The following account of the trip to Washington, D. C., by members of the Senior Class was written by Mrs. Harold Cashman, who with her husband, was chaperones on the trip.

We boarded the train, at 9 p.

From there we were taken to Mt. Vernon—Geo. Washington's home, of which you are all familiar with, through having read about it. It is very beautiful and from this front porch you have one of the most beautiful views of the Potomac there is. This plantation at one time, consisted of 3,600 acres.

On our tour back to town we passed through Alexandria, a village that Geo. Washington as a surveyor planned. In this village we saw some of the streets built by the Prussian prisoners of war, these huge stones were laid by hand and the streets are still in use today. We passed an old (large) stone house where the prisoners of war were brought from the north and south and traded there. It is now an apartment house.

Also on our way, still in Alexandria, we saw the Masonic Shrine dedicated to Geo. Washington.

On one corner of the Main Street of Alexandria stood an old white framed house, with black shutters, very badly in need of paint, having no front yard, and very little back yard, which is the present home of John L. Lewis. Also saw the little church where Geo. Washington and Gen. Lee went to church. The original pews are still there.

Then we were taken on a birds eye view of Washington, seeing the White House, the Capitol, various statues, the Embassies of all the foreign countries, the former home of Mrs. McLean who was the owner of the famous Hope Diamond. This home was given by her, to the American Red Cross.

World War II the average internment is twelve a day, compared with three a day before the last war. We saw the nationally famous grave of the Unknown Soldier there. Behind this grave lies the Amphitheatre, constructed of white marble. This is used only on four occasions a year.

Starting the second day feeling much better after a good night's rest we were taken to the F. B. I. where we were given details on several famous crimes, fingerprints, (which there has only been one person known to have been able to completely do away with his fingerprints; also were shown different kinds of guns and saw them demonstrated.

From here we were taken to the Smithsonian Institution where we were informed if we spent one minute looking at each exhibit there we could plan on being there some sixty-eight years. Our main interests there were the models of each President's wife and a dress she wore during the time she was First Lady and Linbergh's plane which he flew across the Atlantic.
