st day of June, 1948.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance is necessary for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the people of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and that an emergency exists making it necessary to fix the salary of the Fire Chief at \$300.00 per year in order to obtain competent service in that capacity.

SECTION 3. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be repealed and this ordinance take effect immediately.

UNAVOIDABLE CIRCUMSTANCES HAVE FORCED A CHANGE IN OUR DECISION TO ACCEPT ADDITIONAL GAS SPACE HEATING

The coal strike, affecting deliveries of steel pipe, and possible allocations of gas to other areas by the Federal Power Commission threaten the additional gas which we have contracted for use in the winter of 1948-49.

To protect our present customers and to avoid a bad situation becoming worse, we have decided not to release approvals for any additional gas home heating beyond this date.

Our plans for next winter included accepting additional gas space heating equal to half of the new homes to be constructed this year and an equal number of homes heating with other fuels to be converted to gas heating. This action was provided by the permissive order of The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. Our ability to handle this additional heating was based upon estimates that our gas supply by February 1, 1949 would be such that we could meet the demands of a zero day with a gross shortage of 68 million cubic feet of gas. Industrial curtailment would have offset much of this shortage.

From information we have received most recently, we face a possible shortage of gas on a zero day next winter of 85 million cubic feet, without accepting any additional jobs for gas space heating. This figure is considerably beyond the volume that industry can be curtailed.

We have a contract with the Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Company for 50 million cubic feet of gas per day. Of this gas, 25 million a day was subject to cancellation upon approval of the Federal Power Commission. After lengthy hearings, the Federal Power Commission denied Panhandle the right of cancellation but we have been receiving only 25 million cubic feet a day from this source. To furnish the additional 25 million cubic feet awarded by the Federal Power Commission, Panhandle claims that its customers in other areas must be curtailed. This matter now is being heard by the F.P.C. and, until it is determined, this amount of gas is uncertain.

The United Fuel Gas Company, an affiliated property of Columbia Gas System, is one of our chief out-of-state sources of gas. United, in turn, receives much of its gas from Texas through the Tennessee Gas Transmission Corporation. Last winter United Fuel Gas received about 180 million cubic feet of gas a day from the Tennessee lines. Delivery schedules called for this amount increasing to 250 million by December 1, 1948. A few days ago

Columbia System was notified that 275 million was the most that could be delivered, due to delays in receiving steel pipe needed to handle all the gas promised. The United Fuel Gas Company has been forced to make proportionate cuts in delivery to us as a result of this.

The Ohio Fuel Gas Company has contracted for approximately half of the gas that can be furnished by the "first" lines. Approximately one-half of any diversions from this source is taken from us. For about a year The Federal Power Commission has allocated to other areas, 20 million cubic feet of gas a day from these lines, which reduces daily deliveries to us by 10 million cubic feet. Restoration of this 10 million delivery to us is uncertain.

Yes, lots more gas was contracted for next winter, but adding up the cuts and uncertainties we still arrive at a shortage of 85 million cubic feet of gas on a day of zero temperature without accepting any additional space heating.

Meanwhile, much of the gas from these described sources which was counted upon for underground storage this summer, to be drawn upon next winter, will not be available.

Our representatives have worked ceaselessly in hearings before the Federal Power Commission and will continue to try to protect the gas we have contracted for the use of our customers. Numerous attempts have been made even to help our suppliers find steel pipe.

We regret deeply the conditions which necessitated withholding the applications for space heating filed with us during April. When future conditions permit an easing of restrictions, these applications will be given first consideration. This offers little hope for next heating season because it is unlikely we can cut through the many, present uncertainties before winter.

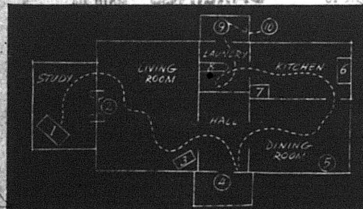

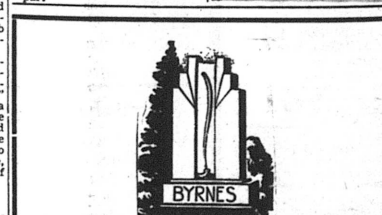
